7-Commercial attack on Athol Butchkev and chancery clerk V. N. Poluchkin in Russian embassy expelled from Canada in bribery, sex and security cases.
8-Sherbrooke Beavers win Canadian senior hockey championship, defeating Nelson Maple Leaf in four straight games.
11-India, Pakistan agree on ceasefire in Rann of Kutch.
14-Committee of Anglican and United Church clergymen agrees on principles for union between two churches in Canada. China explodes second atomic bomb Niagara Falls. Flyers defeat Edmonton Oilers four games to one to win Canadian junior hockey title.
17-Onofrio Minaudo, suspected member of Cosa Nostra crime syndicate deported from Canada in 1964, found shot to death in Trapani, Sicily, his native village.
18-Queen and Prince Philip open state visit to West Germany at Bonn.
19-Brig-Gen. Antonio Barreira proclaims civilian-military junta has absolute control of Dominican Republic.
20-Pakistan International Airlines Boeing 720B jet plane crashes near Cairo; 121 die. Indian expedition of 19 climbs Mount Everest.
24-Separatist demonstrate in Montreal; bomb explodes outside 12-story Dorchester Boulevard building.
25-Cassius Clay retains heavyweight boxing title, knocking out Sonny Liston in first round at Lewiston, Me. Canada sells China 56,700,000 bushels of wheat.
28-Xaverian Placers of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, N.S., win Dominion Drama Festival with The Wakefield Cycle.
30-Jimmy Clark of Scotland wins Indianapolis 500-mile auto race.

1-Coal mine explosion at

Yamano in southern Japan kills 237.
2-French-owned Sea Bird II wins Epsom Derby; Meadow Court owned by Canadian publisher Max Bell second.
3-Maj. Edward White walks in space for 20 minutes during two-man Gemini 4 spaceflight commanded by Maj. James McDivitt.
7-Two-man Gemini 4 space flight ends safely after 62 orbits.
9-U.S. ground troops in Viet Nam authorized to enter combat to support Vietnamese forces against Viet Cong attacks. Michel Jazy of France lowers world record for mile run to 3:53.6 at Rennes, France, beating Peter Snell's mark of 3:54.1.
11-Prime Minister Pearson and Prime Minister Shastri of India agree in Ottawa talks that negotiations on future of Viet Nam cannot begin until bombing of North Viet Nam is stopped.
15-Federal government announces it will permit colour TV effective Jan. 1, 1967.
17-Atlantic Acceptance Corp. goes into receivership.
19-President Mohammed Ben Bella of Algeria ousted in bloodless coup by group headed by Col. Houari Boumediene.
21-Strike over wages of 3,800 employees of Montreal Transportation Commission ends after 14 days.
23-Arnold Smith, assistant secretary of state in external affairs department at Ottawa, appointed to new post of Commonwealth secretary general.
25-Nine-day Commonwealth prime ministers' conference ends with communique calling for withdrawal of all foreign troops from Viet Nam.
26-Whistling Sea owned by Paul Olivier of Calgary and ridden by Tak Inouye of Vernon, B.C., wins Queen's Plate at Toronto; first horse from outside Ontario to do so.
29-Chief Justice Frederic Dornon's inquiry into allegations of influence in the government service questions Justice Minister Favreau's judgment in decision not to prosecute in connection with bribery allegations last September; finds Raymond Denis, then executive assistant to immigration minister, offered \$20,000 bribe to obstruct course of justice in case of narcotics-smuggling

suspect Lucien Rivard. Favreau resigns as justice minister.
JULY
RIVARD RECAPTURED.
5-Col. Houari Boumediene formally assumes leadership of new 26-man revolutionary council governing Algeria.
7-Prime Minister Pearson shuffles cabinet; transfers Lucien Carlin from public works to justice; appoints Guy Favreau, who resigned as justice minister, president of the Privy Council.
8-All 52 aboard die as Canadian Pacific Airlines DC-6B explodes over Cariboo district of B.C.
14-Adlai Stevenson, U.S. ambassador to United Nations, dies in London. Raymond Denis, former executive assistant to two federal cabinet ministers, charged with attempting to interfere with course of justice and attempting to bribe an agent of justice; charges arise from Dornon report.
15-Defence department announces government has approved purchase of Northrop F-5 fighter-bomber for RCAP.
16-Lucien Rivard arrested at cottage on outskirts of Montreal, 4 1/2 months after his escape from Montreal's Bordeaux jail.
20-Prime Minister Pearson outlines details of medical care plan to federal-provincial conference; plan to be operated by provinces with federal government sharing cost roughly on 50-50 basis.
21-Greek freighter Orient Trader heavily damaged by fire on Toronto waterfront. Lucien Rivard extradited to U.S. to face narcotics-smuggling charges.
22-Sir Alec Douglas-Home resigns as leader of Britain's Conservative party.
27-Edward Heath chosen to succeed Douglas-Home as British Conservative leader.
Quintuplets - one boy, four girls - born in New Zealand to Mrs. D. W. Lawson.
30-Seven-day postal strike over wages which affected most of Canada ends in most cities except Montreal. Quintuplets born in Sweden to Mrs. Karin Ohlsen.
AUGUST
ONE WEEK IN ORBIT
5-Canadian Wheat Board announces sale of wheat and wheat flour to Soviet Union amounting to about 27,000,000 bushels of wheat.
6-Inquiry by Mr. Justice George Chaffin of Quebec Superior Court finds crash of Air Canada DC-6 near Montreal Nov. 20, 1963, in which

118 died, probably caused by mechanical fault.
7-Postal workers strike in Montreal ends after 17 days.
9-Singapore pulls out of Malaysia, becomes independent state. Fire in Titan II missile silo at Searcy, Ark., kills 53.
11-Canadian Wheat Board announces further sale to Soviet Union of 187,000,000 bushels of wheat and wheat flour, valued at about \$450,000,000. Rioting breaks out in Negro district of Los Angeles.
15-Race rioting under control in Los Angeles after five days; toll 32 dead, 825 injured, fire damage estimated at \$175,000,000.
16-Jockey Johnny Longden wins 6,000th race of his career riding Prince Scorpion at Exhibition Park, Vancouver. Chilean government declares a national disaster after week of snow, rain and wind storms kills 96 persons, leaves 80,000 homeless.
17-Four treasure hunters seeking buried pirates' gold on Oak Island, N.S., die in fume-filled mining shaft. Robert Manry, 47, of Cleveland reaches Falmouth, England, after 78-day transatlantic voyage from Falmouth, Mass., in 13 1/4-foot sailboat.
19-Internal auditor of Quebec revenue department reports phone bankruptcies cost Quebec government \$5,400,000 in lost taxes between Jan. 1, 1959, and Feb. 1, 1965.
21-Gemini 3 spacecraft goes into orbit with U.S. astronauts Lt. Col. Gordon Cooper, 38, and Lt. - Cmdr. Conrad, 35, aboard.
24-Indian troops in Kashmir ceasefire in some places, occupy Pakistan positions.
26-Astronauts Oberster and Scott complete final Gemini 5 flight, set for seven days 22-hour missions in space.
30-Avalanche strikes hydroelectric project at Saas Fee, Switzerland; at least 100 killed.
SEPTEMBER

4-Dr. Albert Schweitzer, 90, 1952 Nobel Peace Prize winner, dies at hospital he founded in Lambarane, Gabon. United Nations calls for immediate ceasefire in Kashmir.
7-Prime Minister Pearson announces Parliament dissolved; calls general election for Nov. 8. Pakistan warships bombard Dwaraka, Indian coastal fortress; Pakistani planes raid Amritsar; Indian planes raid Karachi.
OCTOBER
POPE PAUL VISITS UN
1-Coup d'etat in Indonesia fails to unseat President Suharno.
4-Pope Paul pleads for peace before UN General As-

sembly after fleeing from Rome for 14-hour visit in New York. Quebec Justice Minister Claude Wagner says five decomposed bodies found, links them with fraudulent bankruptcies and arson.
5-Bladen report on higher education urges federal, provincial governments to boost combined annual aid to \$1,704,000,000 in 10 years from \$365,000,000 in 1964-65.
6-Kelly royal commission report on Windfall Oils and Mines Ltd. criticizes conduct of George and Viola MacMillan, president and promoter respectively of company; fraud charges laid against them.
8-President Johnson operated on successfully at Washington for removal of gall bladder.
9-Conference on Rhodesia's demand for independence breaks down in London.
14-Los Angeles Dodgers win World Series, defeating Minnesota Twins four games to three.
15-Vatican ecumenical council approves decree denying collective Jewish guilt for crucifixion of Christ.
18-Abraham Okpik becomes first Eskimo member of Northwest Territories Council.
23-United Nations children's fund awarded Nobel Peace Prize for 1965.
27-President Humberto Castillo Blanco dissolves all existing political parties in Brazil, assumes dictatorial powers.
28-Capital punishment abolished in Britain for five-year period.

6-Ernie Terrell retains

World Boxing Association version of heavyweight title, outpointing George Chuvalo of Toronto over 15 rounds in Toronto.
8-Liberals re-elected with another minority in Canadian general election. American Airlines Boeing 737 jet crashes in rainstorm near Cincinnati; 56 die, six survive.
9-Power failure blacks out eastern North America including much of Ontario.
11-Rhodesia assumes independence from Great Britain; emergency regulations including censorship imposed by Rhodesian government; Britain announces economic sanctions. Finance Minister Gordon resigns from Pearson cabinet.
12-Lucien Rivard sentenced at Laredo, Tex., to 20 years and \$20,000 fine on two narcotics convictions.
13-Liber Yarmouth Castle engulfed by flames and sinks en route from Miami to Nassau; 90 die. Liberals pick up two Commons seats from Conservatives in service vote in general election; standing: Liberals 131, Conservatives 97, NDP 21, Creditiste 9, Social Credit 2.
15-Failure in its Sir Adam Beck plant at Queenston, Ont., primary cause of Nov. 9 blackout, Ontario Hydro says.
16-Ore carrier Lawrencecliffe Hall, 23,000 tons, sinks after collision in St. Lawrence River off Isle of Orleans; no casualties.
17-Communist China barred from United Nations on 47-47 tie vote in General Assembly.
22-Cassius Clay retains world heavyweight boxing crown with 12th-round tech-

nical knockout of Floyd Patterson at Las Vegas, Nev.
DECEMBER
MEETING IN SPACE
2-Vatican council document confirms Roman Catholic ban on artificial contraception, but leaves way open to change.
3-Three Ku Klux Klansmen convicted and sentenced by federal judge at Montgomery, Ala., to 10 years in slaying of civil rights worker Viola Liuzzo of Detroit.
4-Two airliners collide over New York suburbs; Constellation crash - lands at North Salem, N.Y., with four

dead; Boeing 707 lands safely at Kennedy Airport, New York.
5-U.S. rediscount rate and Canadian bank rate each increased one-half per cent.
8-Fireball lights skies over southwestern Ontario and neighboring states; astronomers identify it as meteor.
14-Britain and Republic of Ireland sign free trade pact mutually wiping out all tariff barriers.
15-Two manned American spacecraft, Gemini 6 and Gemini 7, manoeuvre to rendezvous in space, coming as close as six feet.
