Are you interested in being on the Board of Governors or Senate? The Board of Governors and Senate are a two-tier system of government at the University of Prince Edward Island.

The Board of Governors consists of 20 people - nine appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor - in - Council; The Chancellor of the University; The President of the University; The President of Holland College; Two members elected from senate; two members elected from the teaching Faculty; Two members elected from Alumni and two members elected from the student body.

The Senate is composed of the President of the University; Deans of faculties; Director of School of Business Administration; the Registrar; the Chief Librarian; Director of Extension and Summer Sessions; five members of the student body; one member elected from the Board of Governors of Holland College; the President of the Student Union. Members from the full time teaching faculty equal half the total membership of the Senate.

These two positions are very important in the running of this University they each have an integral part to play. For any concerned student wishing to be a part of the Senate or Board of Governors there are applications available at the UPEI Student Union.

The people elected for each position will sit on Student Council and will be Student Council representatives on his or her respective board.

Applications for each position will be open until Friday, September 30, 1983 All applications must be submitted by 5:00 p.m. at the Student Union Office.

The position of Science Representative for the Student Council is still open. Any student in the Science Faculty wishing to offer their services must make application no later than 5:00 p.m. Friday, Sept. 30, 1983 at the Student Union Office.

The Student Disiplinary Committee also has positions open. This committee needs a person from each year and another person from any year. This committee hears and decides all cases of vandalism, etc. that occur within the Barn or on the University Campus. These positions also are very crucial and need fair people to sit on them. If you feel you qualify, submit your application to the Student Union office before 5:00 p.m. on Friday, October 7.

Electorial officer position is also open. This person is required to run all Student elections carried out on campus. Applications for this must be submitted to the Student Union office before Friday, Oct. 7 at 5:00 p.m.

## FOUR NEW FEDERAL JOB CREATION PROGRAMS LAUNCHED

Employment and Immigration Minister John Roberts launched four federal job creation programs which will benefit well over 300,000 Canadian men and women during this fiscal year and next.

One-and-a-half billion dollars will be spent for job creation this fiscal year and next. Of this amount, some \$1.3 billion will consist of contribution funds for the four programs being announced. The programs are the result of the consolidation and reinforcement of numerous initiatives carried out over the past few years by Employment and Immigration Canada.

The programs are: Canada Works (formerly NEED Canada). LEAD (Local Employment assistance and Development), Career-Access, and Job Corps.

The programs are intended to support two basic priorities of the government's employment development strategy, namely, to create immediately jobs for the greatest number of unemployed Canadians possible and to provide them with the work experience and on-the-job training they need for the future.
