IN MEMORIAM

MRS. MARGARET STEWART The people of Kingsboro and adjacent communities were saddened recently in the passing of the oldest resident of the area. The death occurred at the Souris Hospital on September 17, of Mrs. Merrill Stewart, in her 89th year.

Mrs. Stewart, the former Margaret Robertson, was born in Red Point, December 7, 1865, the daughter of the late Duncan and Margery Robertson. She was a lifetime resident of this area, and was the wife of the late Merrill Stewart who predeceased her by ten years.

She will be greatly missed in the community, for although she has been in failing health for some months she never completely lost the use of her faculties, and her mind was clear to the very last.

She was always keenly interested in the people and activities of the community, and there was very little that escaped her attention. She was a wonderful conversationalist, and her ready wit made her a favorite with young and old.

She will be most deeply missed by Robert Yates, to whom she has been virtually a mother, and with whom she has made her home in recent years.

Not only was she the oldest resident of the community but was also the member of the longest standing in the East Point Baptist Church, in which she was an ardent worker. She will long be remembered for her part in the preparation of the historical sketch of the East Point Baptist Church, which was produced at the time of its Centennial Celebrations some years ago. She also had the distinction of being a life member of the Women's Missionary Society of that church.

One of her greatest community interests was the Women's Institute of which she was a life member. She always looked forward with great interest to the monthly meeting.

The many floral tributes and cards and letters was held.

The funeral services were conducted from her late residence by Rev. Donald McClare, assisted by Rev. H. R. Bell, a former pastor and longtime friend of the deceased. The hymns, by her own request, were, "There is a Gate that Stands Ajar," and "My Heavenly Home is Bright and Fair." Interment was in the Kingsboro cemetery.

Controversy On Debate Delay In McCarthy Case

The action of U.S. Senate leaders in delaying until after the Nov. 2 congressional elections the debate on whether to censure Senator Joseph McCarthy has aroused almost as much controversy as that surrounding the senator himself.

Critics are saying that Republican majority leader William F. Knowland and the others who agreed to the delay were ducking because so many senators didn't want to vote one way or the other during the election campaign. They think the decision was primarily influenced by politics, and that the Republicans felt they couldn't stand another long display of division of the sort that was revealed during the army-McCarthy hearing.

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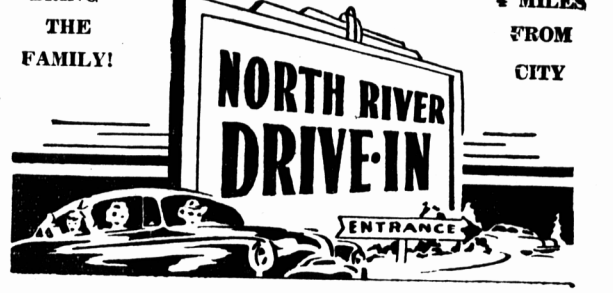
LONG DEBATE POSSIBLE

The fact is that the censure committee has gone further than most people expect in actually recommending Senate action against McCarthy. Instead of merely assembling what it considered the most pertinent facts and allowing the members to pass judgement themselves.

Senate censure is a serious matter, as witness the fact it has occurred only three times. McCarthy has already announced his intention of a strong floor fight, during which he will be able to say anything he wishes, including the words that were gravelled out of his mouth by Senator Arthur Watkins, the committee chairman, during the hearings. The debate can last indefinitely.

Many men in McCarthy's position would consider it prudent to walk softly pending the Senate fight. A man under charges is not usually at his political best, unless he can appear before the public as a martyr. McCarthy's ability for offensive defence is so widely recognized that he probably couldn't do that, and probably wouldn't want to. It he does anything at all, he'll be more likely to take the bull by the horns.

The leftist Mexican muralist, thrown out of the party a quarter century ago for criticizing Marxism after a long visit to Soviet Russia, was re-admitted to membership at a closed week-end meeting of the Communist national convention.
