Memorial Windows To Be Unveiled In The Kirk

On Sunday morning in the Kirk of St. James two beautiful stained glass windows will be unveiled and dedicated to the glory of God and in Loving Memory of James Robertson Burnett, 1871-1952. Mr. Burnett was long the editor and managing director of "The Charlottetown Guardian," and for over forty years a member of the congregation of St. James, for many of which he served as an Elder in its Kirk Session. The unveiling will be performed by two of his grandsons, James Watson Burnett, and Niall Gordon Burnett, and the memorial "will be solemnly dedicated by the Minister, the Reverend T. H. B. Somers. A special feature of the service will be the singing by the boys' choir which Mr. Burnett founded more than twenty years ago.

The theme of the windows is the life of St. Columba in Scotland. They depict the figure of the saint, a missionary, St. Ninian and St. Columba. The first panel shows the figure of St. Ninian robed in royal purple and carrying the Book of the Gospels. His feet are depicted in a halo of deep scarlet. Above the name-scroll appears the Cross of St. Andrew in silver against a sun-burst of gold. Below the figure of the Saint appears the scene of his labours. On the shores of Galloway, washed by the waters of the North Sea, stands the rough stone Church of St. Martin at Whithorn, the first cradle of Scottish Christianity.

In the second panel appears the figure of St. Columba in a habit of silver grey with knotted rope and a golden staff. His right hand is raised in benediction, but his head is encircled with a scarlet nimbus. In the acroche above the name-scroll appears a Celtic Cross in silver, likewise set against a sun-burst of gold. In the third panel the figure of the saint is depicted in the Island of Iona, which stands the chapel and monastery of the Columban Missionaries and in the distance a coracle is seen making its way across the sea from Ireland.

The lamp of Christianity in Scotland was first kindled by St. Ninian, (300-432), in the fifth century among the Picts of isolated Galloway. A native of Cumberland, St. Ninian belonged to a family of Bishops in infancy, from his childhood St. Ninian was characterised by his piety and studious mind and after years of careful preparation abroad he returned to Britain, crossed the Wall of Hadrian and at Whithorn in Scotland he built in 397 the first stone church in North Britain. The site was astutely selected. It secured for him a base of operations supported on the West by the Christianity of the Ireland, and on the South by the British Church.

To the conversion of the Caledonians he now devoted the remainder of his self-sacrificing and energetic life. Some of the foundations, which were widespread and numerous, are scattered over central and eastern Scotland to this day. Indeed, the extraordinary compass of his missionary activities is only now beginning to receive due recognition, for the extensive erasure which was the subsequent fate of his achievements tended for long to depreciate their real extent in the eyes of ecclesiastical historians. St. Ninian blazed the trail for that more successful crusade which in the sixth century issued from Iona, and whose enduring results are associated with the name of St. Columba.

St. Columba
 St. Columba, (521-597), was born in Ireland of royal Irish blood and was from his boyhood of a profoundly religious turn of mind. After being educated at the monastic school of Moville, he was ordained a Presbyter and embarked on a missionary career that was to carry him to many parts of his native land and across the sea to Scotland. Settling with twelve helpers on the Island of Iona off the west coast his first task was to erect a church and monastery—humble structures of timber and reeds, according to the fashion of the country and the age. Having spent some years in preparation, he began the great work of his life—the conversion of the heathen kingdom of the Northern Picts.

Crossing over to the mainland he evangelized the territory of King Brude and by his preaching and his holy life converted the whole of northern Scotland was evangelized by the labours of Columba and his missionaries and the religious instruction of the people provided for by the erection of numerous monasteries. "That man," cried Dr. Johnson in a famous outburst, "is little to be envied, whose patriotism would not gain force upon the plain of Marathon or whose piety would not grow warmer on the island of Iona." To its lonely shores the pilgrim travels still. There, in the Church and Monastery, now restored by the Church of Scotland, he hears waited across the dim centuries the chant and anthem of the heroic missionary saints, in the cry of the sea-bird, or the whisper of the wind among the lichened rocks and grass, or the yearning sigh of the sea upon those salt-white sands which were crisscrossed with the steps of a martyr, he listens to strange mysterious voices that waken an incommunicable emotion in the soul. Its very name is magic to the Christian mind.

City and Central Stresses Possibilities In New Processing Plant

The establishment of a processing plant at Bedouque was held up as an example of what can be done in the way of new industries in the Province by Hon. George MacKay, when he spoke on the Draft Address in the Legislature Thursday afternoon.

"I mention these things," said Mr. MacKay, "to show that there are great possibilities for men of vision who are willing to take a chance but above all they must be willing to work." He told the House that this processing plant, last year, had a contract for 27 acres of peas and beans. They earned 3,500 cases of wax beans, 4,000 cases of peas and 2,500 cases of stringed beans, and this year intend to contract for 130 acres of peas with corresponding increases in the other vegetables. The plant employed 50 persons during the day and 30 at night. The payroll was in the vicinity of \$12,000.

Mr. MacKay told of a farmer and his son who lived in his district and grew all kinds of strawberries, fruits and small fruits. The system developed by these farmers was to allow the customer to come to the farm and pick the berries or fruit themselves. They had their berries weighed and paid for when they got a sufficient supply. Mr. MacKay said that long lines of cars could be seen early in the morning moving up this small road towards the farm.

The member from Albany had words of praise for the leadership of Premier Matheson. "He is only a young man yet and we expect that he will lead the Government of this Province for many years to come," continued Mr. MacKay. "He has lifted many homes out of darkness into light through the rural electrification program, which is one of the finest any Government in this Province has ever undertaken."

"We have had some criticism regarding the appointment of an agricultural engineer," said Mr. MacKay. "I believe that he will make a valuable contribution to the industry in this Province." He thought it was a fine thing to have someone to call in when there was a real problem. He said that the use of so many large machine units made this phase of work doubly important and pointed out that already this man has been called upon to give advice on the construction of several buildings and has spoken before three farm forums groups.

"Rural exhibitions are of great value," continued Mr. MacKay. "A great many people will take an interest in one of these smaller fairs when they would never think of participating in the Charlottetown Exhibition." He mentioned the death of a dear daughter and sister, Noreen Jackman, who passed peacefully away February 27th, 1953. May her soul rest in peace.
