

Black Hawks Edge Bruins In Only Game Scheduled

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago Black Hawks scored twice in the first period, then hung on to defeat Boston Bruins 2-1 in a National Hockey League game Tuesday night.

Chicago's goals were scored by rookie Bob Hull and Eric Nesterenko, both during the final four minutes of the opening period.

Bronco Horvath climaxed a second period in which the Bruins outfought the Hawks with a goal at 19:54, while the Hawks' Ted Lindsay was in the penalty box.

The loss was the Bruins' second in six games, while the

Hawks, who now are tied with Detroit and New York for third place, show a record of two victories, four defeats and one tie.

Both goalies, Glenn Hall of Chicago and Boston's Don Simmons, played outstanding games. Hall was credited with only 21 saves in Simmons' net, but many of the Chicago net minders were on close drives.

In the final period, Chicago reversed the pressure, pouring 19 shots at Simmons, while Hall was called on to make seven saves. Chicago showed rare power in the first period also, firing 16 shots at Simmons.

Hull's goal was the first of his NHL career.

Boy Scouts Ass'n Training Committee Arrives In P. E. I.

The national training committee of the Boy Scouts Association which is made up of one representative from each Province under the chairmanship of Mr. Eli Boyaner, provincial commissioner of New Brunswick, arrived in Charlottetown last evening for a two-day conference prior to the executive committee meeting of The Canadian General Council for Scouting.

Mr. Boyaner said last evening that in view of the rapid growth of the Boy Scout movement, more leaders are required and training programmes for these leaders must be developed. The committee will consider aspects of training for Wolf Cub, Boy Scout and Rover leaders along with the development of training aids for new leaders and advanced training for experienced scouts.

Camping standards will be reviewed with special emphasis being placed on week-end camping, first class journeys and patrol system camping.

Various courses now being offered are being studied by the committee with the view of adequately meeting the increased desire of boys to do Scout camping. Specialization courses that cover subjects such as pioneering, hiking, orienteering, water safety, back-woods cooking and signalling and the Canadian scouts with a view to enlarging the training team personnel to meet the growing demand will receive special attention.

Want Better Support For Amateur Sport

FORT WILLIAM, Ont. (CP)—Canada must give better support to amateur sport if she is to field strong teams in international events, says Major John W. Davis, president of the British Empire and Commonwealth Games Association of Canada.

He made the comment in an interview while on a cross-country tour to raise \$100,000 to send 120 athletes and officials to the 1958 Games in Wales. This figure would include administrative costs for the four-year interval between games, he said.

Major Davis said he hopes to have a strong team at Wales, representing all parts of Canada. The games were opened in 1911 as the Festival of Empire with four countries competing. Canada won this test on team basis.

Major Davis, a member of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada for more than 30 years, said that Canada has won 67 of the 372 events held since the beginning of the games and ranks third behind England's 107 wins and Australia's 86.

He stressed the importance of catching athletes' interest in school, and then holding this interest when they leave school.

"Altogether too few athletes carry on in track, swimming and such after school," he pointed out. "I feel we have a finer outlook on amateur sport but we need more support."
