Local and Other Items.

BIG THINGS EXPECTED.—Harry Lydiard expects that Warren Guy will trot in better than 2.10 next year. His injuries are not so serious as at first believed.

CALLED TO TRURO.—R G Strathe, of Newport, Hants Co, has been called by St. Andrew's Pre-byterian Church, Truro, to succeed Rev Thos Cumming, resigned.

ANOTHER NEW PAPER.—The Printer and Publisher says: "There are rumors of a new Liberal daily to be started shortly in Halifax N S. Local politicians are behind the venture, and \$100,000 capital has been subscribed. No definite particulars have been given out yet, but it is said that the new journal will make its appearance before the beginning of the year."

ENCOURAGING LOVE MATCHES.—It is announced that the women of Kansas have started to raise five million dollars with which to reimburse Howard Gould for the amount which he lost (according to his father's will) by marrying the actress, Katherine Clemons. "They will raise the money," says a despatch, "by means of church socials and home-talent entertainments. The idea of the projectors is to encourage love matches and to show their approval of Mr Gould's financial sacrifice to marry the woman of his choice. It is expected that the women's clubs throughout the country will take up the matter."

BAD STATE OF AFFAIRS.—It was an old joke with travellers that the vesselmen making Havana, started by the odor of the city. Mr Wm Prensail, of the Tuckett tobacco factory, has just returned to Hamilton from a business trip to the tobacco fields, and he reports Havana in a horrible condition of unsanitary neglect. The people are dying of yellow fever in the streets, and those who escape the fever are starving to death. The Spanish authorities, preparing to evacuate Cuba, are grabbing everything in sight. The prices of food are prohibitive. Mr Prensail warns Canadian against immigration to the Island. It is in no condition to receive visitors.

WEATHER IN THE WEST. The Minister of the Interior is in receipt of information from various parts of the west dealing with the condition of the crops. The request for this enquiry came from the office of the high commissioner in London on Monday of this week and the following correspondence in the matter fully indicates the situation:—

SIFTON.

A MEMORIAL.—The Halifax Herald reports that a very handsome stone is to be erected to the memory of the late Sir John Thompson in Holy Cross cemetery, from a design made by Phillippe Hebert, the well known sculptor. The sarcophagus will be made from a solid block of granite weighing eight tons. The contract was let by tender. Tenders were received from the principle marble cutters in Canada, and the contract was awarded to the firm of Griffin and Keltie, Barrington street. The tomb will be of cruciform shape. It was the intention to have placed at one of the ends a large bronze medallion of the late distinguished statesman, surrounded by maple leaves, but it was found that the green mould from the bronze would deface the polished granite, and that part of the design will not be carried out. The firm hope to have the sarcophagus finished before the end of the year. When dressed it will weigh about seven tons. It will be eight feet long, and five feet wide. The entire tomb will be polished with the exception of the base. There will be a massive cross cut from the marble, extending from one end of the tomb to the other. The structure will be about four feet high, including base, and will be one of the finest of its kind in Canada. The name will be carved at the foot of the tomb. On the base of the cross will be the word "Credo."

IMPROVED CONDITIONS.

A Better Outlook for Newfoundland.

St. John's, Nfld, Oct 27.—The business outlook this fall exhibits unusual buoyancy. The season's fishery operation have been fairly successful and in every case where the catch is short, it has been more than compensated for, according to last year's returns, by the much better price given for the staple. For instance, we know of a man who arrived here yesterday from the north. His catch this season has been but slightly better than last year's yet the improved price represents a gain of \$300 to him. When to that there is added the cheapness of provisions, it is easy to see that the fisherman is the gainer at both ends of the market this season, and thus the difference is made between a necessary condition and a prosperous one. A feature which also operates to the general betterment is the fact that there are no old stocks of fish on hand this fall and consequently there is a brisk demand for every "cod's tail" taken from the water this season. This enables planters and fisherfolk to dispose of their catch readily and for cash, instead of having, as in the past years, to beg dealers to take it and then accept half cash and half goods in payment. A brisk trade is expected by shopkeepers and cash stores this fall, and this condition must stimulate the whole trade of the colony. One good thing will result from the improved condition of our people, and that is that the government will be relieved of the necessity of providing relief in any quantity, for on the whole the circumstances of our people will be rendered unnecessary, a fact which must be hailed with satisfaction to everybody.

COMMERCIAL TRAVELLERS
