

It is very gratifying to our people generally, but especially to those whose exhibits at the Montreal National Exhibition are receiving such favorable notices from the Press. It seems from the very flattering report, which we have much pleasure in copying from the Montreal Gazette, one of the leading organs of the Dominion, that our Provincial exhibits are much admired at the Exhibition, and by no means discreditable to those who have been instrumental in securing a representation, though a very limited one, of our industries at the grand Canadian Exhibition now being held at Montreal.

Our correspondent "Hydrophilus" has implicit confidence in Spring Park. He expresses the belief that in it, there is a supply of water, sufficient for "all the men and beasts and accidental fires in Charlottetown." We cannot, however, give credence to his statements in face of the fact that two of our city steam engines yesterday, pumped the spring dry in four minutes. The supply of water at Quirk's pump, on Prince Street is, if we are to judge by the performances of the engines, greater than the supply at Spring Park. The water in that pump was reduced by one engine to ten inches in twenty minutes, while the water in Spring Park was reduced by one engine, to a few gallons, in a much less space of time.

THE Monetary Times says "the comparative statement of the exports of the Dominion for the month of July in the three recent years is as encouraging as it is remarkable. A steady increase is observable in every item (save that of field products in July last); but the greatest gain is in the lumber and cattle exports, the value of which in July, 1880 is about double those sent out of the country in the same month of 1878, and respectively 38.8 and 48.1 per cent. greater than in July, 1879. Our mines and fisheries are showing well in the increased export of the present year; manufactures, too, show a gain of more than 15 per cent. over the average of the same month in two previous years. VALUABLE SHEEP DESTROYED BY DOGS.—We regret to learn that early on Sunday morning last, a valuable flock of sheep, the property of Henry Longworth, Esq., Glynwood, was pursued by two black dogs in one of his pasture fields, where he had four specially selected lots of Shropshire and Leicester ewes and lambs, for the approaching Provincial Exhibition. Out of those valuable lots, Mr. Longworth intended to exhibit a few of his most improved ewe and ram lambs at the St. John Exhibition. But because of the ravages of those vicious dogs allowed to roam at large without their owners, he will only be able to exhibit a portion of his selected stock either at the Island Exhibition or at St. John. Three Shropshire lambs were killed, and four of his most valuable Shropshire and Leicester ewes, and four lambs are so maimed and injured that should any of them recover, which is very doubtful, they will not be in fit condition for Exhibition purposes. The list of prizes awarded to Mr. Longworth at former Exhibitions amounting from \$60.00 to \$105.00 at each Exhibition, will show the loss he must have sustained by the destruction to his splendid flock of sheep by those savage dogs, whose owners should be held responsible for losses such as Mr. Longworth has sustained. A stringent law should be passed bearing on this subject such as in Newfoundland and other places.

THE ELECTION CAMPAIGN.—The North River meeting last evening was held in the Baptist church. George Tweedy, Esq., was called to the chair. The speakers were Rev. G. W. Hodgson, of this city; Rev. C. C. Burgess and Mr. J. J. Chappell. At the close of the meeting the following resolution was moved by Rev. C. C. Burgess, seconded by Major Scott, and passed without a dissenting voice:—

Resolved, That we pledge ourselves, one and all, to secure, in every legitimate way, the adoption and enforcement of the provisions of "The Canada Temperance Act, 1878."

As we expected, the meeting at Rustico last night was one of the grandest meetings yet. William Laird, Esq., was called to the chair and Mr. Domitian Gallant was appointed Secretary. Pointed and effective addresses were given by Rev. Father McGillivray, Rev. Dr. Murray and G. W. Millner, Esq. A resolution promising support to the Scott Act on Thursday next was put and carried. D. McKay, Esq., M. P. P., and others spoke briefly, expressing their readiness to give the new Act a fair trial.

The Prince Edward Island Exhibit.

(From the Montreal Gazette.)  
The arrival of the exhibits from Prince Edward Island yesterday, was a source of satisfaction and delight to every one. The animals were visited by large numbers, and the other exhibits, which will, we hope, be in place to-day, are certain to attract attention. The "Garden Province of the Dominion will lose nothing in its special departments, by coming in competition with the products of the other Provinces. Mr. Gardner, the special Commissioner, who accompanies the exhibit, was unremitting in his attentions to all who had enquiries to make. The following particulars as to the exhibit will prove interesting:—

HORSES.  
In this class this little Province of the Dominion has manifested a spirit of enterprise worthy of emulation by her larger sister Provinces, in her exhibit of horses especially. Suffolk Punch "Challenger," a cart horse, and the carriage horse "Dufferin," from the Government stock farm of the Province, are splendid animals, and well adapted for all practical purposes in an agricultural country. The two Durham cows and Heifer from the same farm show that the benefits derivable from a stock-raising institution like that of the Government of Prince Edward Island cannot be over-estimated. "Harry Morgan," a very fine carriage horse, the property of Mr. Thomas Rodd, of Cherry Hill farm, Queen's County, is pronounced by competent judges a very serviceable animal of his class. This horse has a good pedigree, color grey, stands 16½ hands, weighs 1,247 pounds. "General Matchfield" is the name of a splendid carriage horse, owned by C. A. Mitchell, of Village Green, Queen's county. He too has a good pedigree, color bay, stands about 16 hands and weighs 1,300 pounds. The "Harry Messenger," a carriage horse owned by H. Craswell, of St. Eleonors, Prince county, is also thoroughbred, and looks well. Color bay, stands about 16 hands and weighs about 1,100 pounds. The little favorite "Blackfoot" is a perfect picture, sired by a celebrated American horse from "Hiram Drew." This beautiful roadster is very attractive, and has a first-class pedigree. Color black, stands about 15 hands, and weighs about 1,050 pounds. All those animals are highly spoken of as very superior stock, and will compare favorably with horses in similar classes from any of the other provinces of the Dominion.

THE GRAIN EXHIBIT  
is very fair, considering the fact that the harvest in that province is much later than it is with us in the upper provinces. We learn that it is with much difficulty farmers could be persuaded to leave their harvest field to prepare samples for the Montreal Exhibition, thinking as they did, that any effort on their part would be but poor when compared with the other Provinces; in this, however, they have been agreeably disappointed. Their grain, especially black and white oats, is excellent. In fact all the Island exhibits are very commendable, and deserving of special mention. The following is a list of the samples from the Island, with the names of exhibitors:—

FISH.  
Mackerel, in ½ bris and kit, owned by I. C. Hall, Charlottetown; ditto, by W. McGrath, Newell. Herring, in bris and ½ bris, by I. C. Hall, Charlottetown. Prepared or boneless codfish and hake, in boxes of 30 lbs and 15 lbs, from the factory of Macdonald, Macdonald & Co., Souris. Connoisseurs pronounce the fish first class, and of a very superior quality. The boneless fish is put up in boxes made of polished hardwood, the growth of the Province, and nicely lettered with the name and address of the manufacturers. This fish would command a ready sale in any market the world over.

MISCELLANEOUS.  
The chicory, green, dried and manufactured, John F. Rowe, Charlottetown, exhibitor, shows that any quantity of that excellent article can be grown and manufactured successfully in that Province. The gentlemen's suits from the establishments of Mr. Charles Robertson, Charlottetown, and Mr. John McKenzie, of Summerside, merchant tailors, are fit apparel for any man, however high his position. Those suits are got up in the latest styles, and are of excellent material and all home production.

The malt from Brighton Brewery is an indication of the excellent quality of the ale which is manufactured in that brewery, made from the barley raised in the Province, a sample of which is also at the exhibition.

The canned fish, in lobsters and mackerel is a fair representation of the superior quality of those preserved fish. This branch of industry has increased very rapidly on the Island within the past four years, and those engaged in it find a ready sale for their exports in the markets of London and other cities of England, and also in France and Germany. At the great exhibition in London in 1862, Cairns' lobsters were awarded a medal, and at Berlin this year Matheson's lobsters received a medal and Gavin's honorable mention. Munn's and McFadyen's canned lobsters were awarded prizes at provincial exhibitions on several occasions. Samples of canned fish at the present exhibition are as follows:—Canned lobsters, by Bell & Agnew, Alberton; canned lobsters, by Duncan Munn, Little Sands; canned lobsters, by J. & W. Matheson, Campbellton,

MacFadyen, Murray Harbor; canned lobster by W. C. Harris, Canoe Cove; canned mackerel, by J. & W. Matheson, Campbellton; canned mackerel by Longworth & Co., Charlottetown. Had this exhibition taken place two or three weeks later in the season, the products of this Province in roots, vegetables and other products not now matured, would have shown the remarkable fertility of her soil.
