MONDAY

Mr. Roland MacDonald of Southport was re-elected President of the Third District of Queen's Liberal Association at the annual meeting on Friday night in the Legion Hall at Mt. Stewart.

The minesweeper "Malpeque" was towed back to the Bruce Stewart and Company wharf on Friday after undergoing a hull inspection and below the waterline repairs in dry-dock at Picton.

Weather permitting, the "Westmount", the second of the two minesweepers being reconditioned by the local firm under a defence contract, will be towed to Picton for a similar inspection.

Mr. H. E. MacDonald, plant manager of the Bruce Stewart Company, reported that there is a considerable amount of work to be done on the "Malpeque" and they may need additions to their staff of marine fitters and engine room artificers.

—Able Seaman Bill Linkletter, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Linkletter, Foundry Street, Summerside, arrived home on Saturday night on a 49-day leave after having done a tour of duty in Korean waters with H. M. C. S. Huron.

It is only nine months since he was last home but in that time he has seen a great deal of the world.

TUESDAY

FAMOUS COACH IN TOWN—The Walter Callow coach, which is designed to accommodate wheel chair patients, arrived in the City yesterday and it is planned to take some of the patients at the Provincial Sanatorium for a sight seeing tour this morning.

The annual collection of the local branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society will commence today. Last evening the executive and collectors, totalling 75 men and women met at a supper meeting in the Baptist Church and were allotted their districts.

In the absence of the President, Warren W. Lord, due to illness, the Secretary, R. J. Rupert presided and thanked those present for their continued co-operation, and outlined the details of the campaign. Mr. Rupert voiced the regrets of the meeting in the illness of one of the Society's most faithful workers, Mr. George S. Ryan, and expressed the hope that he would soon be restored to health.

The report of the Treasurer, Mr. Ian Burnett, showed a total of \$2,240.00 raised last year by the local branch. Mr. D. A. MacKinnon thanked the Baptist ladies for the fine banquet, and also the Pastor and Trustees for the use of the Church facilities for the meeting.

Jenkins Bros. Ltd., operators of a large cannery in Summerside are expanding their business and are opening a poultry division. A two-story wooden building, 100 by 30 feet, has been erected across Noonan Street from their cannery plant for this purpose.

They are now commencing to take in live poultry to kill, and after on they plan to handle poultry

try feed. Mr. G. F. Cameron, secretary-treasurer of the company explained that this new operation will supply the needs of their cannery which uses over a quarter of a million pounds a year. The remainder will be frozen, box packed and supplied to the Canadian and export markets.

Mr. Cameron said that in their canning plant only the bill of the hen is useless. The heads, feet and entrails are ground up for animal feed. It is then frozen in blocks and some is sold locally and the rest is shipped out of the province to animal feed manufacturers. The canning of beef will commence in the cannery today and on or about December 1st a switch will be made to chicken. — S

ELECTRIC RATES DISCUSSED—A public meeting was held in Morell on Monday night to discuss the new rates put in effect by the Maritime Electric Company. It was agreed by the meeting to appoint a committee to wait upon the Public Utilities Commission of the Province and submit the many opinions voiced at the meeting by users of this public service. Similar meetings were held at St. Peter's Bay, Carleton Place and Mt. Stewart.

The 100th anniversary of the Rebekah Degree, and the 55th birthday of the Alpha Rebekah Lodge No. 10, I. O. O. F. was celebrated by a large number of members last night.

The officers presented a most pleasing pageant depicting the aims and aspirations of the Degree, with Chaplain Estelle Dennis as reader, June Foster, soloist, and Helen G. MacEachern, P. N. G. as pianist. A social hour followed during which the birthday cake was brought in and cut by the Noble Grand Mabel Worth.

A special collection for the work among the blind of Prince Edward Island was taken during the evening.

About twenty patients from the Provincial Sanatorium thoroughly enjoyed themselves when they were taken for an outing in the Walter Callow Wheelchair Coach yesterday morning. Following a tour of the city and suburbs, these normally shut-in people were delighted when the drive took them through Hunter River and vicinity where the woods were a blaze of color in the crisp, sunny weather.

The majority of the patients taken for the drive have undergone major surgery in the past three to six months and in many cases have not been out of doors since their admittance to the Sanatorium.

In the afternoon, patients from the P. E. Island Hospital and Beach Grove were taken on a similar drive, and were accompanied by Past Noble Grand, Mrs. Helen MacEachern and Mrs. Annie Garnham of the Alpha Rebekah Lodge, No. 10. A stop was made at the Dominion Experimental Station, where Mr. Gordon Warren, horticulturist, presented a treat of apples which was much appreciated.

A pleasant half hour was spent at the home of Mrs. Catharine Smith, P.N.G., Southport, where afternoon tea was served with the best wishes of the Alpha Rebekah Lodge No. 10, I.O.O.F.

Assurance that the requirements of the Charlottetown Airport with a view to extension of landing facilities will be studied by engineers of the Federal Department of Transport has been received by Premier J. Walter Jones from the Federal Minister, Hon. Lionel Chevrier.

The Minister's communication was in reply to strong representations made by the Premier for extension of the airport. While promising that the requirements would be studied, Mr. Chevrier stated that all of the Department's large airport construction projects are determined on a basis of defense priorities. He undertook to notify Premier Jones immediately any decision is made.

The Premier, who returned home yesterday from a visit to Ottawa and the United States, said he was hopeful that the importance of the Charlottetown

Airport from the defense standpoint would be favorably considered, and emphasized that the Province is entitled to this consideration in view of the enormous expenditures incurred in defense projects elsewhere.

While in Ottawa Premier Jones also discussed the question of Hillsboro Bridge reconstruction, improved car ferry facilities and other matters.

THURSDAY

Some 6,200 persons in Prince Edward Island will qualify for the old age security pension when January, 1952, it was estimated yesterday by Major Alan Nicholson, of the Regional Office, Department of National Health, here, and Mr. R. B. Curry, National Director for Family Allowance and Old Age Security, Pensions. Mr. Curry has been in the Province for the past few days, and leaves on return to the mainland this morning.

Old age security payments by the Federal Government will amount to \$280,000 per month in this Province or \$3,120,000 a year. The Regional Office is already administering in Family Allowance about two and one-half million dollars yearly.

There was a decrease of 7,223 lbs. of lobster landed during the period January to September, inclusive, this year as compared to the same period in 1950, as revealed in figures released by the Regional Office of the Department of Fisheries yesterday. The decrease in value amounted to \$229,898.

The total weight of fish landed during the period was 271,901 lbs., a decrease of 353 lbs. from last year, with a value of \$2,029,103, a decrease of \$215,500 from 1950.

Notable Increase

One of the most notable increases was that of Irish mussel, with a total of 35,858 lbs., value \$43,472, which showed gains of \$0,222 lbs. and \$10,190 respectively. Hake also increased by 4,040 lbs. with a gain in returns of \$12,804, and cod, although 1,948 lbs. down from 1950, showed a gain in value of \$11,561. The catch in herring increased by 4,409 lbs., and the value, \$2,985.

Prince Edward Island War Veterans will line the route from the Provincial Building to City Hall via Richmond and Queen Streets in connection with the Royal visit on Friday, Nov. 9th it was learned yesterday.

The Provincial Committee has requested that the veterans assume this particular role in the visit of the Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh. It is pointed out that throughout their tour, the Royal couple have made a special effort to see and be seen by war veterans.

The Royal party will reach the Provincial Building at approximately 11:30 a. m. and will spend about twenty minutes there. From the Provincial Building they will proceed to City Hall and spend about fifteen minutes. They will then go down Queen to Water Street enroute to Government House for lunch. It is during these movements that war veterans will be required to line the above route.

A special spot has been reserved for amputees inside the hall of the Provincial Building. A letter is being sent to each amputee.

The Provincial Command of the Canadian Legion is co-operating in the above arrangements through its President, Major A. H. Peake, and Secretary, Mr. J. S. Walker. Comrade Joseph Shelton will be in charge of the street lining.

OTTAWA, Oct. 17—(Special)—T. J. Kichham, Liberal member for King's, told The Guardian today he will urge Postmaster-General Rinfret to institute a system of "supplementary benefits" for rural mail carriers at the present session.

Last session, the King's member had introduced a resolution on the House of Commons order paper urging that mail carriers across Canada be given a ten per cent increase over the average rate per mile paid in 1951. Just when this resolution got to the top of the

list. Urgent Government business intervened and it failed to come up for discussion.

Mr. Kichham said today that after discussing the terms of the resolution with senior post office officials, he had decided not to re-introduce it on the order paper. He said that while he feels now more than ever that mail carriers are underpaid and merit pay increases, geographical and other difficulties militated against a flat or average increase.

He said, however, that in view of the generally satisfactory operation of mail carriers' "supplementary benefits" in 1948, he would advocate this method of bringing the carriers' pay into reasonable brackets. To avoid discussion or mail carriers' salaries being shelved as it was last session, Mr. Kichham will speak on the subject in the throne speech debate.

FRIDAY

Mr. Walter R. Shaw (above) was elected President of the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island at the annual meeting last night at the retiring president, Mr. Wendell H. Beaton gave a most encouraging report of the year's activities, including the fact that a greater number of people attended the Club's field day and Highland gathering at Strathgarny even than attended the famous Mod at St. Ann's.

At its annual meeting last night in the Empire Theatre, the Queen's County Liberal Association reaffirmed its decision of Nov. 23, 1949, neither to recognize nor support any leader selected other than by a majority vote of the accredited delegates at a properly constituted Dominion or Provincial convention called for this purpose.

The meeting, which was largely attended, also went on record as urging that the present dual constituency of Queen's be divided into two constituencies, each represented by one member of the House of Commons.

President Pictou C. McCormac, Charlottetown, presided at the meeting, at which he was re-elected president. Mr. James L. LePage, Hunter River, was elected vice president and Mr. Arthur H. Peake was re-elected secretary.

Brief addresses were given by Premier J. Walter Jones, Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, Messrs. D. A. Macdonald, Glenfinnan, W. F. Alan Stewart, M. L. A., Cecil Miller, Liberal candidate in the recent Federal by-election, and Roland MacDonald, president of the Liberal Association for Third Queen's.

OTTAWA, Oct. 18—(Special)—W. Chester S. McLure, Conservative member for Queen's, asked Transport Minister Chevrier in the House of Commons today to give the reasons put forward by the Canadian National Railways for its refusal to accept the decision of the Board of Transport Commissioners on the Prince Edward Island freight rate structure.

In the absence from the chamber of Mr. Chevrier, his parliamentary assistant, W. M. Bendickson, said such information must be obtained from C. N. R. head-office at Montreal. He added that the information has been requested and will be brought down as soon as possible.

Mr. McLure told The Guardian

that he felt the matter was of such widespread public importance to Prince Edward Island that it should go on the official record of the House of Commons. He felt that farmers and shippers of the Province have the right to know why the decision of a judicial body such as the Transport Body can be contested by a railway company.

The special names canvassers, who will begin work today in the Canadian National Institute for the Blind campaign for funds in Prince Edward Island, met at the Charlottetown Hotel last evening with Mr. Sidney T. Green, special names chairman of Charlottetown in the chair.

Mr. W. Gordon Foster, chairman of the P. E. I. Advisory Board to the C. N. U. B. outlined the need for the services of this organization in helping more than 160 blind men, women and children in this Province, as well as in the prevention of blindness programs.

Attending the meeting were Mr. R. B. Gandy, field secretary from Truro, N. S. and Mr. G. E. Wood, P. E. I. field secretary, both of whom are blind and have been engaged in carrying out the Institute's program in the Island this year. Mr. Wood spoke briefly, stating that the \$6,200 required in this campaign was to be spent in the Institute's current program in P. E. I.

OTTAWA, Oct. 18—(Special)—In a maiden speech which won him congratulations from members of all parties in the Commons, J. Angus MacLean, Conservative member for Queen's, today appealed for a fair deal for Prince Edward Island at the hands of Federal authorities, a sound program of national defence and serious steps to fight inflation.

In urging the government to encourage defence industries in the Maritime Provinces, Mr. MacLean contended such a program is vital to the overall defence plan of the nation. Referring to government support of the St. Lawrence seaway in the throne speech, he urged that priority over the St. Lawrence should be given the Passamaquoddy power development in New Brunswick.

Speaking from his experience as a World War II flier, the new Queen's member argued that it is impossible to properly defend an intense concentration of industry such as exists today in the two Central Provinces. It proved impossible for the Germans to deny the industrial Ruhr Valley against Allied bombing attacks, he recalled. Today, Toronto and Montreal are potential enemy targets, and there is real danger of a large part of Canada's population and key industries being wiped out by atomic bombing.
