

B.C., Alberta Unbeaten

KINGSTON, Ont. (CP)—Alberta and British Columbia scored thrilling extra-end victories to extend their unbeaten streaks to five matches in the fifth round of the Canadian Curling Championships Wednesday night. It was the most suspense-filled draw of the round-robin classic.

With a crowd of 2,500 in the stands, the biggest since the championships opened on Monday, the Matt Baldwin rink from Edmonton came from behind to score three in the 11th and 12th rounds and add a single in the extra end to defeat the Campbell Brothers from Anoleva, Sask., 8-7.

The victory came about an hour after Reg Stone's rink from Trail, B.C., scored a typical come-from-behind triumph over the last-place Prince Edward Island rink from Charlottetown, 11-10.

The Alberta victory over the favored Saskatchewan rink boosted its prospects of being the eventual winner when the 11-round tournament ends Friday, although the British Columbia and Manitoba rinks could be the sleepers. Manitoba went into a tie with Saskatchewan with 3-1 win-loss record by whipping Newfoundland 13-5.

Northern Ontario came up with its third straight victory—19-4 over New Brunswick—in follow in the standings with three wins and two losses. Nova Scotia defeated Quebec 13-6 to draw an even terms with Ontario, which received a fifth-round bye, each with 2-2 win-loss records.

FIGHT TO FINISH
Both the Saskatchewan-Alberta and British Columbia-Prince Edward Island Games went down to the last shot.

Skip Garnet Campbell, usually a cool, calculating curler, had last rock in the extra end but he missed his chance to wrap up the game. Baldwin's last throw was shot rock on the four-foot circle. The Saskatchewan skip drew in nicely but his shot just nudged the Alberta rock and rolled over.

The Saskatchewan skip was off his game most of the afternoon. On the 11th end he missed on his last rock to give Alberta two of the second tie in the championships his rink had given up a two-ender. Prince Edward Island scored two rocks on the seventh end in the opening game of the championships Monday when the Campbell Brothers won 8-7.

Wednesday's game followed two patterns. In the early ends, both skips played the single-knockout style and in the last five first end second leads set up guards.

Baldwin showed superiority in the draw game over his opposing skip, particularly in the final ends when the strategy of both was to draw shot rock. Baldwin made it while Garnet Campbell's rocks usually were overweighed.

This was the case in the 11th when Campbell missed with his last rock, allowing Baldwin to count two, cutting Saskatchewan's lead to 7-5.

Prince Edward Island gave Stone and his mates a real scare by piling up an 8-3 lead after six ends. It appeared all over for B.C. in the sixth when skip Stone missed a P.E.I. rock and hit his own second rock and both sailed out of the house, giving the Maritimers a three-end.

Stone, who has had to come from behind in four of his five victories so far, pulled his game together. He counted singles in the seventh and eighth, a three in the 10th and another three in the 12th to tie the game. The single on the extra end provided the victory margin.

The 12th end was a thriller. There were 10 rocks in the house with B.C. having the shot rock and P.E.I. second rock. Stone's last throw nudged his opponent's rock out and he hit to count his three.

Ted Kennedy Scores Two For 3-1 Victory Over Canadiens

TORONTO (CP)—Ted Kennedy scored two goals Wednesday night to lead Toronto Maple Leafs to a 3-1 victory over Montreal Canadiens, thus giving Toronto's playoff chances in the National Hockey League a further breath of life.

The victory moved Leafs to within six points of the idle New York Rangers in the battle for the fourth and last playoff berth. Leafs have 52 points and eight games left to play. Rangers also have eight games to play.

The loss left the second-place Canadiens three points behind Detroit Red Wings, who have played two games fewer, and three ahead of third-place Boston Bruins, who have 70 points and eight games left to play.

Kennedy scored the first and third Toronto goals and centre George Armstrong scored their second. Left winger Sid Smith assisted on all three goals and Kennedy assisted on Armstrong's marker.

Right winger Maurice Richard, hockey's highest scorer, scored the lone Montreal goal. It was his 30th goal of the season and 490th in regular season play, covering 15 seasons.

The crowd of 13,313 gave The Rocket a tremendous ovation after his goal.

Strong Rugger Club To Start Canadian Tour In Toronto

LONDON (CP)—The famed British Barbarians Rugger Club Wednesday announced the makeup of an all-international "missionary" tour that will visit Canada.

One of the strongest ever assembled in the British isle, the team leaves here by air April 24 for what is expected to be six games in Canada, the first in Toronto April 27 and others in Vancouver, Victoria and Montreal.

It will be the first overseas jaunt for the Barbarians, affectionately known as the Baa-Baas. Founded years ago, the club comprises rugger missionaries dedicated to furthering the cause of rugger football and playing the game in its most sporting sense, without unduly caring about the result.

The club has no clubhouse, no home ground and no membership fee. Membership can only be obtained by being selected to play on the team.

The tour is sponsored by the four "home" rugby unions—England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales—and the British Columbia Rugby Union. The powerful team compares favorably with international sides that have represented the home unions in South Africa, Australia and New Zealand.

England, the only unbeaten country in the international championships this season, provides seven of the 20 players. Five come from Wales and four each from Ireland and Scotland.

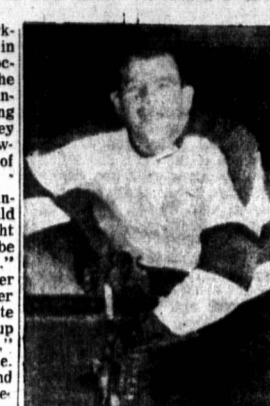
Dr. G. L. Glyn Hughes, club president and honorary team manager for the tour, said the Barbarians will "do their utmost" to show Canadian fans the wide-open, crowd-pleasing style that made them famous. The pack contains the present England and Scotland captains, E. Evans and J. T. Greenwood.

In accepting the Canadian invitation, the Barbarians broke a tradition of some 40 years' standing of playing only six games a year—one at Christmas against Leicester, a nother in March against East Midlands and four at Easter against Welsh Teams.

Dr. Hughes said the tour is a "wonderful opportunity to do missionary work in Canada" on behalf of the traditional English public school sport.
