### Maritime Art Ass'n 22nd Annual Meeting Opens Here

The twenty-second annual meeting of the Maritime Art Association got under way last night when delegates gathered in the clubroom of the P.E.I. Art Society in the Civic Centre.

Mr. Edwin Campbell, principal of Saint John Vocational School and Association president was in the chair to present his report and to hear reports from some fifteen of the twenty-eight member groups.

Mrs. E. Davies, president of the local club which acted as host, warmly welcomed the delegates and visitors.

The Association accepted the invitation of Miss Lellam White of Edmundston on behalf of the Edmundston (N.B.) Art Group to hold the convention next year in that city. A nominating committee was named, its report to be brought in this evening.

Mrs. B.B. Jones and Mrs. Louis Simmons, assisted by other ladies of the Society, served light refreshments at the conclusion of the meeting.

The Association continues its business meetings to-day in the Writing room of the Charlottetown Hotel, followed by a banquet at the Queen Hotel. On Sunday morning guests may visit the confederation Chamber, the Harris Gallery and attend church services as they wish. Sunday afternoon a drive along the North Shore is planned, with a lobster supper at Shining Waters Lodge, Cavendish, to conclude the convention.

### Parkdale Charge Approved By The U.C. Presbytery

Meeting in regular session on Thursday in the North Wiltshire church, the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, the United Church of Canada, dealt with a wide variety of subjects, including the reception of two new candidates for the Christian ministry, the approval of the formation of a new pastoral charge in the Parkdale area, approval of plans for new buildings, approval of calls from various churches, and a report of a special committee appointed earlier in the year to make an extensive survey regarding possible adjustments of pastoral charges within the bounds of Presbytery.

**CANDIDATES**

Sellar of Charlottetown, and Russell Green of Elmisdale were received as candidates for the Christian ministry. Both were highly recommended by their respective churches. Note was made of the fact that both young men have come from a background where the ministry of the church has been in high regard, and where members of their families are or have been in the ministry. Mr. Green is the son of Rev. N.R. Green Elmisdale, and a grandson of the late Rev. W.L. Green, formerly of Stanley Bridge. Mr. Sellar also has a number of ministers in his family background.

**PARKDALE**

Presbytery gave consent to the setting up in a formal way of a new pastoral charge in the Parkdale area. A service marking this event is to be held in Trinity Church on the 26th of this month at 2.30 in the afternoon, and representation from Presbytery will share in the service. At that time it is expected that the Charter Roll of members will be signed by about 125 persons. It was reported that a site of land has been donated for the erection of a church building, and the hope is held that by late fall the place of worship will be complete. Rev. G.H. Christie was appointed to serve as Interim Chairman of the new charge upon its formation.

Approval was granted to the congregations of O'Leary and Bras both part of the O'Leary Pastoral Charge for their plans to build Christian Education centers in the near future. Approval was also given to the Georgetown congregation for application to the Conference Board of Trusts for a loan of \$1,000 to assist in needed repairs to their church.

**CALLS**

Presbytery granted approval of the call from Sturgeon Falls, Ontario, in favour of Rev. S.H. Haslam, Margate Charge. Approval was also given to the call extended by the Tryon charge in favour of Rev. Douglas Earle, Dohet N.B. Mr. Earle is presently minister of the Richmond pastoral charge.

Renewal for one year was given to the Lay Preacher's licences of Messrs W.E. Brooks, G.R. Leard, Richard Creed, H.H. Hardy, and S.A. Custance with the understanding that renewal of the licence does not "involve permission to administer the Sacraments or to receive new members into the fellowship of the Church".

### Revision And Reduction Of U.C. Pastoral Charges Advised

The report of a special committee appointed earlier in the year to make a survey regarding possible adjustments and amalgamations of Pastoral Charges was the highlight of the regular meeting of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, the United Church of Canada, which was held in the North Wiltshire church on Thursday of this week.

The report, presented by Rev. C. R. Moase, Chairman of the special Survey Committee, made a number of recommendations full implementation of which would mean that the number of pastoral charges in the Presbytery would be reduced from 33 to 23. Presbytery gave approval in principle to most of these recommendations, and asked that the Boundaries Committee of Presbytery meet with the official boards concerned to work toward an early implementation of the recommendations. Recommendations for two areas were passed on simply for consideration by the Boundaries Committee, with the hope that they also could be worked out satisfactorily.

**MINISTERS LACKING**

The Committee's report stressed the present shortage of ministers not only in this Presbytery, but throughout the Church. It noted that 867 United Church families in the Presbytery are presently without the services of a regularly settled ordained minister. A strong plea was made for careful consideration of the over-all problems, and members of the Committee were urged to support to the fullest the work of the Boundaries Committee as it works toward possible implementation of the recommendations.

The report stated, in part, that "we must frankly face the prospect that many... families are going to be without a regularly settled ordained minister unless we take some steps—even drastic steps, perhaps,—to work out a plan of rearrangement and amalgamation."

The report also stressed that the recommended changes would result in all families of the church being served as well or better than at the present time, and that many charges would, under the recommendations, be greatly strengthened. It was also pointed out that considerable savings could be effected through lessening of grants from the Board of Home Missions—a saving estimated by the Committee to be about \$10,000.

**RECOMMENDATIONS**

Included in the report are the following recommendations. The Lot 16 and Wellington charges to be joined into one. Malpeque and Margate were asked to consider the formation of one larger charge. Recommendations in the area from St. Peter's to Winsloe would result in one less charge being in existence.

The Dundas charge was recommended to be a part of a three point charge comprising the present Dundas charge and the congregation of Georgetown. The Sturgeon and Milltown Cross congregations of the Georgetown charge were recommended to be joined to the Montague and Valleyfield charges, respectively. Recommendations involving Cornwall, Hampton, and Tryon charges would, if implemented, result in one less pastoral charge.

The Committee, as well as a number of the Court, stressed the fact that all recommendations of the Survey Committee must be approved by the congregations involved before they can be put into effect. Meetings with the congregations and pastoral charges concerned will be held in the near future under the auspices of the Boundaries Committee of Presbytery.

### Closing Meeting Y's Men's Club

The final meeting of the Alpha Y's Men's Club for the current season was held in the Y.M.C.A. last evening with the president, Roy Smallman, presiding.

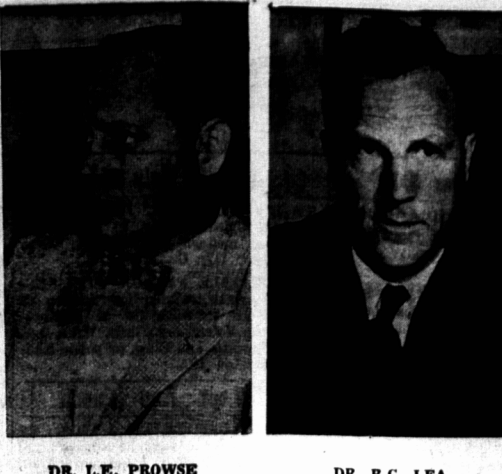

### RAF Jet Missing In Labrador

HALIFAX (CP) — RCAF and U.S. Air Force planes Friday began an intensive search for a RAF Canberra jet bomber and its three-man crew, missing since Thursday on a flight from Edmonton to Goose Bay, Labrador.

The Canberra, in a routine flight, was believed down in the hilly, frozen country near Goose Bay, the RCAF said Friday. It was within six miles of the airport Thursday when communication was lost.

The United Kingdom liaison mission at Ottawa said the three missing airmen are all believed to be members of the RAF.

Search and rescue officials here said visibility was at three-eighths of a mile in snow and the ceiling was a bare 300 feet when the plane last reported. It had been making ground-controlled approach, in which the pilot is talked down by technical staff using radar as a guide in their instructions.

Five RCAF aircraft from Maritime bases and two U.S. Air Force planes and a helicopter, all from Goose Bay, joined in the search Friday.

Premier Frost who foresees the prospect of an additional \$100 million for his Province arising from such a conference. In Manitoba Mr. Diefenbaker merely promises to enter into such a conference "with a new spirit", Mr. Harris declared.

Asked by one of the audience concerning the possibility of a Causeway being built, the Finance Minister replied, "if it can be shown to be feasible, necessary and desirable, it will be built by a Liberal government."

In conclusion the Canadian Finance Minister assured his hearers that the Liberal Government was conscious of the needs of all parts of the nation, and intended to "carry on a stable good government, and continue the search for prosperity for all the people of Canada."

Mr. Harris was introduced to the audience by Mr. Neil A. Matheson, Liberal candidate for Queens, and member of the last Canadian Parliament, and thanked by Mr. Cecil A. Miller, also a Liberal candidate in Queens. Each candidate referred to the record of the Liberal administration, and asked the support of the electors in the forthcoming election.

**PREMIER MATHESON**

Hon. A. W. Matheson, Premier of Prince Edward Island, addressed the gathering. The Premier took this opportunity to express publicly his thanks to the federal Finance Minister who had received him and the other provincial delegates "so well" during their visit to the Canadian capital last April.

Referring to the Minister's observations on the tax rental agreements, Hon. Mr. Matheson said that he was happy to know that "he has not closed the book" in their regard, and that "some of our representations were to be given further consideration."

**PREDICTS GOOD NEWS**

Mr. Matheson predicted that the Prime Minister might have some good news regarding the feasibility of the proposed N.B.-P.E.I. causeway, when he visits this Province next week.

The Island Premier also paid tribute to the Liberal representatives, and the Hon. Mr. Winters, Minister of Public Works, for their support and encouragement during the recent visit of the Provincial government delegation to Ottawa. He also declared that he "heartily endorsed" each of the
