SAD ACCIDENT.—The St. John Telegraph says:—Mr. Jeremiah Connors, blacksmith, of Campbellton, has received by telegram, the sad intelligence of his son's death by being killed on the P. E. I. Railway. This is home news from abroad, and is incorrect.

THE cargo of the steamer "Carroll," which sailed for Boston on Thursday evening consisted of 415 barrels mackerel, 531 cases of lobsters, 650 cases of eggs, 92 barrels of cod-fish, 144 bales of hay, 17 bundles of hides, 6 boxes dry fish, 2 barrels of cod oil, and 1 barrel of califskins.

MR. G. H. HASZARD had on exhibition at the market to-day a beautiful Lilium Auratum, or Golden Japan Lily. It attracted a great deal of attention, and relieved the part of the market in which it was situated, considerably of its usual unpleasant odors. Mr. Haszard is quite successful as a botanist, as his sample of lily will show.

THE Spanish sailor who, it will be remembered, suffered so much from exposure last fall, and who was so skillfully treated at the Charlottetown Hospital, left yesterday in the steamer "Carroll" for Boston. The care and attention bestowed on this unfortunate sailor, speak volumes for the charitable ladies of the hospital, the physicians, and others.

WHAT may be accomplished in the gardening of gooseberries was fully illustrated at the market to-day by Mr. Smallwood. He produced a barrel of these berries, picked from his own garden. They were large and luscious, and therefore "sold like hot cakes."

TO give an idea of their size we may state that twenty-one berries picked from the barrel weighed a half pound.

Arabi Proclaimed a Rebel.

PROTECTION OF SUEZ CANAL.

The Lords Accept Arrears Bill.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

LONDON, Aug. 11.

After much procrastination, and great pressure being placed upon the Porte, it is now finally settled that Arabi is to be proclaimed a rebel. To-day the long looked for announcement was made, and Arabi has been proclaimed by the Sultan. This will greatly expedite matters in Egypt, if the Sultan follows up the natural consequences of the proclamation.

England has consented to the temporary international protection of the Suez Canal.

The House of Lords accepted a ministerial crisis by accepting in a broad and fair spirit the Arrears Bill as it was sent up by the Commons. Lord Salisbury proposed more amendments, but was scarcely listened to with patience. All his proposals were rejected, and the Bill was received at once without discussion.

The Irish Police Satisfied.

DUBLIN, Aug. 11.

Earl Cowper, the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, addressed the Irish Constabulary to-day, and promised, in the name of the Government, that the £180,000 voted as extra pay should be at once distributed, and the Government would at once take into consideration the grievances mentioned in the petition of the men.

The three chief points of the men's claim are: An increase of one shilling per day in pay, an increased allowance to married men living out of barracks, and the equalization of pensions. The force expressed regret at the exaggerated reports of their intentions, and said that they were perfectly satisfied with the promises of the Lord Lieutenant.

\$100,000 MISSING

MONTREAL, Aug. 11.

One of the most prominent citizens here is unable to account for one hundred thousand dollars of trust funds. The affair is creating intense excitement. It is impossible at present to get full particulars, and the outcome is not yet known. The heirs are not satisfied and have offered a sum as a compromise.

F. W. Hales, of Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, was elected President at the Dominion Convention of the Young Men's Christian Association assembled at Halifax.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 9.

The re-emigration of Europeans here, if continued, may lead to serious embarrassments. No business is doing. The Government ought for the present to prohibit the return of refugees who own no property here.

Trains started from Gabari yesterday morning with a party to build the bridge across Mahmoudieh canal. In three hours the work was completed and adequate for the passage of guns.

Osman Bey, the Khedive's master of horse, escaped from Cairo and arrived here via Tichau. He stated that the rebels are fortifying Nefissa Junction, where the Suez, Ismailia and Cairo lines of railway meet. They have four guns and 2,000 infantry there.

Arabi has established a six gun battery near Eshet Kurahid, facing Fort Enks and facing Ramleh towards Aboukir, as well as in our direct front. The enemy's earth-works are rising fast.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 9.

It is stated that the Porte will mobilize 20,000 men for service in Egypt.

Two Turkish transports with 30,000 men have arrived at Suda Bay where they will remain.

The Porte has received a telegram from the Cairo committee stating the English have occupied Ismailia, and that if they advance into the country Rashid Husni Pasha is instructed to resist them. We are astonished to see England acting in a way calculated to endanger the Suez Canal for the injury of which, if any be done, Egyptians cannot be justly held responsible.

LONDON, Aug. 9.

The Daily Telegraph's Alexandria despatch says the enemy were busy burying their dead late on Sunday. Scouts number the Egyptians killed at 350.

Eight spies were captured in Alexandria on Monday. An atrocious scoundrel, implicated in the massacre of June 11th, has been tried and condemned to death.

The transport Canadian has sailed from Woolwich with 1,500 tons of railway plant for Egypt.

TROY, N. Y., Aug. 9.

The rain fall in the 24 hours ending at noon to-day was 2 1/2 inches. The rain will save the corn and potato crops, which were suffering from drought. The damage by the storm is widespread; many barns and much produce being burned by catching fire by lightning.

QUEBEC farmers report a splendid yield of hay, and have saved about half their crop.
