

WRECK OF ST. OLAF.

The Steamer Was Well Known Here

TWENTY-SIX LIVES LOST.

Believed to Have Perished of Cold and Exposure.

QUEBEC, Nov. 26.—The steamship St. Olaf, which for several years was running regularly between Quebec and north shore ports in the St. Lawrence, was wrecked on Wednesday night at Boule Island, at the entrance to the harbor of Seven Islands, and all hands were lost.

The St. Olaf left Shelldrake for Quebec on Wednesday afternoon and shortly afterwards a gale set in accompanied by snow. Her non-arrival at Seven Islands did not create much alarm, as it was supposed that she had not attempted to enter the harbor on account of the weather and had proceeded to Quebec.

Failure to hear of her after her departure from Shelldrake caused enquiry along the coast, and the news now received leaves her fate beyond doubt.

There is no hope whatever that anyone escaped. Twenty-six lives were lost, there being seven passengers besides the crew.

P. T. Lemaistre was captain of the steamer. The St. Olaf was insured for about \$30,000 and was valued at \$60,000.

She ran for several years between Pictou and the Magdalen Islands.

LATER. A searching party who returned from the Islands reports that everything indicate that the passengers and crew landed alive but perished of cold and exposure, and their bodies lie under three feet of snow which fell after the wreck.

Three lifeboats lie wrecked on the beach.

Messrs Bruce Leitch, of Stanhope, and W J Crane, of China Point, were examined on oath regarding the state of the poll at Covehead and Cherry Valley, and as a result of their evidence the returning officer found the state of the poll at these polls. The final addition was then made, and it was found that Martin had 2303 votes and McKinnon 2293. Martin was accordingly declared elected by a majority of 10.
