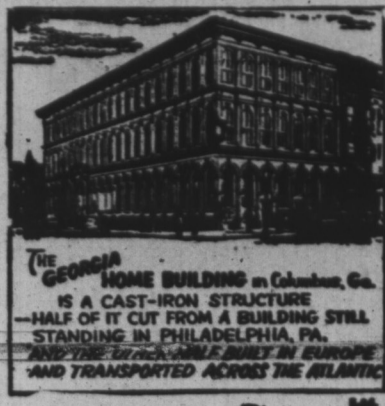

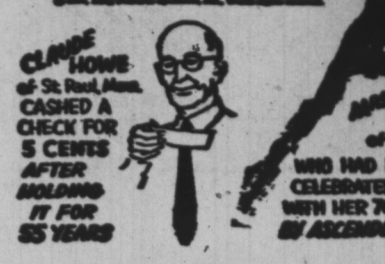

CONTRACT BRIDGE

All their ideas on the art of bidding are presented in a book just published titled Bridge is a Partnership Game. Replete with illustrations and hands taken from actual play, the book makes quite interesting reading.

Roth and Stone were teammates of mine when we won the Masters Team of Four Championship in Pittsburgh in 1957. We played this hand against a Canadian team in one of the final rounds.

At the table where I was playing with Crawford, our opponents staggered into a four spade contract with the East-West cards, and with everything breaking favorably, the Canadians scored the 420-point game. It looked like a bad result for us.

But when Roth and Stone held the East-West cards, they produced a pyrotechnic display that more than overcame our theoretical loss.

Roth trap-passed South's light opening bid. North stretched a point to bid one notrump. When this rolled around to Roth, he doubled North, afraid of a penalty pass, tried to rescue with two clubs, doubted by Stone. North then ran to two hearts which Roth heartlessly ("doubled).

As if things were not bad enough for the Canadians, Roth led the queen of diamonds. Declarer naturally thought the lead was from Q.J. He won with the king and finessed the nine at trick two. Stone won and made the best return of a trump. By the time the dust had lifted South found himself down four—minus 1,100.

Alvin Roth and Tobias Stone have been playing together in tournaments for nigh onto twenty years, and during that time have developed a bidding partnership which has become known as the Roth-Stone System.

They have contributed more new and revolutionary and workable ideas to the language of bidding than any other pair in the country. That their system stands up under the rigors of competition is attested by the fine tournament record they have compiled.

Though the system as a whole has only a relatively small following, many of the principles which were first to enunciate have been gradually incorporated into present-day methods.

Federal Works Contracts Let In December Are Announced

OTTAWA (CP)—Contracts totalling \$9,074,794 were awarded during December, the public works department announced Monday.

The largest single contract went to Atlas Construction Company of Montreal for a \$1,768,800 agriculture department research laboratory at Fredericton, N.B.

Another major contract was awarded to Belle Construction Ltd., Ile Maligne, Que., for a \$1,261,592 superstructure of the interprovincial bridge between Campbellton, N.B., and Cross-Point, Que.

Selected To Design, Build Space Capsule

WASHINGTON (AP)—McDonnell Aircraft Corporation of St. Louis has been selected to design and build a space capsule to carry the passenger in the first American manned satellite.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) said Monday negotiation for a formal contract with McDonnell will begin immediately. Twelve firms had submitted bids for the project.

NASA said a single satellite capsule is expected to cost more than \$15,000,000. It will be designed to carry a human passenger through the atmosphere into orbital flight and return him safely to earth.

The plan for putting man into flight around the earth, called Project Mercury, is expected to continue over several years.

The space agency already has assigned a contract to North American Aviation, Inc., for developing a rocket engine of 1,500,000 pounds thrust to be used in firing the man-carrying satellite. Cost of that phase will exceed \$200,000,000, NASA estimates.

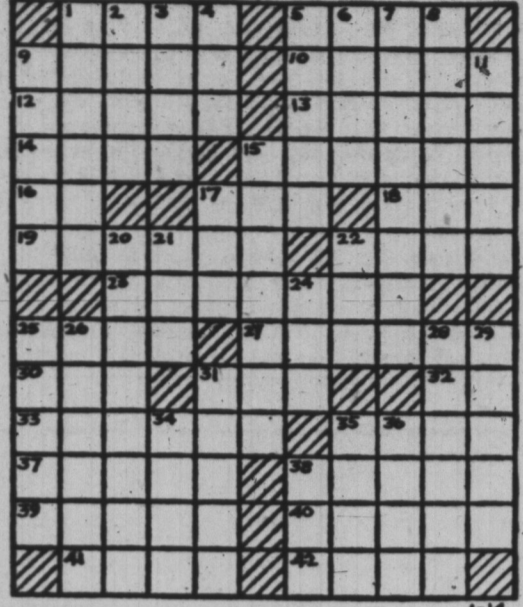

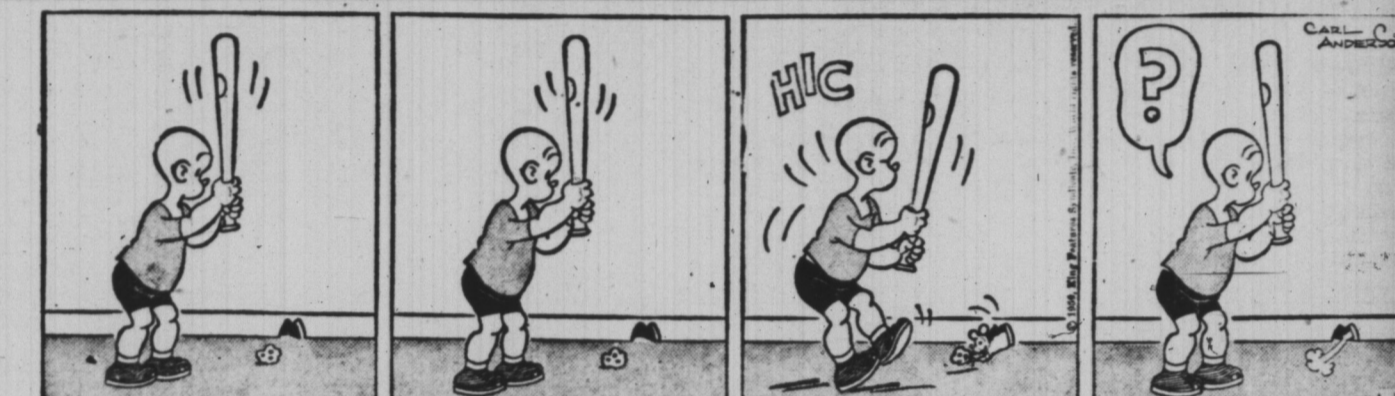

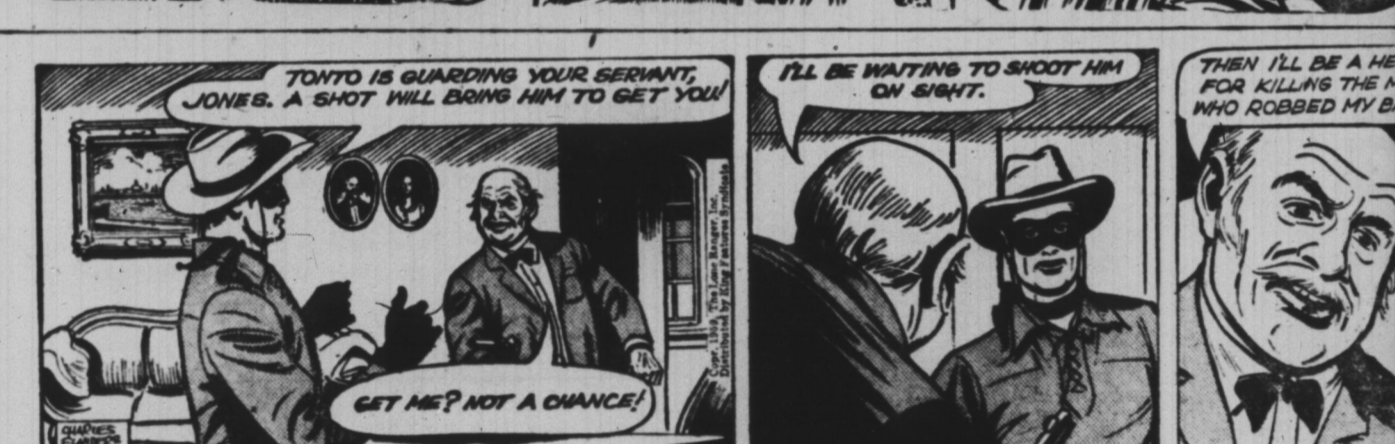
