Irvine, Senior Fieldman for the Dominion Department of Agriculture outlined the Sow Unit policy sponsored jointly by the Federal and Provincial Departments of Agriculture. The objective of this policy is to establish more firmly hog production as a permanent phase of mixed farming. The meeting proved of considerable interest and of educational value to those who attended. Considerable discussion took place on breeding, feeding and marketing livestock. The Glenwood meeting was one of a series that have been held in the Richmond, St. Chrysostom, Palmer Road and Lot 7 districts.—S.

Currencies

NEW YORK, June 27 (AP)—The Swiss franc jumped sharply today while money experts searched for possible effects on world currency by the United States senate's action on devaluation and silver.

A jump of .02 3-4 cent in the Swiss unit to 22 56 1-2 in terms of the United States dollar, some bankers said, might be a prelude to the return of part of the gold which was taken out of Switzerland when Europe was shaken last spring and fell by threats of war.

Sterling advanced 1-16 to 4.68 1-4 and the French franc 1-16 point to 2.65. The belga was unchanged while the Canadian dollar picked up 1-32 cent to 7-32 per cent discount.

"Angels With Dirty Faces" Dramatic Hit Opening Today At Capitol, Summerside

James Cagney and Pat O'Brien co-starred, and such stars as the "Dead End" kids, Humphrey Bogart, Ann Sheridan and George Bancroft are the chief supporting players in "Angels With Dirty Faces," a thrilling, stark, grim and yet intensely moving Warner Bros. melodrama which opens today at the Capitol Theatre.

In this production, the inmate Jimmy returns to the type of role which first brought him fame and in which the public has always liked him best. He is again a gangster, a killer, a grim, ruthless, scientific dynamite personality of the type that he alone has been able to make completely convincing on the screen.

"Angels With Dirty Faces" however, cannot be adequately described as simply a "gangster picture." While it has thrilling scenes of murderous combat between its central character and his underworld enemies and also depicts him in one of its most effective sequences, standing at bay a virtual army of policemen, its interest goes far beyond such episodes.

It is a biography of the tough youth played by Cagney, carrying him from his boyhood to the electric chair. At the same time it contrasts his life with that of the character played by Pat O'Brien.

The latter, just as bad in his boyhood as Jimmy, studies for the priesthood and eventually becomes priest in the parish in which he and Jimmy were boys.

In effect, the priest and the criminal are contesting with each other for the souls of these boys. And this leads to one of the most effective climaxes ever depicted on the screen.
