

British Parliament.

Special London cables say: During the week there were several interesting debates in Parliament. A combination of land owners on both sides forced the ministry unwillingly into restrictions of the cattle bill, and the Duke of Richmond's amendment was defeated. The bill finally passed its second reading in the original form. Dr. Playfair stated that the English form of disease was now acclimatized in Great Britain and requires restriction as much as foreign. Sun's correspondent thinks it a significant sign of the times that Brodhurst's socialistic bill, that owners of property should be compelled to sell to leaseholders, should receive such large support. The bill received 104 votes to 168 nays. "Friday," says the Tribune correspondent, "proved a field day for the bishops, who succeeded in defeating in the house of lords a sensible resolution for the opening of museums on Sunday afternoon which, without their hostile votes, would have passed. The same evening the commons came within eleven votes of passing a resolution approving of the abolition of the episcopal legislators. It was only defeated because the government opposed it, and because the government whips were tellers for the Tories. Only nine liberals outside the government opposed the resolution and 128 supported it. All the members of the government but four left the house. Sir Richard Cross sent the house into roars of laughter by his after dinner speech. Sir William Harcourt immortalized himself by declaring that the principle of the reformation could only be defended by a state church. The second reading of the reform bill was postponed from Thursday but is expected to be moved Monday by Hartington, whose leadership of the house in the absence of Gladstone has been firm and judicious. It is understood that the Tories intend to pursue that policy of indirect opposition which Gladstone before the session opened, declared would be the most dangerous. Harcourt's plump assertion in the house on Friday that the government were unable to pass any bill whatever, reinforced by Sir Charles Dilke's electrifying speech of last Saturday, plainly indicates the intention of the ministry if forced to dissolve, to appeal to the country against obstruction. Tory journals, like the Standard, admit that they cannot justify all their own party do to stop legislation, yet echo the demand for the dissolution, which is now the avowed purpose of obstruction.

Baker Pasha's Braves.

THE WARRIORS CAPTURE A CAMEL AND THE CALF OF A CAMEL. A stranger visiting the camp and fort at Trinkitat before the battle, says the Daily News correspondent, might have been betrayed into the belief that the army was never eager for battle. That is to say, if he forget for the moment how often gesticulation and chatter signify weak character, and allowed himself to be swayed by the prevailing mood. Observe the exhibition round the first Krupp gun. The weapon had to be dragged across the sheet of water which separated the camp from the fort, two or three miles off. Some sixty Egyptians helped the mules with much shouting and splashing. No sooner was it landed than the Egyptians, with their knapsacks on their backs and their nether garments either dispensed with altogether or tucked up to the waist, began dancing round the gun to valorous songs, in which Baker Pasha was praised, and the enemy consigned to perdition. The picture was comical in the extreme, if sufficiently decorous for the walls of the Royal Academy. Next afternoon and evening, after we were assembled in the mainland camp, and the force had paraded in a fairly creditable manner before the General, the scene was one of the liveliest gaiety. Any blue-jacket or "Tommy" would have joined in the fun over the army's first capture. This consisted of a baby camel and its mamma; which a cavalryman on outpost had driven in. The baby camel was carried at a trot on the shoulder of a sturdy fellow, who grinned from ear to ear at the glory of his exploit. Poor mamma required no urging. She trotted submissively after the fellow, licking her calf all the while. She went on licking, she maintained her self-possession even in the dread presence of the Pasha, when baby stood upon its straddle legs before his Excellency, and curiously stared him in the face. Allah as the Eastern say, when he tried how ugly he could create a new beast made the camel. But a baby camel is not ugly—not even in its baby hump and splay legs. Its head is positively, with large soft, mild eyes, and mouth and nostrils delicate as a young kid's. Half a battalion escorted the dam and her calf to their dinner of water and chopped straw. I suppose the warriors had nothing more serious to engage them.
