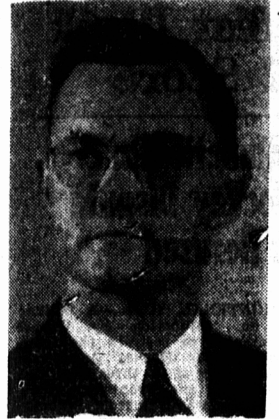

NEW YORK, (AP) - Men are cowards, says Miss Schlaparelli, French fashion designer, because they're afraid to depart from the well-trodden rut in their habits of dress. Schlaparelli thinks men should wear bright-colored dinner jackets and light, comfortable evening shirts, maybe with ruffles. She advocates daring in sports clothes and draws the line only at shorts for business wear. In the city and during business hours, she contends, men look better in regular suits. If they wear shorts, she asks, what are they going to do about those hairy legs?

These remarks came at a luncheon celebrating the coming of age of Schlaparelli Inc., a sort of omnibus corporation co-ordinating all the various interests of this small, Italian-born designer in the United States market. The magic of the Schlaparelli name, it has been found, will sell almost anything, from children's snow suits to men's neckties. This astute business woman discovered a long ago as 1936 that the public loves big names.

In her new French-American corporation, Schlaparelli is working with a group of "affiliates" who are U.S. manufacturers. She does the designing; they produce and market the product. Everything bears her signature. Schlaparelli sees no limit to her enterprises, believes that everything we use, from toothpaste to garbage pails, could be improved by good design. Her immediate aim, she says, is to design a complete co-ordinated wardrobe for every man, woman and child in the United States.

Truman Refuses To Testify

WASHINGTON, (AP) - Harry S. Truman subpoenaed from the House of Representatives committee on un-American activities Thursday and manoeuvres to force the former president to testify on the Harry Dexter White "Soviet spy" case collapsed.

In polite yet strong terms, Truman told the committee by letter that for him to obey the subpoena would shatter the constitutional doctrine of presidential independence of Congress and make the president "a mere arm of the legislative branch of the government." Chairman Harold Velde (Rep.-Ill.) said the committee has no intention of trying to compel the former president to appear, though he said the former president has "a sacred duty to co-operate in all every man, woman and child in the United States."

The committee voted late in the day to invite Attorney-General Herbert Brownell to testify on the White case. Velde said afterwards Brownell had accepted the invitation, for a date still to be determined.

A resolution by the Queen's County Fish and Game Association passed at a meeting last night held in the Agricultural Hall of the Vocational School recommended "That the Provincial Executive Council of the P. E. Island Fish and Game Protective Association hold a province-wide plebiscite to determine the opening date on migratory birds and upland game that is satisfactory."

Mr. George F. Boyer, Wild Life Managing Officer for Maritime Provinces gave a most interesting and instructive talk on Canadian Wildlife Services in the Maritimes, profusely illustrated with colored slides. The speaker dealt in detail with the habits, breeding, feeding and development of waterfowl and upland game. Marks of identification of the various types of such birds were easily discerned in the

colored slides accompanying the talk. Deep interest was evident in the talk and showing as indicated in the question period which followed, taken part in by Messrs. F.A.S. Jones, Spurgeon Jenkins, Harold Shaw, Frank Acorn, H. E. Vessey, A. F. Calder and others. A resolution of appreciation was conveyed to the speaker on motion of Mr. Tom M. Lethian, seconded by Mr. Calder and unanimously supported. The slides were shown by Mr. Roger Gardham of the National Film Board.

A vote of appreciation was extended by Mr. B. Graham Rogers for conducting the Radio Forum for the F. and G. Assn., accompanied by a gift of \$25.00. The meeting, which was well attended, was presided over by Mr. E. K. MacNutt, President of the Association.

STRATFORD, Ont. (CP) - Health Minister Frank Bell of Manitoba said Thursday a preventive vaccine for polio may be developed and in general use in a year or two.

He said in an interview that if such a vaccine is brought into use soon a medical science must concentrate on heart diseases, the greatest disease killer.

He said gamma globulin has played an important part in holding down the polio death rate in Manitoba this year. Of the 2,280 persons stricken in the province only 23 died.

Icebreaker Sails For Labrador

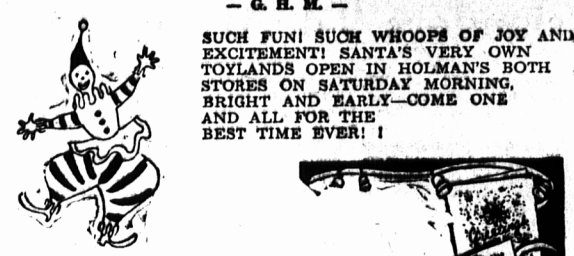
