The lumber export of the United States in 1892 amounted to \$28,000,000. At the present rate of use the supply will be exhausted in 100 years. Excluding about 62,000 small crafts, the commerce of the world is carried on by 450,000 vessels, of 20,500,000 registered tons, with a carrying capacity of 48,000,000 tons. The Baltimore Herald states that two extraordinarily designed boats are being built in Baltimore for an Arctic expedition. The projector of the enterprise is said to be the Chicago Herald.
