Storms Cause Huge Loss In Alpine Areas

MILAN (AP)—Floods, fist-sized hailstones and a tornado have taken at least 17 lives in the Alpine sectors of four countries. Sixty or more persons are in hospital with injuries.

Damage in smashed homes, ruined crops and dead livestock was estimated Monday at \$150,000,000. Italy was hardest hit, with the weather also lashing France, Switzerland and Germany.

The Alpine storm centred in Northern Italy's Piedmont and Lombardy. The worst twisted in Italian history razed two villages and left a swath of ruined farms.

Other drowning was counted in Manitoba and one in Saskatchewan. British Columbia had two traffic deaths and Alberta a recorded three.

A Canadian Press survey from 6 p.m. Friday to midnight Sunday showed a total close to the all-time short weekend record set July 12, 1955, when 77 persons died.

Thirty-three persons, most of them children and teenagers, died by drowning as summer weather spread across most of Canada and Quebec and Ontario sweltered in the season's first major heat wave.

The worst single accident occurred at St-Evariste, Que., where four men were killed in a head-on collision with a truck. Quebec counted 12 other deaths on the highways and 12 drowned.

Ontario recorded 14 deaths by drowning, including three double drownings. Seven died in traffic accidents and five in other mishaps, including three American tourists who died in an explosion of a summer cabin north of Sault Ste. Marie.

The Maritime provinces were relatively accident-free. No violent deaths were reported in Newfoundland or Prince Edward Island. Two persons died in Nova Scotia highway accidents and one drowning was reported from New Brunswick.

Three teenagers died at St. Agathe, Man., when their car plunged through a ferry guard chain into the Red River. One died.

R. C. A. F. - R. C. N. Hold Joint Anti Sub Exercise

HALIFAX (CP) — The navy and air force open a two-day joint anti-submarine exercise in the Gulf of St. Lawrence Tuesday.

Ships include the destroyer escorts Micmac, Huron and Iroquois of the navy's 1st Escort Squadron and the Ottawa, Assiniboine and Saguenay of the 3rd Squadron.

Aerial support will include Neptune aircraft from RCAF 404 and 405 Maritime Air Command squadrons based at Greenwood, Lancasters of the RCAF operational training unit at Summerside and navy Avengers based at Summerside.

Surface and air units will provide anti-submarine protection to a coastal convoy represented by the new ocean-going tug St. John, which will be routed between various ports in the gulf. Opposing them will be the submarines Alliance and Amphion of the Royal Navy's 6th Submarine Squadron based at Halifax.

Orange Assn's In Convention VANCOUVER (CP)—Some 700 delegates from all parts of Canada this week will attend the annual convention of the Orange Association of British America.

Although recreational and business sessions coincide in a number of cases, the men and ladies are considered to be holding separate conventions each with about 350 delegates.

For the men it will be the 127th annual convention, with Most Worshipful Grand Master Rev. W. C. V. Martin of Saint John, N.B., presiding.

To Attend Red Cross Training Course In N.B.

Thirteen Islanders are to attend the Junior Red Cross Leadership Training Centre for the Atlantic Provinces during the latter part of August, three of them as staff personnel and the remainder as delegates, Miss Marie Bowness, Director of Junior Red Cross for P.E.I. announced yesterday.

The purpose of the Training Centre, which will be held at the University of New Brunswick from August 21-29th, is to provide a broader knowledge of the aims and program of the Red Cross, both nationally and internationally, in order that students may return to their schools equipped for leadership in Junior Red Cross activities during the coming year.

Approximately 80 delegates will attend from the Atlantic Provinces and Quebec, with three delegates invited from the U.S.A.

Sponsored by their school, Junior Red Cross, Home and School Association, and other community

groups, the delegates will participate in a number of activities, including discussion groups, skits, panels, parade of ideas, activity groups, etc. Swimming pool facilities will be provided, and a chicken barbecue and trip to nearby Camp Gagetown are included on the varied program.

Outstanding speakers and consultants will lecture and act as advisors to the delegates concerning the topics to be studied.

Promises To East Germans Are Used On Revolt Anniversary

BERLIN (AP) — The restive people of Communist East Germany, who four years ago Monday rioted against Soviet rule, got new U.S. and West German pledges of eventual liberation on this anniversary.

Huge bonfires blazed along the borders to tell the East Germans the West had not forgotten the 1953 uprising.

Inside East Germany police barred demonstrations. But June 17 was remembered — especially by the thousands of workers who rallied with rocks against Russian tanks. And also on university and high school campuses which today seethe with agitation against the regime.

U.S. State Secretary John Foster Dulles sent an anniversary message pledging the United States and its partners "to intensify efforts to restore Germany as a free and united state."

Dulles' message was addressed to West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and broadcast over East Germany by powerful transmitters in the American sector of Berlin.

Adenauer led West Germany in memorial services. Speaking in the Bonn Parliament from a rostrum draped with the banners of the West German states and the eastern provinces, the 61-year-old chancellor said:

"The dead remind us of the freedom we do not possess. They remind us also of the thousands who are still in Soviet prisons. They remind us never to give up the fight for freedom. They remind us we must stand together in all decisive German questions."

In isolated West Berlin leaders placed wreaths on the June 17 memorial, a massive statue depicting a man shaking off a yoke.

It was in East Berlin that the June 17 revolt first exploded. It spread like wildfire to other big industrial centres and was not put down until the overwhelmed East Germans called in Russian tanks.

Diefenbaker At Loss For Words

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister designate John Diefenbaker was at a loss for words Monday night to express how he feels to be almost prime minister.

He described it as "a feeling that can't be readily translated into words."

"For a humble person like myself, it was hard to say how he felt when a great responsibility was placed on his shoulders."

"It is in that spirit I approach my task," he said when he met reporters after emerging from Government House where he accepted Governor-General Massey's invitation to form a new government.
