LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

CHICAGO PRICES.—The Chicago market was weaker all round on Friday. Pork declined 30c.

FOR MISSIONARY PURPOSES.—It is said that of the sum total received by the Canadian Methodist church during the past year for missions, about \$5,000 was contributed by the Epworth Leagues.

FOOTBALL AT TRURO.—The Truro football team played a "draw" with a team drawn from the Resound and Intrepid at Truro on Thursday afternoon. Mr. Frank C. Cotton, formerly of Charlottetown, was one of the half backs of the Truro team.

MR. BLAKE'S IRISH FUND.—According to a recent despatch from Toronto in response to Hon. Mr. Blake's appeal for aid for the Irish parliamentary party the sum of five thousand and one hundred dollars has been subscribed in that city. Hon. Mr. Blake, Sir Frank Smith and Hugh Ryan gave a thousand each. Archbishop Walsh gave two hundred.

AN IMPORTANT SEIZURE.—The customs department at Ottawa has been advised of the seizure in the St. Lawrence Gulf of the schooner Canada, with forty thousand dollars worth of contraband whiskey on board. The Canada is thought to belong to a Quebec city smuggling syndicate. The seizure was made by the cruiser Constance.

ATHLETIC.—The Athletic meet to be held under Y. M. C. A. auspices promises to be the best event of the season. Athletes from Charlottetown and other parts of the province will try their prowess against each other. Let all our citizens come, and both help on a good cause and enjoy themselves at the same time. Come early on Friday Nov. 5th.

NO FEAR OF CONTAGION.—In view of the various reports that have been in circulation regarding the death of the McQuarrie child, the report of Dr. H. D. Johnson, acting health officer, made to the Board of Health, has been given to the press. This report is along the lines of the story of the case given in THE EXAMINER on Saturday. Dr. Johnson says he visited the child on Thursday, and found her suffering with severe constitutional symptoms and with a pronounced rash covering her body. As this might mean any one of several diseases, some of them of a very contagious nature, he considered it well as a precautionary measure, to notify the inmates of the house not to enter any other house, and not allow anybody to enter theirs until they got further orders. The child died on Friday morning. Following up the precautionary measures already used, the funeral was held privately on Saturday morning. Since the death Dr. Johnson says he has made careful enquiry and can find no evidence of any exposure by the patient or her family to any zymotic or contagious disease. There is in his opinion no fear of any outbreak of contagious disease arising from the case.

GRACE CHURCH.

Benjamin R. Jewell, M. W. S., Delivered a F. U. C. Address Last Evening

The large audience assembled in Grace Church last night will not soon forget the address of the Most Worthy Sobriety. The pastor, the Rev. W. J. Kirby, took the preliminaries of the service, and the choir rendered some choice music. It was evident by the close attention given to the speaker that he had gained their intensest interest. Mr. Jewell opened his address by describing a visit to the Niagara Falls, and the effect they had upon him at different standpoints of observation. He was at first sight disappointed and disheartened. He thought he had come a long way to see very little; but at other points of view he was filled with admiration and wondered at the awful immensity and grandeur of the water falls. So, he said, with this great question of intemperance; it depends altogether on the standpoint of observation as to how it affects you. He gave some incidents in his early experience when he saw his class-mates and chums going down to death and ruin and how he swore, God helping him, he would be an eternal foe to that evil which robbed the home of its comforts, the children of a father, and the wife of a husband. He had been one of the first members of the Sons of Temperance, and was over fifty years in the temperance warfare. He knew what it cost to be a bold prosecutor of the law. When in the highest office his fellow-citizen could give him he had with two others enforced the law of prohibition, and the liquor party put the torch to his home and destroyed all he owned with fire. But if he knew the same thing would occur again he could only do his duty. He had taken the oath of office, and swore to enforce the law and he could do nothing else but do it. "What ought you to do here in this city?" he asked. Well first of all become a total abstainer yourself. Then organize for the election of three years hence, and do not leave the preparation two years and nine months before you do anything for the Scott Act election of the future. Then let the temperance societies and the churches unite, and this traffic, which thwarts the Divine purpose regarding man, and drags him down to that punishment which is prepared for the Devil and his Angels, will soon be conquered, and the cause of temperance and the cause of God shall triumph in our world.

His closing remarks regarding the triumph of the Gospel, and the coming of Christ's Kingdom on the earth were very beautiful, and left a very deep impression on the congregation. Mr. Jewell will be heard with pleasure tonight by the united divisions in Wright's Hall, and will ever be welcome to this city when he may come this way again.
