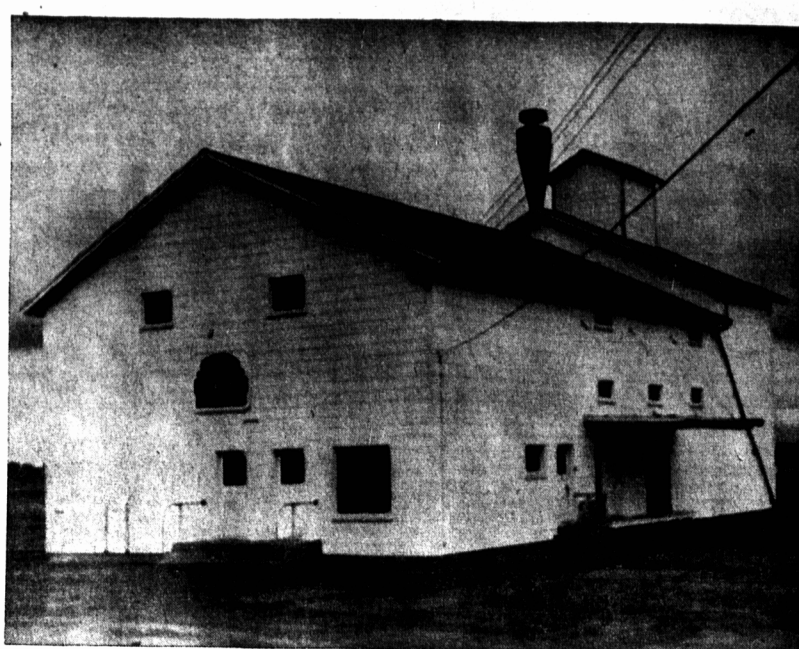

**SHUR-GAIN FEED PLANT OPENS FRIDAY**

A new Shur-Gain feed plant, completely equipped with the latest machinery and owned by Mr. E.J. MacDougall of Vernon Bridge will be opened for service to the public on Friday.

The exterior of the modern building located at Vernon Bridge is shown in the photo above. The plant, which is 82 feet long and 42 feet wide also contains egg grading and egg storage rooms as well as a business office and the manager's office.

There are two floors and a basement in the building. The first and second floors will be used for feed grinding, mixing and storing operations while the basement will be used for store farm produce.

Construction of the new plant was started in June of this year. The concrete basement is waterproof while the remainder of the building is of wood construction. The walls are covered with asbestos siding and the roof is covered with asphalt shingles.

The plant is equipped to grind, roll, mix and bag large quantities of grain and feeds. The hammer mill can handle a capacity of three tons per hour.

Mr. MacDougall has operated a Shur-Gain feed mill at Vernon Bridge since 1948. His old plant was destroyed by fire in March of this year.

**Canadian-Born Top Man In U.S. Satellite Program**

WASHINGTON (CP)—A Canadian-born astronomer who moved to the United States with his parents in his early teens is the top man in the U. S. Navy's artificial satellite program.

Dr. John P. Hagen, 47, a native of Amherst, N. S., and superintendent of atmospheres and astrophysics at the naval research laboratory here, has been chosen by the navy to direct the program known as "Project Vanguard."

Born in Amherst in 1908, Dr. Hagen lived with his parents in Halifax, Saint John, N. B., and Moncton, N. B., before the family moved to Boston in 1923. Hagen was a 15-year-old high school student at the time and he went on to study at Boston College and at Washington's Georgetown University.

Dr. Hagen, who now lives with his wife and two children in nearby Arlington, Va., says he never has returned to the Canadian Maritimes, though the family has relatives living there.

"Through the years," he said, "I have come to think of myself more as an American than a Canadian."

He now is a U. S. citizen by virtue of his parents having given out citizenship papers when he was a minor.

The naval program he heads calls for the firing of a man-made satellite into the per atmosphere within the next two or three years. It will be equipped with radio and devices for transmitting information back to the earth. It will circle the globe on its orbit for several days or weeks.

**Canadian And U. S. Dollars At Equal Value**

NEW YORK (CP)—The Canadian and U.S. dollars were quoted at equal value Wednesday for the first time since 1952.

The Canadian dollar, only occasionally less than one cent above the U.S. dollar until recent weeks when it began to drop steadily, was quoted at par with the U.S. dollar by traders here at 2 p.m. The two currencies, last at parity March 7, 1952, were still quoted at par at the close.

The Canadian dollar reached its high points in terms of U.S. money in recent years Aug. 13, 1952, when it was at a premium of 4 1/2-3 cent.

Monetary experts believe the fall in the Canadian dollar is due largely to a change in the flow of investment funds from U.S. to Canada. Because of more favorable interest rates and better yields than before, many American investors, taking long-term profits on Canadian holdings, are now switching to U.S. investments.

**Anglican Bishop Of Toronto Is Ordained**

TORONTO (CP)—Rt. Rev. Frederick H. Wilkinson, 58, newly enthroned Anglican Bishop of Toronto, says evangelism, education, and extension are the three immediate tasks facing the church today.

Bishop Wilkinson pledged himself to these aims following his enthronement before a distinguished congregation of clergy and laymen at St. James' Anglican cathedral Tuesday night.

The first task of the church is the proclamation of the gospel, he told the overflow congregation of 1,800 persons.

Bishop Wilkinson, who came to Toronto from Dartmouth, N. S., in 1904, had a distinguished First World War record, being awarded the Military Medal and two bars as a signman. He graduated from Wycliffe College in 1925 and served in church appointments in western

OTTAWA (CP)—The Supreme Court of Canada today unanimously ruled that Montreal city by-laws requiring stores to stay closed on certain Roman Catholic holidays is invalid.

The court, in a judgment rendered by Chief Justice Patrick Kerwin, granted the appeal of seven large Montreal retail stores which had challenged the by-law and the provincial statute on which it is based.

For example, now, when U.S. investors are selling Canadian money, there is less demand and the balance favors the American dollar. Several years ago when American money was pouring into Canada, the Canadian dollar grew more expensive as the demand for it increased.
