

Casey Says Bean Ball Rule A Joke

NEW YORK (AP) — Casey does not think much of the bean ball rule which would allow a \$50 fine to a pitcher who throws a ball at a batter.

"I don't think it won't be a joke," said the manager of New York Yankees, "but I think it's a joke."

The umpires are going to be more reluctant to threaten pitchers because they won't be blamed for costing the team 50 bucks."

Casey said he was officially against the new rule before the game with Cleveland on Saturday when he and manager Bobby Bragan were briefed by the four umpires, including plate umpire Stevens.

"The game begins," continued Casey, "and eventually a kid named Bell comes in to pitch for the other side. He's a little wild, you see, and he don't have too much experience. But he knows enough to throw eight balls at my third baseman's head and twice he makes Mickey Mantle skip rope."

"Every time he does this, my guys holler. 'Hey, Stevens, what about that one?'"

"This here Stevens, he don't even turn around. He just pays no attention to anyone and never even says a word to the kid pitcher. Not that I expected him to."

"After all, how much is the Cleveland club paying this kid anyway? If he gets fined \$50, he probably has to give the league all his salary. They wouldn't want to do that. The boy shouldn't play for nothing you know."

Columbus Given Game

MONTREAL (CP)—The International League baseball game between Toronto and Columbus, suspended Sunday in the sixth inning, has been awarded to Columbus league president Frank Shaughnessy announced Monday.

The Jets were leading Toronto 8-0 in the sixth inning when the game was called by a few to enable Toronto catch a plane.

Shaughnessy said the umpires' report showed Toronto guilty of "flagrant stalling" and that it was necessary to eject Maple Leafs manager Dixie Walker and coach Lou Kahn from the game.

Both were fined. Amounts of the fines were not disclosed.

Normally games suspended by curfew are continued later from the point at which they were halted. Sunday's game now goes into the records as an 8-0 win for Columbus.

No Cinch For Champs

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—National track and field champions of 1957, back to defend their laurels this weekend at the University of California's Edwards Stadium, will find it no cinch.

Villanova's Ron Delany, the Irish lad who won the Olympic 1,500-metre championship in 1956 and the National Collegiate Athletic Association mile crown last year, faces the challenge of California's Don Bowden.
