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Regional High School Vote Later April 30

Taxpayers in some 50 school districts surrounding Charlottetown will vote April 30 on the proposed regional high school.

The proposed high school would be located adjacent to the new Provincial Vocational Institute and have an enrollment of around 500 grade nine and 10 students.

Several public information meetings have been held on the subject; the last of these will be held at 8 p.m. on Tuesday, April 23 at 8 p.m.

The Regional High School Commission states that the new school will be constructed for at least a year, as facilities for grades nine and 10 to be provided on a rental basis in the Provincial Vocational Institute for 1963-64, and also with grade nine and 10 students.

The Regional High School Commission expects to study the effects of the Vocational Institute and to report to the public in the academic classes.

Classroom space for grades 11 and 12 will be planned in the next two years.

About seven buses will be required to transport students to the operation, and students of both sexes attending the Vocational High School in Charlottetown will be used. The committee said bus routes established would assure all districts in the best of a satisfactory service.

It is estimated pupils on the long commutes will be approximately an hour in each direction.

TAX ESTIMATED

Estimated tax per \$100 to operate the school on the basis outlined is \$20,000. This is approximately 50 districts expected to participate have a property valuation of \$6,000,000.

When the school is constructed, it is thought the government will absorb the cost needed to operate the school, but by the ceiling tax rate of 80 cents per \$100.

The government also provides for construction of the school building, \$6,000 per classroom or laboratory and \$20,000 for the regulation auditorium-gymnasium; 60 per cent of the cost of buses; 60 per cent of bus operational expenses and 40 per cent of school operational expenses.
