NEW YORK

NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market failed to hold a small early rise Wednesday and prices ended lower on reduced volume. Lukens Steel, which made a sensational rise of 9 1/2 Tuesday, dropped 4 1/2 as the company denied rumors of a merger or stock split.

Coppers continued to make moderate progress in response to the latest price increase for the metal. The motor stocks were down slightly and American Motors was off 1 1/2 in active trading. Some tobacco, oils and selected issues, including a good representation of lower priced stocks, made gains. The losing side included steels, airlines and aircrafts.

The crash of the American Airlines electra turbo-prop plane at New York had little effect on American Airlines stock. It dropped 1/2. Lockheed, which makes the Electra, dipped 3/4 in light dealings.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks fell 80 cents to \$216.20. Among Canadian stocks, McIntyre Porcupine dropped 2 points and Aluminum Ltd. 4. Granby Mining added 3/4, Hudson Bay Mining 3/4 and Dome Mines 1/4.

On the American Stock Exchange, Molybdenite and Fargo Oil (up 1/2) improved in the Canadian list. Others were mostly unchanged.
