BOXING Gossip
 St. Bark in the early 1900's American newspapers devoted considerable space to the pugilistic performances of Johnny Gilbert Gallant.

Johnny was born in the community of Bloomfield, P. E. I. July 4, 1892. He began boxing in 1910 as an amateur and in his first appearance before the public he acquired the 125 lb. championship of New England and in his next outing he won the 115 lb. National title.

He turned pro and up until 1913 participated in about 100 fights and won most of them by knockouts.

He was handled by Alec MacLean of Chelsea, Mass., and among the famous mittmen he fought were Charlie White, Kid Nelson, Kid Bow, Young McGovern, Frank Malone, Young Young, Billy Burke, Joe Rivers, Battling Nelson, Kid O'Brien and Leach Cross.

Jimmy Nolan is another Island born fighter who made good in far-away places. Born at Chestow, near Souris, in 1927 he enlisted in the Canadian Army when he was only 15 and served overseas. After his return to Canada he took up residence out west and began boxing in 1947.

He started fighting as a welter and won the Western Canadian crown in that division. When he began to put on extra weight he gave up that title and campaigned among the middleweights with such success that he eventually took over as boss of that division too.

Nolan's record in main bouts is 23 knockouts, 14 decisions, 1 draw and three losses. In all he took part in over 80 pro fights.

"Mousie" Dowling Wins N.B. - P.E.I. Golf Championship With 4 Round Total Of 292

MONCTON, (CP)—Maurice (Mousie) Dowling of Moncton won the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island amateur golf championship Wednesday with a four-round score of 292.

John Smith of Amherst, taking the professional and open crowns, was only one stroke better. Last year these titles went to Archie Skinner of St. Andrews.

E. Nicholson of Charlottetown became junior champion, succeeding Moncton's Doug Lewis, who grew out of the junior ranks this year and won a qualifying Willingdon Cup match.

Dowling set an amateur record of 292 in the heavy-hitting round to subdue the heavy-hitting Dodger nine while Ryan has nominated lefty Art MacLeod to take over round chores for his team. A win for the Dodgers tonight will bring them into a first place tie with the Flyers.

FOUR STROKES BETTER
 Dowling's four-round 292 was four strokes better than runner-up Bill Beer of Charlottetown who carded a last round 75 and took a total of 296.

Dowling, who had trailed the leaders through the first three rounds, perked up Wednesday afternoon to near-par pitch.

Dowling, Beer and Davidson of Saint John Riverside who finished third, became members of the N.B.-P.E.I. Willingdon Cup team. The fourth member of the squad Lewis, had earned his berth earlier when he won the sectional trial competition.

Kluszewski Keeps Pace Set By Babe Ruth In 1927

CINCINNATI, (AP)—Ted Kluszewski is right on the pace Babe Ruth was setting at this time in 1927, when he established the home run record of 60.

With 80 games in the record book, the big first baseman is leading the majors with 29 round trippers. The Babe hit No. 29 in his 79th game. Later he put on that famous and fantastic spurt of 17 in September.

Klus is bettering his own pace of 1954 when he led the majors with 49. He didn't slug No. 29 last year until the 104th game.

Dairy Increase Lead By Defeating Lions 17-13

Barrie's Lions would probably be leading the City Softball League by this time if it weren't for that one bad inning which usually always crop up in every game the Lions play.

On Monday night the Lions were tied 2-2 with the B.Y.C. until the sixth inning and then the B.Y.C. scored nine runs. Last night the Lions were tied 8-8 with the Sunshine Island Dairy until the fifth inning and then the Dairy scored nine runs.
