HISTORIC HALL Until it was destroyed by German bombs in 1941 the Great Hall of Gray's Inn at London had been a legal landmark for 400 years.

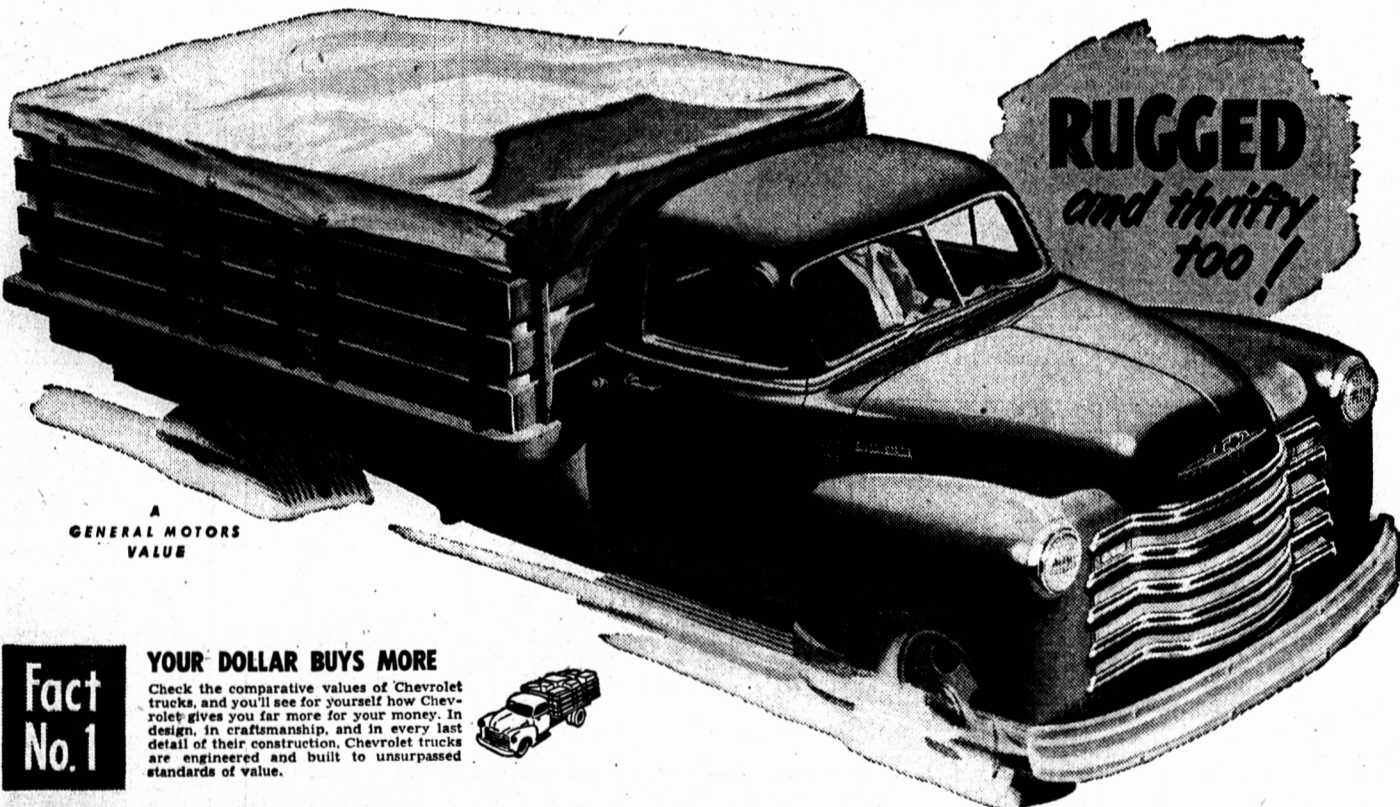
