

New Quebec Mill To Boost Pulp, Paper Production

MONTREAL (CP)—Pulp and paper production in northern Quebec will get a shot in the arm with construction of a \$62,500,000 pulp mill by Dominion Tar and Chemical Co. Ltd. at Label-sur-Quevillon.

An initial construction contract of \$7,000,000 was awarded Thursday and by early 1967 the mill will be turning out 550 tons of high quality bleached kraft pulp for use by Domtar subsidiaries and the excess for export to Europe and the United States.

The company also must build a town to house the 300 persons to be employed in the mill and the dependants of another 1,200 employees required for wood-harvesting operations.

The present economy of the area, 300 miles northwest of Montreal, is based on sawmills, from which the new mill will purchase chips.

The mill will be the largest bleached kraft pulp mill in Eastern Canada using a continuous digester process.

sleeping quarters and other catering facilities the company has constructed the isolated workers. The nearest town, Senneville, is 50 miles away.

However, the new mill is not Domtar's only project under way at present, but part of a \$100,000,000 expansion program in Ontario and Quebec.

At the company's Windsor, Que. pulp mill, modifications are being made to the pulping process to increase its daily capacity to 250 tons a day from 70 tons and a new bleach plant will increase bleaching capacity to 500 tons a day from 125.

A seventh paper machine is being installed at the Cornwall, Ont. mill and will be completed next year. The machine will have an annual capacity of 80,000 tons and will be used, mainly to produce heavy offset papers, tobacco board and paper products with allied uses.

At Red Rock, Ont., the company has designed a new alkaline pulping system which will increase the pulping and container-board capacity at the mill.

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CONTRACT BRIDGE

West dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

NORTH

♠ A Q 8 5

The bidding: West North East South
1 ♠ 2 ♦ 4 ♠ 5 ♠

Opening lead — queen of spades.

When declarer goes down in a contract he could have made it. It is usually because he did not know how the defenders' cards were distributed. This problem of figuring out how the adverse cards are divided usually represents the most important single element of a declarer's skill.

In today's hand it is not really difficult to make twelve tricks if you see the opponents' cards. The trick is to make them without this advantage.

Actually the contract should be made with or without the benefit of seeing the East-West cards. Careful play will do the job.

South wins the spade lead in

dummys and clearly must tackle trumps at once. Common prudence dictates that he should lead the ace of diamonds first, not a low one to the queen.

The missing diamonds are the J-10-9. If they are divided 2-3 or 3-1, either diamond play would work out all right, but if they are divided 4-0, only the ace is the right play. This guards against East's having four trumps; if West has four trumps, not even a doctor can help.

When West shows out, declarer continues the suit, winning the ten with the queen. A heart to the queen is followed by another diamond. South taking the five with the seven and continuing with the king.

The king of hearts followed by the ace — in the hope of finding a 3-3 division — then reveals that the contract depends on whether two club losers can be avoided. If the clubs are divided 3-2, there is no possible difficulty, so the assumption is made that they are divided 4-1.

East cannot have four clubs because West would then have had one club, no diamonds, two hearts, and hence ten spades — impossible on the bidding. Accordingly, West is credited with four clubs.

On this basis, declarer leads a low club to the ace, catching the ten. He then plays a club towards the K-4-5. Regardless of what West does, he makes only one club trick.
