All About a Deposit.

A Kingston, Ont., despatch says: The deposit money placed in the Returning Officer's hands for Mr. Shibley, the Liberal candidate for Adington, was garnished by a Toronto creditor. Mr. Britton, Q. C., claimed the money and the case was heard by Judge Wilkinson a few evenings ago. The creditor's counsel claimed that when the money was put up it became Mr. Shibley's and was payable back to him and was therefore attachable. Mr. Britton demurred. He said he put up the money at his own risk with an unequivocal understanding that if it was forfeited by a non-securement of a sufficient number of votes the candidate would not be asked to recony, but that if the money was not forfeited then it should be returned to him. He also contended that money in the hands of an officer of an election court was not liable to attachment. Further, if these grounds were untenable, the decision in the Queen's County, N. B., case was put in, and Mr. Britton alleged that he was not the agent for Mr. Shibley, and consequently the latter was not properly a candidate, and the money placed in the Returning Officer's hands was his.

The Judge reserved his decision, but said that he considered the money was Mr. Britton's, and that in placing it in the Returning Officer's hands he made no relinquishment of it except in so far as its forfeiture was concerned.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

A Word with the Council.

SIR.—As an interested citizen I have read the letter of Mr. W. C. Harris and the reply of Messrs. Phillips & Chappell. I have no desire to say who I think is right or who I think is wrong. Perhaps there is some right and some wrong on both sides. What I do think is, that the City Council have managed the matter in a very hasty, unbusinesslike and unsatisfactory way. There is no doubt in my mind that, in their haste, the Council paid several hundred dollars more than they ought to have paid for the land; and having obtained the land a very good site—they ought undoubtedly, in my opinion, to have called for plans and specifications and estimates of cost from all the architects within reach. At the very least, they should not have completely ignored the only firm of professional architects we have in the town. Messrs. Stirling & Harris have, certainly in recent years, set the fashion for the architecture of this city; and that a decided improvement is evident, need not be stated. St. James' Church, the residences of Mr. Houle, Mr. W. A. Weeks, Mrs. McLennan, Mr. J. D. McLeod, Mr. Miller, and many other new and beautiful residences which might be named—not to speak of the Cameron Block and the splendid new Dominion Building—are standing witnesses to their art and skill. One day in the autumn of last year I was showing a prominent man from one of our Canadian cities over the town, and he was noticing, as strangers do, the most admirable things that came to his eye. Every building he pointed out as particularly handsome, with one exception, was built from the plans of Messrs. Stirling & Harris. Imitation, it is said, is the sincerest flattery; and it is quite evident from the buildings going up on Upper Prince Street and elsewhere that their plans are being imitated—that, as I said before, they have in point of architecture set the fashion of the town. But the City Council went past them, admitted of no competition, and employed Messrs. Phillips & Chappell—excellent mechanics, I admit—to prepare the plans and superintend the erection of the most costly City Building ever erected here. To me the whole proceeding looks very like a job—and if, as Mr. Harris states, the city will lose about \$2,000 on account of it, the Council are—I think I express public opinion—highly censurable.

The Canadian Cardinal.

MGR. TACHELREAU ENTERS INTO POSSESSION OF HIS TITULAR CHURCH AT ROME.

A despatch from Rome says: A very large number of persons, including Archbishop Carr and Bishop Keane, were present on Saturday at the ceremonies attending Cardinal Tachelreau's entering into possession of his titular Church of Santa Maria della Vittoria. A procession was formed, consisting of the Canadian students of the College of the Propaganda and Carmelite fathers. Cardinal Tachelreau was seated upon a throne at the left of the altar. After the reading of the brief of the Cardinal's appointment the Carmelite fathers knelt and kissed his hands. The superior then read an address in French, to which Cardinal Tachelreau replied. He said: "Among the innumerable benefits which I owe the Pope, I count the favor of having as my titular the beautiful church so richly adorned by Prince Torlonia, of which the late Cardinal Jacobini was titular priest. In Canada the first church was dedicated to Mary three centuries ago, and became the fruitful mother of innumerable churches which to-day cover the immense valleys of the St. Lawrence, Mississippi, Winnipeg and Columbia rivers. At a short distance from the first church rises another, dedicated to Notre Dame des Victoires, which is a place of pilgrimage where each hour of the day the faithful may be seen imploring grace or offering thanks." The Cardinal concluded by saying: "Today is the sixteenth anniversary of my episcopal consecration. I ask the prayers of the fathers that I may fulfil my heavy duties worthily."

Gold.

The discovery of rich gold deposits in British Columbia, close to the imaginary boundary line between that Province and Alaska, may, it is feared, lead to serious trouble if the actual boundary is not defined before any attempt is made to develop these valuable finds. In view of the discovery of gold in the Pacific Province the Dominion Government have decided on sending out a party to make a geological survey of that part of the country in which minerals have been found, and to ascertain as nearly as possible to whom they belong—whether to the United States or the Dominion. Doctor Bell, assistant chief of the Geological Survey, says that he believes the valuable mining lands between the head waters of the Lewes River and Mount St. Elias will become a source of dispute between the United States and Canada on account of the indefinite boundary line. Referring to the country between the head waters of the Lewes River and Mount St. Elias, which lies directly west of it, which abounds in silver, copper, lead and ore, Dr. Bell says that as the Americans have got ahead of Canada in every territorial deal the Dominion must look forward to being done out of this valuable territory, which, he maintains, properly belongs to Canada. An effort will be made during the coming session of Parliament to secure an appropriation to commence a survey of the British Columbian boundary in the hope that the United States Government will co-operate and definitely fix the boundary line and thus remove all possibility of dispute.
