

Local and Other Items.

The tree market is booming. A FINE day to-morrow will be in order. CAPE COD CRANBERRIES at Beer & Goff's, Queen and King Streets. ABOUT \$120 were realized at the Military Concert Monday evening. TWENTY-FIVE barrels American Baldwin's just received at Beer & Goff's. THE Dominion Alliance meets to-morrow afternoon, in the Y. M. C. A. Hall at 4.15. It is reported that the Government intend appointing License Inspectors for the Country Districts. REMEMBER the Literary and Musical Entertainment in the basement of Zion Church, this evening. THE brig Ida Maud, with a cargo of sugar and molasses, arrived from Barbadoes this afternoon. THE City Firemen commence training for the Halifax tournament on Victoria Park this evening.

A NEW trial has been refused in the Pearson-Sherron case and the matter now goes to Ottawa. FIVE HUNDRED rolls Room Paper at Beer and Goff's King's Square Store to be closed out at big reduction. A CURIOSITY in the shape of a maple tree with a fir limb, was the great attraction at the market to-day. MEETING of Young Soldiers in the Gospel Army at 3 o'clock, to-morrow. The children are all invited. THE Heather Belle did not arrive from Cranand until three o'clock this afternoon, owing to the heavy fog. HAMS, Smoked and Dried, Bacon and Lard, warranted choice, at the Fish Market, Grafton Street 21-May 6. THE steamer Carroll leaves here for Boston at an early hour to-morrow morning. The Worcester leaves Boston for this port to-morrow afternoon. At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon the Scott Act case was further postponed till Monday, and the man referred to elsewhere was fined \$30 or 30 days for being drunk and out after hours. To those who intend to plant trees it might be as well to say that they should be placed about thirty feet apart, in a straight line, and not too close to the houses. This would give uniformity and produce better results. REV. J. HUTCHISON, M. A., will (D. V.) officiate at Hunter River on Sabbath first, the 9th inst., at 10.30 a. m.; and at New Glasgow Road at 2.30 p. m. As the roads are now good, he will be happy to see a good turnout at both places. MR. JAS. A. REID, of this city, has received via the Carroll, a cowboy outfit, consisting of saddle, bridle and spurs, purchased by him in Colorado. They are of unique construction and apparently comfortable. The outfit can be seen at Mr. Reid's Store, South side of Queen Square.

THE M. A. Starr arrived from Halifax about 10 o'clock last evening with a miscellaneous cargo, after discharging which she proceeded to Southport to load with potatoes. She leaves on return at 10 o'clock to-night. The captain reports a difficult passage, owing to ice and fog. THE following record of the arrivals and departures of the steamers of the P. E. Island Steam Navigation Co. for the month of May, 1876, will be found interesting: May 2—Princess left for Pictou and arrived. May 3—Princess Edward reported off Soudra. May 4—St. Lawrence made first trip to Pictou. May 5—Princess Edward arrived. May 6—Princess left for Summerside and Shediac did not get there. Summerside, 7th and 8th left for Shediac and had to return owing to ice. May 8—St. Lawrence left for Pictou at 8 a. m. and returned to port. Could not get into Pictou owing to ice. May 9—Princess left for Pictou and arrived, being her first successful trip. May 10—St. Lawrence left for Pictou and returned owing to ice. Princess Edward left and came to anchor. May 12—St. Lawrence left again for Pictou. Boston boat arrived first for season. May 18—Princess returned from Shediac to the city, having been absent since the 6th, owing to heavy fields of ice. Ran to Bay Verte on 19th to avoid ice. Princess Edward left for England this 2 p. m.

ABOUT midnight, Wednesday, Mr. John Quirk, of the City Steam Bakery, Prince Street, was aroused by strange noises in his yard. Suspecting burglars he, in company with his sons, proceeded to investigate but could not discover anything. They retired to rest again, but about an hour later were once more aroused by strange noises. On going into the yard to see what was the matter, they made the discovery that a ladder had been carried from a distant part of the yard and placed against the sill of the window of the bedroom occupied by the servant girl. They also saw a low-sized man run from their yard into that of Dr. Jenkins, adjoining, and disappear. One of Mr. Quirk's sons then went to the front door, on Prince Street, to see if he could find out where the man had gone to. After being there a short time, he noticed a man turn around Cox's corner and come in the direction of the house. This man passed Mr. Quirk in the doorway, bidding him "Good-night," and went down Prince Street. Shortly afterwards, the residence of Mr. Thomas Smith, on the corner of Prince and Water Streets was attacked. The window of the bedroom occupied by the servant girl was opened, and a man entered the room where they slept. The noise of helping awake them, and they screamed for help and the man was identified. This morning a man named Harley was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate, charged with both offences. The evidence in the first case was not strong enough and he was acquitted. In the Smith affair it was proven that Harley had boarded there for several years, occupying the room now occupied by the servant girl, and that he had entered the room under the influence of liquor, more from force of habit than a desire to do any harm. Taking these circumstances into consideration His Honor decided not to inflict a penalty for that offence but, instead, would fine him \$30 or thirty days imprisonment for being drunk and out after hours.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.)

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

OTTAWA, May 6. The House met at three o'clock, and after preliminaries passed to special order of the day: Mr. Blake's resolution respecting local self-government for Ireland. The resolution being read Hon. Mr. Costigan said he himself felt that the friends of Ireland should be satisfied with the unanimous expression of opinion passed in 1882 because it might possibly happen that under present circumstances there would not be the unanimity which was essential to the success of the address. He moved an amendment accordingly, which Sir Hector seconded. Mr. Casey attacked Hon. Mr. Costigan for not accepting Mr. Blake's motion without amendment. Mr. Curran said he regretted that Mr. Casey had urged Mr. Blake to refuse to accept Hon. Mr. Costigan's amendment.

Greece Warlike.

ATHENS, May 6. The reply of Premier Deljaninis to the ultimatum of the Powers has just been delivered, and is considered by them inadequate. Soldiers of the garrison have been summoned to Barracks, and it is reported they will proceed to the front to-morrow. Several members of the Chamber of Deputies, who are officers in the army, have been ordered to the front. The general commanding Greek troops on the frontier, telegraphs that the Turks are massing and he has ordered a similar movement by his troops.

The Greeks Stubborn.

ATHENS, May 6. The Greek Cabinet met this afternoon to discuss the Collective Note of the Powers, demanding more precise assurance that the Greeks will disarm. It is believed the Cabinet will refuse to yield to the demand. The Ministers of the Powers are preparing to depart from Greece.

Home Rule.

DUBLIN, May 6. Four hundred Catholic Priests attended a meeting at Dunganon, County Tyrone, called to give expression to their views on Gladstone's Home Rule policy. Resolutions were unanimously adopted endorsing Gladstone and his Home Rule policy.

British Parliament.

LONDON, May 6. The Cabinet will meet on Friday to continue the discussion of the Irish question. Lord Hartington has consented to introduce in the House a motion to reject Gladstone's Home Rule Bill on its second reading.

Signs of the Times.

LONDON, May 6. The Times says: "The riot in Chicago is a sign that American industry has now to contend with all the difficulties which the Capitalists of Europe have had to battle with."

Prompt Payment.

OTTAWA, May 6. The C. P. R. Co., has deposited with Government agents in London, the first instalment being one-half of the loan of \$20,000,000, agreed to be repaid by 1st July.

Disastrous Fire.

HAMILTON, April 6. A disastrous fire occurred this morning in Coppers' stove foundry. Loss estimated at \$40,000. Covered by insurance.

Labor Troubles.

CHICAGO, May 6. No disturbances have occurred either here or in Milwaukee to-day, and it is supposed trouble is at an end.

Forgery Trial.

WINNIPEG, May 6. Scott, the forger, was arraigned to-day and pleaded "not guilty." He was committed for trial.

Release of Prisoners.

WINNIPEG, May 6. Five Indians and two half-breeds were released from Stony Mountain penitentiary to-day.
