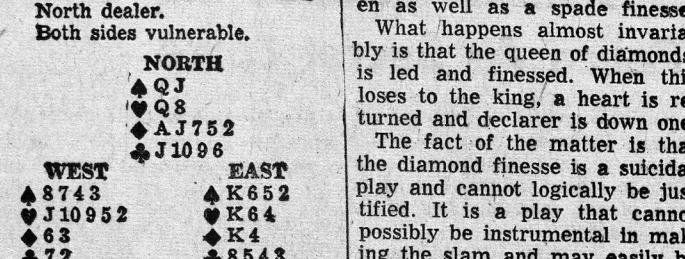

Opening lead—jack of hearts.  
 I have given this hand for play purposes to quite a number of pupils and the results have frequently amazed me. It is apparently one of those hands where declarer suffers from a blind spot.

Of course, South's leap to six diamonds is on the optimistic side, considering North passed originally, but granting that the slam is reached, the question is how declarer should play the hand.

The jack of hearts is opened, bringing forth the queen, king, ace. Declarer observes there is a diamond finesse that can be tak-

**Four University Groups Hoist Suggested Flag**

A cross-Canada flag-raising by the Students' Freedom Association, a group of undergraduate newspaper men, to urge Canadians to press for a distinctive Canadian flag may have fizzled Monday because of the closeness of university examinations.

Only four groups hoisted flags—in Fredericton, Kingston, Ont., Toronto and Edmonton. The flags were white, with a golden crown in a red field and a maple leaf with a beehive.

A spokesman for the group in Toronto said the crown symbolized Canada's loyalty to the Queen and the beehives the industriousness of its people.

He said the idea of the flag-hoisting, to overcome the "apathy" shown by Canadians on the issue, was conceived last December at a conference of the Canadian University Press in Montreal. The organization is a co-operative news service for university newspapers.

The flags were hoisted on various poles by the students of the University of New Brunswick, the University of Edmonton, the University of Toronto students and Queen's University in Kingston.
