34 To Leave By Air To Join U. N. Force

OTTAWA CP—Four officers and 30 men will leave Friday from Montreal by RCAF aircraft to serve with the United Nations Emergency Force, army headquarters said Thursday.

The group, including administrative and support personnel, is in addition to more than 450 such troops scheduled to leave on the aircraft carrier Magnificent from Halifax Saturday.

The officers are Maj. Malcolm Jack, Halifax; Capt. Albert Hollet, Boucherville, Que.; Capt. Thomas Alexander, Camp Borden, Ont.; and Capt. Reginald Watts, Ottawa.

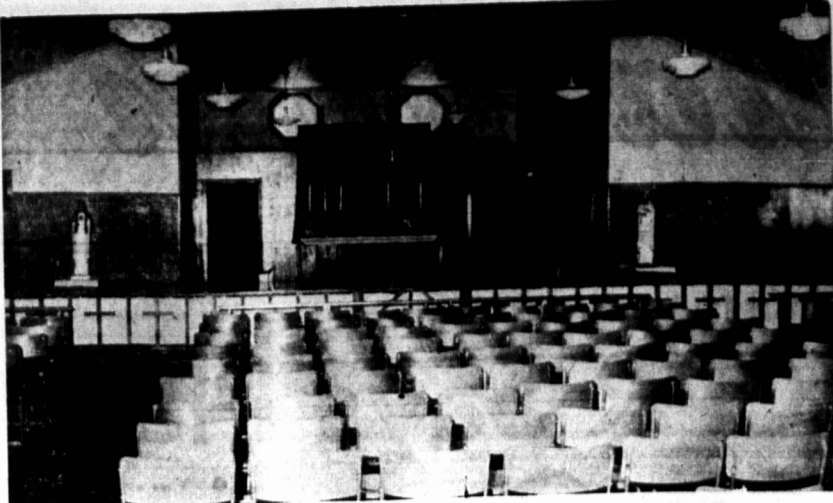

Egypt To Begin Clearing South End of Canal Today

PORT SAID, Egypt AP—United Nations and Egyptian spokesmen announced Thursday that the first work in removing the stoppers from the southern entrance to the Suez Canal would start today.

Egyptian and Swedish salvage ships will begin work on "three or four major obstacles blocking the canal" at Suez Lt.-Gen. Raymond A. Wheeler UN chief of the clearing operation announced. His statement was confirmed by a spokesman for Egypt's Suez Canal Authority.

Wheeler, through the UN office in Cairo, announced earlier that Egypt had agreed the UN salvage fleet could begin at once on opening the southern entrance to the canal which has been closed to Middle East oil shipments for nearly two months.

Wheeler's announcement gave an indication that Egypt had renounced its stand against permitting the large British and French salvage fleet at Port Said to work at El Cap.

AIDES ARRIVE
Andrew Cordier and Alfred G. Katzin two of the chief aides of UN Secretary-General Dag Ham-

markjold arrived in the Suez Canal zone for consultations on that and other problems. They conferred with Wheeler and Maj.-Gen. E.L.M. Burns, UN Emergency Force commander.

The official Egyptian position had been that no clearance operations south of Port Said would be permitted until Israeli forces withdrew from Egypt.

A responsible Egyptian reiterates that stand even after an announcement that Hammarkjold and Egyptian Foreign Minister Mahmoud Fawzi had reached an agreement.

Cairo newspapers reported that Egyptian technicians already have begun clearing channels at Ismailia and Suez.

Three British and French ships with Egypt's agreement are at work removing wrecks from Port Said harbor.

The remainder of the British-French salvage of eight ships at Port Said remained idle.

The bulk of the UN salvage fleet which may total 20 to 30 ships chartered from neutral countries is at Port Said. No UN salvage ships have been able to go farther than El Cap the former ceasefire line about 25 miles south of Port Said.

Abdel Latif Elboghadi minister of planning who has been given over-all charge of Port Said affairs by Nasser arrived in Port Said Thursday with 100 engineers.

Mustafa Abduba undersecretary for municipal affairs said an immediate start would be made on providing new accommodation for the city's 12,000 homeless.

Meanwhile V.K. Krishna Menon Indian minister without portfolio arrived in Cairo for further talks with Nasser on the Suez dispute.

The foreign office in London announced that Hammarkjold is inquiring into the fate of 2nd Lieut. Anthony Moorhouse, British officer kidnapped by Egyptians and reported dead in Port Said.

Britain also has asked the Swiss government to find out the facts concerning the 21-year-old officer's death.

Moorhouse's death was reported by Col. Cyril Banks, a British Member of Parliament, who had visited Cairo for talks with Nasser concerning the soldier.

Destructive Fire At Orwell Yesterday

Fire yesterday morning completely destroyed a large, newly remodelled and well equipped barn, owned and used for the housing of swine by Mr. Eugene McKenna on his farm in Orwell.

Also lost in the blaze were three large pigs, four small ones, and a sow. Origin of the fire as yet is unknown.

The fire was discovered shortly after 9 o'clock and due to the presence of dry bedding and a lot of straw, the flames quickly enveloped the whole building. The building itself was situated between the house and other farm buildings and only ten feet from another large barn and a stack of grain. Mr. McKenna stated, after the blaze, that only for the continued efforts of the neighbors, who quickly gathered, and the absence of a wind, all would have been lost. Ever as it was, some of the asphalt shingles and the eaves of the other barn were badly burned.

A water system had been placed in the barn only a short time ago and electrical wiring of the building was finished last week. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

Canada And U.S. In Salmon Pact

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada and the United States today formally sign an agreement for the joint protection and conservation of the \$15,000,000-a-year west coast pink salmon run.

The agreement, worked out between representatives of the two countries here last October, places the pinks under the jurisdiction of the International Pacific Salmon Fisheries Commission. The commission already regulates the \$5,900,000-a-year Pacific sockeye salmon industry.

Fisheries Minister Sinclair will sign for Canada and Livingston Merchant, U.S. ambassador to Canada, will sign for his country. For Canada it will be the eighth fisheries convention; most of the others are conventions with the U.S.

The agreement was reached with the U.S. after Canadian fisheries authorities warned that unregulated fishing of the pinks might wipe them out.

TOOK 70 PER CENT
In the past U.S. fishermen took almost 70 per cent of the pinks which spawn in the Fraser River and pass through Canadian and U.S. territorial waters. But in recent years Canadian fishermen have increased their share of the catch.

The commission now will seek to maintain pink salmon stocks at the maximum level of productivity and to ensure, so far as possible, an equal division of the catch between Canadian and U.S. fishermen.

Under the agreement the commission will launch a seven-year investigation through research agencies of both countries of the salmon stocks entering the Fraser. It is hoped this will point the way to the future steps necessary to conserve the pink runs.

Island, the milk producer was receiving a much higher percentage of the consumer dollar than in any other place. He suggested that producers need not concern themselves with what processors were getting.

SUGGEST UNION
The suggestion by A.B. MacRae that farmers organize a Milk Producers' Union was met with mixed feelings by those present. Several instances of discrepancies in payment by a minority group of processors were disclosed by different processors present.

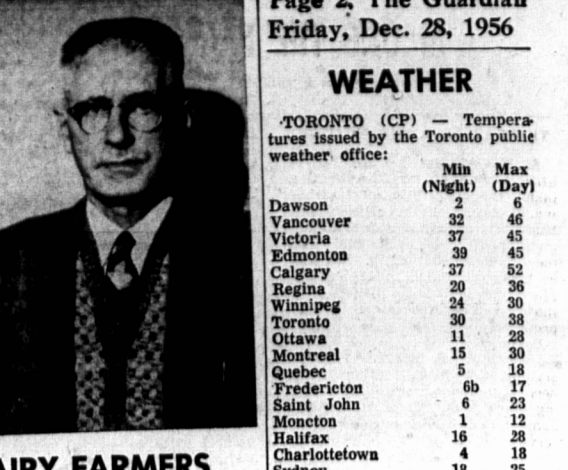
Mr. MacRae said he knew of certain farmers who were being paid for a test 9.8 per cent less than what the government test was. He said quite often the producer could say nothing because he would be told to take his milk some other place if the complaint reached the processor.

He felt that a number of these discrepancies could be remedied if there was a strong regulating body. Other irregularities brought to light included the practice of a couple of processors offering bonuses to stores in return for giving them their trade. This bonus would take the place of a case of chocolate milk or otherwise, it was alleged.

Few Carrozzas "Horse-Buggies" Left In Rome

ROME (AP)—A sleepy old nag named Fury dozes in front of St. Peter's Basilica in the shafts of one of Rome's famous "horse-buggies" and nary a customer in sight.

Perched atop the glittering, brass-trimmed contraption, muffled in blankets and overcoats, old Pietro Lucantonio dozes, too.

He had a glorious hope recently—a dream of an Italy stripped of cars and buses by the Suez gasoline shortage, of a city turning carrozzellas for transport. The dream soon faded.

"If I get one customer this morning I'll be lucky—and more likely it'll be one all day," he says.

There are 115 jingling carrozzas left in Rome today where more than 1,000 operated before the war. None has been built for years. No youngsters are taking in the trade.

Mayor Umberto Tupini of Rome has promised the buggy-men they won't starve.

"We've got to see the carrozzas are kept on the road," he says. "They're as much a part of trad-

Four Men Are Indicted In Oil Map Theft Case In The U.S.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—A federal grand jury Thursday indicted four men for conspiracy in connection with the theft from Gulf Oil Corp. of geological oil maps whose value was termed "fabulous." Two geologists were named as co-conspirators, but not indicted.

The 19-member grand jury returned the indictment after a two-hour session in which it heard two key government witnesses, including a former Gulf Oil geologist named as the employee who stole the maps.

He is 47-year-old Thomas W. Smith, a life-long resident of Pittsburgh. Smith had been employed by Gulf for 25 years before being dismissed last January.

The grand jury presentation referred to Smith and John Marvin Leivia, 34, Orange, Tex., geologist, as "unindicted co-conspirators."

Indicted on charges of conspiring to transport stolen property—maps—in interstate commerce were: Odie Richard Seagraves, 70, well-known Houston, Tex., oil and natural gas promoter.

Irving Milner, about 40, formerly of New York and now believed to be somewhere in Canada, the government says.

Emanuel Lester, also known as Emanuel Lieberman, 32, of New York, serving a prison term for attempted extortion of slain financier Serge Rubenstein.

Edward Lieberman, 30, of New York, brother of Emanuel and president of the U.S. Tackless Corp., New York carpet firm.

All but Milner were arrested by FBI agents in New York Dec. 18 when the bizarre cast first came to light.

Leivia was arrested at the same time on a similar charge. U.S. Attorney D. Malcolm Anderson said he would request that the charge against Leivia be dropped.

Anderson said the action will be taken because Leivia co-operated with the government.

The federal prosecutor said no charges have been brought against Smith, and he and Leivia "may or may not be charged in the future."
