## Over-The-Top Campaign Delights PCH Officials

SUMMERSIDE — Harry T. Holman was re-elected president of the Prince County Hospital board at the 53rd annual meeting of the hospital here last night.

Elected first vice president was R.S. Hinton, Summerside; second vice president, Mrs. Aden P. Mulligan, Kinkora; and third vice president, J.C. Gorrill, Summerside. J. Logan of Summerside was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Mr. Holman in giving his report for the past year said "I have been extremely busy in all phases of hospital work".

The president said that outpatient treatments, lab and radiology procedures showed a substantial increase over the previous year.

Mr. Holman related that the board of trustees spent a great deal of time investigating costs and methods of financing an expansion program after a continuing over-crowded situation existed.

ENCOURAGING  
"A preliminary investigation, carried out by some members of the board early in 1964, was so encouraging that it was felt that we should proceed with the project. Permission was obtained from the hospital services commission to conduct a campaign for funds", he said.

"Federal and provincial health grants were available to us only if we (the communities involved) could produce our share of the estimated cost. The minimum amount required from the general public was \$250,000, a staggering amount", he said.

Mr. Holman expressed pleasure in reporting that, not only did the board meet the minimum objective of \$250,000 but exceeded it. The total of the campaign fund now stands at \$300,500 consisting of cash and pledges.

"The response to the campaign was most gratifying to the trustees", remarked Mr. Holman. "Cash contributions and payments received on pledges have been invested with the P.E.I. government at five per cent. These funds are earning for us and will be readily available when required".

A LONG WAY  
"The hospital planning board has come a long way to see our goal achieved", said Mr. Hinton, delivering his report last night while chairman of the board before being elected first vice president. "It took 18 months from the time of com-

menecement to complete renovations", he said.

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## Store Site Motion Is Passed

SUMMERSIDE — The local Board of Trade at a special meeting here last night to discuss the tense situation caused over the government's announcement of the site of the liquor outlet on Granville Street, passed a motion "that the board advertise for sites available for the proposed store and a committee be appointed to screen the results or the advertisement in regard to size, location and asking price to these sites".

This motion came as a result of a suggestion by the liquor control board in Charlottetown yesterday when a delegation from here, headed by Earl Cannon, chairman of the Regional High School Board, met with this branch of the provincial government to strongly protest the government's choice of site.

Mr. Cannon told the meeting last night that Premier Shaw had expressed concern about the new location of the liquor outlet as did the provincial minister of education, Hon. George Dewar and Hon. M. A. Farmer, the attorney-general.

The reason for the uproar over this site is that it is situated too near the schools and sports facilities on Granville Street. Both the Regional High School and the Prince County Vocational School along with a sports complex are situated only a short distance from this liquor outlet site.

Mr. Cannon announced last night that if construction doesn't cease today another meeting of the ratepayers will be held this evening to discuss further moves in their attempt to thwart the erection of this outlet.

## Six-Month Term Handed Huestis

SUMMERSIDE — A 12-man petit jury yesterday found Derwin Bell Huestis of Cape Traverse guilty on a charge of failing to stop at the scene of an accident where a man was injured and presiding judge, Mr. Justice R. R. Bell of Charlottetown, sentenced the man to six months in Prince County jail.

Huestis was also prohibited by Judge Bell from driving a vehicle on the highways of Canada for a period of one year beginning yesterday.

This was the first case on the docket of the May sitting of the Supreme Court in Prince County and it was a retrial from the November sessions. In November the trial ended with a "hung" jury and retrial was ordered.

A total of 12 witnesses were called by crown prosecutor George R. McMahon over the two-day trial while defence counsel Alexander B. Campbell presented no witnesses for the defence.

The jury, headed by foreman Norman Hogg of Summerside, deliberated for approximately 45 minutes before bringing in the guilty verdict.

DIED LATER  
The charge arose from a highway incident July 14, 1964, in which James Archibald MacKenzie of Charlottetown was critically injured and subsequently died after being transferred to Prince County Hospital.

The final two crown witnesses heard yesterday were RCMP constable Alan Burchill of the

Borden detachment, the investigating officer; and St. Peter Stanley Gaze of the RCMP crime detection laboratory in Sackville, N.B.

An amendment to the original charge against Huestis was made yesterday by the crown. The original charge read that "being the driver of a vehicle, did unlawfully fail to stop said vehicle" following an accident and it was changed to "having care, charge and control of a vehicle, did unlawfully fail to stop," etc.

In passing down sentence Judge Bell said "it is a serious matter to have an accident on the highway and beat it from the scene".

He told the accused "I do not think you are a criminal, deliberately breaking the laws of the land. You may have a liquor problem but that is your own doing".

SHOWS LENIENCY  
He added "I'm inclined to be easy. I feel a term in Dorchester would not help anyone anyway".

Other members of the jury were: John Rayner, Howland, Charles Frost, Enmore; Ernest Callbeck, Summerside RR; J. Alden Moase, Kensington; Alan Clow, FreeTown; William Macdonald, Coleman; Leith Clark, St. Eleonors James E. Milligan, Northam; Gerald Glover, Spring Valley; Parker Crockett, Summerside, and Emanuel Ross, MacNeill's Mills.

A Summerside man, Joseph Roger Gallant, was arraigned before Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell on a charge of "break and enter with intent to commit theft and entered a place of guilty".

The accused pleaded not guilty to a first count of break, enter and theft and the crown consented to a dismissal of this count.

Both the crown prosecutor George R. MacMahon and defence counsel J. Melvin Campbell addressed the court before the chief justice remanded Gallant for sentencing to Thursday, May 27.

Court was then adjourned to this morning at 10:30 when the trial of Donald Joseph Gallant, 16, of Bloomfield Corner, charged with failing to stop following an accident, will open. The accused, who is represented by G. Bruce MacDonald, entered a not guilty plea on the opening day of the session.

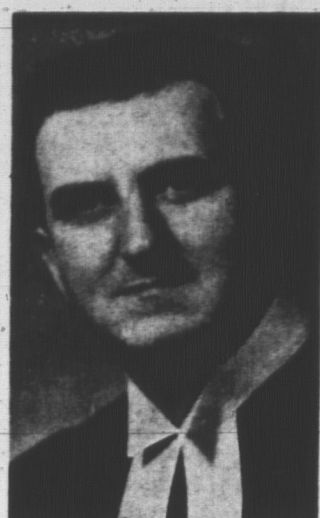
