Admittedly it is difficult to maintain a modern standard of living upon a hundred acres of land either good or bad, this situation produces two alternatives either larger farms or lower standards of living and the latter is a solution which will not be readily accepted knowingly by any large group of people. As farms get larger and mechanization still further develops, the population of the rural community will decline and this decline will be reflected in certain social, educational and church changes. There will be fewer pupils in the rural school and yet curiously the trend will be to remove Grade 9 and 10 from these schools to larger centers

Churchill Says Britain, U.S. Would Bar War In Mideast

By ERNEST MARSH LONDON (Reuters)—Sir Winston Churchill said Friday he is "perfectly sure" Britain and the United States would intervene to prevent aggression in the troubled Middle East. The former prime minister added, "the need for this will probably never come, but it may come."

He spoke at Buckingham Palace announced that Queen Elizabeth had invited King Faisal of Iraq, Britain's staunch ally in the Baghdad pact, on a four-day state visit here in July. FRIENDSHIP GESTURE The 20-year-old king will be Elizabeth's guest from July 16-19. His planned visit was seen by many diplomats as a new friendship gesture towards the only Arab League country in the five-nation Baghdad pact, which has been under fire from most of the Arab world. Churchill referred in his speech to the position that would be created if the Egyptians attacked Israel, after Israel had refrained from force and the Egyptians meantime learned to use Russian weapons. Solemnly, the elder statesman declared: "It will become not only a matter of prudence, but a measure of honor, to make sure that they (the Israelis) are not the losers by waiting."

Marine Drill Sergeant Found Perfectly Sound

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Randolph Pate said Thursday a psychiatric examination indicates the drill sergeant who led six marine recruits to accidental death in a North Carolina swamp is a perfectly sound well-motivated young man. The Marine Corps commandant told a reporter he has talked to the psychiatrist who examined Sgt. Matthew C. McKee, 31. He quoted the psychiatrist as saying "He showed appropriate and proper remorse. He is not frustrated but is properly remorseful. He is perfectly sound and was sound when he did it." The general said the psychiatrist meant "The general said he wanted to emphasize that this is just one man's opinion." The court is trying to find out what went wrong when McKee led 78 men into a tidal swamp on a night march on which the six drowned.

GUESTS OF BRITAIN Churchill said he hoped that "easier and more fruitful relations" would emerge from the visit to Britain of Russia's Nikolai Bulganin and Nikita Khrushchev, who are due here next Wednesday. He said Bulganin and Khrushchev had a right to be treated with courtesy and goodwill, "as guests in Britain are." Meanwhile, another British authority on the Middle East warned that the West is losing the battle of ideas in that strategic area. Gen. Sir John Glubb, who was abruptly dismissed as the commander of Jordan's Arab Legion, told a luncheon here that in the last year Britain had perhaps lost more in the Middle East than in the previous 250 years almost solely through propaganda. Glubb said his own experience in the Middle East had convinced him that ideas are more powerful than weapons.

APPLE MARKETING A series of apple marketing meetings are now being held in the Annapolis Valley and, at each of these, the proposal is being advanced that the growers of the Valley should form a voluntary organization through which their fruit would be marketed. At each regional meeting held to date more and more growers are voicing their support of a "federated" sales and promotion agency. Even some of the largest independent apple organizations in the Valley are swinging their full support behind the effort and, so, it is anticipated that the general meeting of Valley growers will be held, the proposal which has been advanced at the regional meetings will not be lacking of support. One observation readily drawn from accounts of the meetings carried in the press is that growers are determined that it is time for a change and that the old marketing methods which have served a very useful purpose a couple of decades ago do not serve that same purpose today. Times have changed and a new transportation movement in the world has brought about changes which make marketing methods of a few years back outmoded. It is because marketing methods have changed that growers have come to the realization that the old way is no longer the right way. That, apparently, is the way they are thinking for press reports lead one to believe that growers are making plans to market their fruit in a more orderly manner this year than ever before. This whole question of what road to follow will be discussed at a general meeting in Kentville in about a week's time. More on this

thus giving less and less work for the small school to do. The farmer will become less and less a manual worker and will become more of an engineer and a technician. As a mechanical and business-like and less biological the level of rural education will tend to improve and while farm labour will continue to be in short supply, more farmers will arrange time for travel and for relaxation.

FARMERS, AMERICAN AND CANADIAN From information currently available we are gaining the impression that there is a great deal more concern for the welfare of the American farmer than is the case in Canada on the part of government and the public. We do not know whether the American farmer is in a similar or worse position in the one north of the 49th parallel, we are rather inclined to believe that the American has some advantages, as for example a greater domestic market, lower costs for many of the farm supplies which he purchases and, in particular, cheaper trucks, tractors, automobiles, gas and oil to run and tires and batteries to equip them. Much of the time of the U.S. Senate and the House of Representatives is being taken up with legislation dealing with the farm problem. Unquestionably the United States government is spending a great deal of money to bolster the position of its farmers, in fact it is spending about ten times as much proportionally as is the case in Canada. What this adds up to we are not prepared to say, perhaps farmers are more important in the United States, possibly it's government is more conscious of
