HALIFAX, June 27.—The weather still keeps too rough for fishing at nearly all fishing stations along the coast.

Herring are being taken in fair hauls at Port Hood, C. B. and a few at North Sydney.

Great damage has been done to the lobster traps all along the coast, and at Shippegan, N. B., and Canso, N. S., to such an extent that it is thought that the fishing will have to be ended for this season.
