

Keen Racing Witnessed Here Yesterday

Cobblestone And Flaxcot Share Honors In Feature Event On Night Card

Fast times and thrilling finishes were in order last night as Old Home Week racing wound up its second night before another very large crowd which jammed all the space available.

Top event of the night was the Free For All Trot and it gave fans some of the best racing of the season. Cobblestone, a bay horse owned by Mr. A. Shore, Sydney, copped the first two heats but lost the final to another Cape Breton owned trotter when Flaxcot, owned by P. J. Cadeagan, Glace Bay, won the final in another of the many thrilling stretch drives fans witnessed.

However, it was the First Division of the 2:23 Pace which provided the fastest time of the night with Cahagan, owned by Dr. George Bishop chopping her record as she came flying home in the second heat in the flat time of 2:10.

Another new mark was taken when Peter Clegg surprised by capturing the first heat of the First Division of the 2:23 Pace. Owned by George Brookins and driven by Don MacNeill, Summerside, he was teamed home five seconds under his record to win in 2:12.

Photo finishes were the order of the night with the judges requesting one for all five horses in one of the heats. It was indicative of the brand of racing offered.

In the third race of the evening, Third Division of the 2:18 Pace, the eight horses remained strung out all the way to the head of the stretch and then opened up. Pat D won the heat, but at the wire there was no more than two lengths between it and the last horse.

16 Women Competing At 85th Annual DCRA Shoot

SOUTH MARCH, Ont., (CP)—Three of the 16 women competing this week at the 85th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association shoot are no strangers to the Connaught rifle ranges near Ottawa.

The women—Mary MacLennan of Alexandria, P.E.I., Mrs. Eileen Leard of Victoria and Elsie Strong of Newport, N.S.—have been coming here year after year to compete on equal terms with some 60 male competitors.

Miss MacLennan, here for her 10th consecutive DCRA meet, is considered one of Canada's top marksmen.

The short, dark-haired school teacher, who became the first woman member of the Canadian Bisley team in 1950, has been shooting competitively for about 12 years.

"I take in two shoots during my summer holidays—the Prince Edward Island Rifle Association meet and the DCRA."

Asked what she thought of women taking up the shooting game as she came off the ranges after shooting a tidy 95 of a possible 100 in the Banker's match, Miss MacLennan said:

"I think it's an excellent sport and more and more younger girls are taking up the game."

Mrs. Leard, a reporter with the Victoria Colonist, says she likes the sport but that women are at a great disadvantage over their male competitors. She is spreading her fourth year here.

The tall, blonde sharpshooter said "women are at a great disadvantage because they are not as strong as men. By the time we carry our gear to the firing mound we are almost worn out."

Mrs. Leard would like to see several matches conducted during the week open solely to women sharpshooters.

Miss Strong, pretty 19-year-old shooter who is attending her fifth DCRA meet, agrees that women are at a disadvantage, but says women could make better shooters than the men.

"Sure men are stronger," she said, "but they also take it more serious than women and as a result they are more tense."

Miss Strong Monday tied with 20 other Canadian marksmen, posting a 49 of a possible 50 in the Tyro match shot from 200 yards.

Noted Drivers At Exhibition

Though in point of years he is not the oldest man driving race horses at the present Old Home Week meet, Tyndall Semple of Kensington has been sitting a sulky longer than anyone hereabouts.

It was fifty-seven years ago that the durable Tyndall drove his first heat and it is fifty-three seasons since he became a regular driver and trainer.

More than forty years ago he gave a favorite of that day, Happy George, a mark of 2:30 which was hiking fairly fast for the times.

Some of his most notable victories in later years were scored with Plucky Scott, owned by Dr. R. F. Seaman. Tyndall won several heats with this fine pacer in 2:08.

Trixie Volo will also be remembered as one of Tyndall's great crowd pleasers, and many times winner. She was owned by Brenton Ramsay of Rosemount, Prince County.

Under Mr. Semple's care now is a horse he raised, trained, and later sold to Geo. Woodside, appropriately named "Tyndall Semple". This trotter's name appears in today's summaries of yesterday's races, and well up in the list. Among others in the Semple stable at the local track for fair week is Jo Jo Spencer, a junior free-for-aller with a mark of 2:10. Twice this year the veteran Kensington man has driven Jo Jo Spencer to her record.

One of the most fearless drivers in the racing business, in the Maritimes, is Roach MacGregor, who drove his first race in Montague at the age of sixteen. Roach is only 25 now. Since then he has covered a lot of ground in track circles. He spent the year 1947 in the U. S. with the well-known big time driver, Joe O'Brien, who was the leading pilot in America that season.

Back home in Charlottetown MacGregor had Josedale Clipper in charge for three years, on behalf of Roy Bevans and Wendell Baur, joint owners, and in all that time was never out of the money with her. Her fastest win heat in two time 2:10 1/2.

MacGregor's success with his own horse, New Look which he trained and drove to a mark of 2:11 is well remembered.

Last year he bought the smart gray mare My Darling at the Harriburg Sales for Senator Geo. H. Barbour, and so far this season has had her heading the summaries twice and seven times second.

With the trotter Anyway he has done very well indeed, winning seven heats against stiff competition. The MacGregor horses will be in there trying throughout the week.

One of the few lady drivers in the Maritimes, Miss Betty Brown of Truro, came to the fair with Streak and Melkale, Single B.

Betty held the reins behind a race horse on the first occasion at Springhill, N. S., and won her first event with Joan Frisco in 2:20. Since then she has won races with Previous in Truro, with Quaker Boy, Single Streak and others. Just recently she took two heats with Silver Streak in the good time of 2:12 1/2. She has been working with Island-born Johnny Conroy (Continued on Page 13)

Mouseie Dowling Leads Qualifying Round In Maritime Golf Tourney

SAINT JOHN, N. B., (CP)—Thirty-two players who survived Tuesday's qualifying round in the Maritime amateur golf tournament were led by M. J. (Mouseie) Dowling of Moncton, who got 67 tied the par 70 Riverside Golf and Country Club course record set by Jug McSpaden in the 1939 Canadian open.

The qualifiers included four juniors, one of whom, Doug Lewis of Moncton, won the junior championship with 159 for 36 holes.

Both Roy Morrison of Moncton and Pete Kelly of Fredericton carded 149 in a special 36-hole match for a berth on the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Willingdon Cup team. Officials then awarded the berth to Kelly, his eighth time on the team—for the stated reason that he led Morrison by two strokes in the last N. B. P. E. I. tournament.

Match play in the Maritime meet starts Wednesday. Morrison had 74 in the qualifying round, placing second to Dowling. Next came E. H. Crowell, Halifax, 75; Kelly, 76, and Ralph Harley, Moncton, John Steele, Riverside, and Dr. J. W. Sears, Fredericton, each with 77. The defending champion, 19-year-old Clarence (Gabby) O'Hearn, Dartmouth, N. S., was well down among the qualifiers with 81.

J. McDonald, Moncton, and R. Abercrombie, Halifax, scored 86 each and Abercrombie won a playoff for a place in the championship division.

More than 80 players from 12 clubs entered the tournament. It will end Friday.

Horses Take New Marks During Keen Competition In Afternoon Race Card

Fast, action, thrills and spills, and hard driving finishes featured the harness racing at the Old Home Week celebration at the Exhibition Grounds yesterday afternoon. There was bitter competition for every event and at least two horses were sent to new records as their drivers battled for every inch of track.

Ann's Dream, owned by Willard MacDonald, Summerside, and driven by George Callbeck, was pushed to a mark two seconds faster than she had ever gone before in capturing the first heat of the Second Division of the 2:33 Pace.

It was a terrific race with the favorite Becky Smith, a Quebec owned horse coming from far back on the second trip around to literally run over horses as she gave a tremendous exhibition on the backstretch. From ten lengths back she hit the top of the turn into the stretch in her lead, racing on the outside all the way. But then she suddenly folded completely and pulled wide on the last turn. This let Ann's Dream come through on the rail and the flying mare could never afterwards be great but in making her great bid she lowered her mark from 2:14 2/5 to 2:12 2/5.

But there were other excellent heats as well. In the final heat of the third division of the 2:23 Pace Miss Judy Hal and Lou Kalmuck hooked up in as thrilling a stretch drive as any fan could hope to see. It was a photo finish with Lou Money Royal (E. Lewis) and Becky Smith (H. Cormier) 4 1/2 lengths in front. Lou also was forced to a new mark to win the heat.

The judges were forced to call for several photos before they could decide the winners, and in one instance they needed a photo for the first four positions.
