

**BURY SLAIN WIFE**  
BONN (Reuters)—Mrs. Gladys Blanchfield, 38, British-born wife of a Canadian sergeant found murdered Friday near Westphalia, will be buried in the Canadian cemetery at West today. A Canadian Army spokesman said Mrs. Blanchfield's mother, Mrs. S. M. Durkin of Enfield, Middlesex, will attend the funeral. Canadian and West German police are working on the case.

### York Resident Escapes Injury

No injuries were reported in the accident which occurred shortly after midnight.

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### New Version Of Applie Pie Brings Housewife \$25,000

NEW YORK (AP)—Mrs. Don d Vault, 36-year-old Ohio housewife, Tuesday won the \$25,000 first prize in a United States baking contest with a new version of that all-time favorite—apple pie.

She called her creation "spicy apple twists." In addition to putting apple pie into a new form with both taste and eye appeal, she shaved the cooking time.

The apple twists are made from strips of flaky pastry twisted around quartered apples, then brushed generously with butter and sprinkled with cinnamon and sugar.

Despite her success with the apple twist recipe, Mrs. de Vault said it isn't the favorite with her husband and two boys—they prefer chocolate cake.

Mrs. de Vault said she will use her \$25,000 prize to fix up her home or possibly build a new one.

### WRITES FOR YOUNG

In addition to her housekeeping and cooking, she has been writing children's stories as a hobby but so far has had none of her work published.

All the finalists in the contest received free trips to New York, and also will be given the stoves and mixing devices used in preparation of their recipes here.

Judges cited the spicy, buttery flavor and quick preparation of Mrs. de Vault's apple twists in awarding her the grand prize.

### THE RECIPE

**Spicy Apple Twists**  
2 baking apples, pared  
sliced, sliced into 8 wedges  
1 1/2 cups sifted flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup shortening  
4 to 5 tblsps. cold water  
1-3 cup melted butter  
1 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 cup water

Prepare apples. Sift flour with salt into mixing bowl. Cut in shortening. Sprinkle cold water over mixture stirring with fork until dough is just moist enough to hold together. Form into ball. Flatten to about 1/2-inch thickness, smooth edges.

Roll out on floured surface to 16x10-inch rectangle. Cut into sixteen 10x1-inch strips. Wrap one strip around each apple slice. Arrange in 13x9x2-inch pan, sides not touching. Brush with butter; sprinkle with mixture of sugar and cinnamon. Pour 1/2 cup water over pastries. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees) 25 to 30 minutes until golden brown. Serve warm or cold, plain or with cream. Makes 16.

### Supreme Court To Deal With Zoning Problem

### New Deposit Of N.S. Clay To Boost Output Of Brick

HALIFAX (CP)—L. E. Shaw Limited, making bricks for nearly a century, has become a key Maritime industry using a key Maritime resource.

With eight plants in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick turning rich clay into about 60,000,000 bricks a year, Shaw expects to broaden its markets with products from a big deposit of rare "buff-burning" fireclay at Shubenacadie, N.S.

Expansion has been under way since 1928 when the company operated a single brick plant at Avonport, N.S. The biggest unit is now located in Lanz, N.S., a company-planned community about 30 miles from here.

Others are in New Glasgow, Sydney, Halifax and Dartmouth, N.S., and Chipman, Fredericton and Saint John, N.B.

The Shubenacadie deposit was discovered under 50,000 cubic yards of overburden. It is expected to boost Shaw's shipments to central Canada, the Eastern United States, Newfoundland and the West Indies as well as the Maritime market where about 9 per cent of its bricks are now sold.

The deposit, only one of its types in Eastern Canada, has put Shaw

### Nickel Workers Strike Looms

SUDBURY, Ont. (CP)—A strike next week of International Nickel Company workers in two Ontario communities appeared inevitable Wednesday as contract negotiations collapsed.

Mike Solski, president of Local 598 of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (Ind.) announced a strike deadline of Sept. 24 for more than 14,000 workers at Inco operations here and in Port Colborne.

He added that all avenues of approach "would be explored in an attempt to reach a peaceful settlement before the deadline.

Wage increases are the key issue. The company has accepted the majority report of a conciliation board which recommended none.

The two sides got nowhere in talks held Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning. The union is seeking to negotiate on the basis of a conciliation board's minority report which recommended a 10-per-cent wage boost. Present composite wage averages \$2.69 an hour.

**COMPANY STATEMENT**  
After Wednesday's meeting broke up Ralph D. Parker, Inco vice-president and general manager of Canadian operations, said in a statement:

"We are keenly disappointed that in spite of our efforts the union negotiating committee has failed to realize that the problems facing the nickel industry in general, and this company in particular, rule out the possibility of any offer which would result in an increase in the company's production costs."

### BACK ALGERIA REGIME

CAIRO (Reuters) — Jordan and Saudi Arabia Sunday recognized the free Algerian government, an Algerian spokesman announced. He said cables had been received from Samir Rifal and Prince Faisal, premiers of Jordan and Saudi Arabia, recognizing the government which was proclaimed by Algerian insurgent leaders in Cairo Friday. Other countries which have recognized the new government include the United Arab Republic, Libya, Yemen, Iraq, Tunisia and Morocco.

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
