NEW YORK (AP)—Buying interest was slight and the stock market took a loss Monday as trading lagged.

Volume fell to 4,610,000 shares from the 5,600,000 in Friday's rising market.

It was a dull session. Some blue chips merely moved back from their gains on Friday. Wider losses were shown by some of the higher-priced, volatile issues.

The list was steady to a bit higher in the morning but this upward edged withered as buying power dried up. Stocks settled lower in the afternoon and closed at about their worst prices.

The Dow Jones Industrial average sank 4.92 to 821.31. A big factor was a 5-point decline by du Pont. The stock advanced 5 points Friday.

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS average of 60 stocks fell 1.3 to 305.9.

A preponderance of fractional gains gave the index their plus in the average. Santa Fe, however, yielded a point.

Among the losers were American Central, Southern Railway and Southern Pacific were among small gainers.

Texas Gulf Sulphur again was the most active stock, rising an early gain of more than 2 and settled for a net loss of 1 1/2 on 417,000 shares. Radio Corp. was second, off 1/4 at 32 1/2 on 417,000 shares.

Next in activity came Chrysler, off 1/4 at 48 1/2, and Xerox, up 3/4 at 117 as it touched another high.

Calumet and Hecla absorbed further profit-taking and sank 1 1/2 to 22 1/2 in active trading.

Boeing, up 1/4, paced a moderate rally higher aerospace group. Building materials also were higher. The trend was lower among steel, motor, rail, chemicals, tobacco, drugs and oils.

POLAROID SLIDING Polaroid, down 7/8 in a continued slide, Sears, Roebuck led. Zenith 204, Merck 1 1/4, Standart (New Jersey) 1/4, Standard 1 1/4, American G and G 1/4 and Procter and Gamble 1/4.

General Motors yielded 1/4, American Telephone & Telegraph 3/4, Lear 1/4, 3M 1/4, Montgomery Ward 1/4 and U.S. Steel 1/4.

Panhandle Eastern Pipeline rose 1/4, U.S. Gypsum 3/4, Johnsonville 1/4, Phelps Dodge 3/4 and Control Data 1/4.

IBM's new stock split, 5-for-4, was credited with a rise of 1 1/2 on 100,000 shares.

Among Canadian issues traded, Dome Mines lost 1/2 while 1/2 losses were taken in Aluminium Ltd., Granby Mining, International Nickel and Walker Goodfellow.

An irregularly lower trend prevailed on the American Exchange. Volume was 1,460,000 shares, compared with 1,410,000 Friday. Spry Rainbow Oil led the advance with 1 1/2 while Canadian Javelin fell 1/2 and Canadian Marconi and Preston 1/4 apiece.
