

Rugby Official Plans Visit To Ch'town

Mr. W. Fallowfield, Secretary of the Rugby Football League, Leeds, Yorkshire County, England, will visit Charlottetown during the first week in December.

An official of the Rugby Football League has contacted Dr. Frank Jelks, coach of the Nomads football team and advised him of Mr. Fallowfield's desire to meet with Maritime rugby officials and players.

Mr. Fallowfield will be in Charlottetown during the latter part of this month to attend a series of games between New Zealand and Australian teams. He will visit the Maritimes on his way back to England.

Arrangements will be made to have Mr. Fallowfield meet with rugby officials at St. Dunstan's University, Prince of Wales College, the Nomads and school teams and also to address a general meeting.

Japanese Premier Faces Tough Political Fight

TOKYO (Reuters) — Premier Shigeru Yoshida is heading home for one of the toughest fights of his political career.

The premier, who returns Wednesday from a visit to Canada, Europe and the United States, will have to wrestle with a parliamentary crisis which threatens to oust him from office and bring about dissolution of the lower house of the Diet (parliament). This would mean new elections before the end of the year.

Yoshida's Liberal party is in rebellion and many members are planning to join opposition groups clamoring for his downfall.

The crisis has been made worse by two new developments:

1. An opposition-dominated parliamentary committee decided to subpoena the prime minister to testify Nov. 25 about a shipping bribery scandal which rocked Japan earlier this year.
2. One of Yoshida's bitterest rivals, Ichiro Hatoyama, announced that he will desert the party later this month, taking a number of his followers with him, on grounds that the government is "corrupt and scandal-ridden."

WILL JOIN REBELS

These moves followed a decision by Japan's third largest party, the Progressives, to join rebels from Yoshida's party in forming a new Conservative party Nov. 24.

The leaders of the proposed new party have said they will join the Socialists in presenting a no-confidence motion to the Diet, seeking Yoshida's resignation.

The ship bribery case has been a source of persistent trouble to the Yoshida government this year.

Members of the attorney-general's department, examining charges that shipbuilders and transport chiefs bribed government officials to obtain subsidies and preferential contracts, tried to close the troublesome case last July by clearing all suspects who had not been charged.

CHARGES GAG ATTEMPT

But the opposition said the government was trying to gag the investigations in which top Liberal party officials were among those questioned. They took the case of the Diet's opposition-controlled au-

U. S. Committee Says Reds Remain Extremely Active In Latin America

WASHINGTON (AP) — A congressional committee said Saturday "the Communists are still extremely active throughout Latin America" despite the overthrow of the pro-Moscow government of Guatemala last June.

Asserting that "the Kremlin is stepping up its activities throughout central and South America and the Caribbean republics, and the colonies of the European powers," the report appealed for greater U. S. aid to countries of this hemisphere. It said the "bald fact" is that Washington has often been negligent toward that critical area while sending billions of dollars to countries thousands of miles away.

Communists right now are concentrating on Honduras and have made "considerable headway in Chile," said the report, by a House of Representatives sub-committee investigating Communist aggression in Latin America.

AGITATORS WORK OPENLY

"The situation in Chile is so tense that the government was recently forced to declare martial law," the report said. "Red agitators are working openly in Costa Rica, Ecuador, Bolivia and Mexico; in British Honduras, in British Guiana, in Trinidad, and in the French island of Martinique."

The report said "the continuous intervention by the Soviet Union in the affairs of our Latin American neighbors constitutes a real and serious menace to the security of the United States."

The committee, which issued a subpoena against the prime minister in September.

The speaker tried to overturn the order, but it was forced to surrender. Yoshida, however, left on his world tour and refused to accept the subpoena, which now has been renewed.

The audit committee has asked the attorney-general's office to find out whether Yoshida is liable to legal action. Normally, failure to answer such a subpoena would involve a prison sentence of up to 12 months.

CHILD SCREEN STAR IS HAVING ADVENTUROUS TIME IN ENGLAND

LONDON (CP) — Gary Billings, son of Canadian dancer Jack Billings, wonders what his grandparents in North America will think of his latest escapades.

In recent weeks, the lively, impish 10-year-old has:

- Wallowed in a crate of eggs; been "drowned" in clouds of soot from a falling chimney; climbed a 40-foot barge mast in a howling wind and got stuck in the rigging.

ALL IN A DAY'S WORK

These adventures are all part of a day's work for Gary, who has his first screen role in the British film "Raising A Riot," due for release early in 1955. He plays one of three children whose father is left in charge when mother goes to Canada.

Gary and twin sister, Bonnie, visited their grandparents at Hamilton, Ont., and New York last year. The twins, born in Britain have triple citizenship for the time being and have already made a coup of Atlantic crossings.

When Gary last visited grand-mother Mrs. Jean Billings in Hamilton, he had no thought of movie fame. He was content to leave such "stacy" pursuits to Bonnie, who wants to be a dancer like her father, Jack, of Hamilton, and

her American mother.

Gary got into films by chance. His sister Bonnie was auditioned for a part in "Raising A Riot," but she was too tall and Gary, who wasn't booked for an audition, got a part instead.

AT HOME ON SET

A brown-haired lad, Gary didn't know anything about movies when he first set foot on a studio set, but he took to the game like a trouper.

The film brought Gary's "first big romance." He fell so hard for co-child star Mandy Miller he told his parents he wished the film called for a love scene with her instead of her sister Jan Miller.

The script calls for Gary to "make a pass" at 17-year-old Jan, who is a Canadian. She was born in North Bay, Ont., while Scots father David Miller was in London. Mandy was born in Britain.

Another Canadian in the film is Lionel Murton of Montreal.

Delay Deporting Dick Haymes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government agreed Monday to take no steps toward deporting Dick Haymes pending a full court review of the case of the singer, husband of film star Rita Hayworth.

The move made unnecessary the scheduled legal arguments on whether a restraining order granted last week should be replaced by an injunction.

The government is seeking to deport Haymes, a native of Argentina, on the grounds he made an illegal entry into the U.S. in June, 1953, when he returned from Hawaii after visiting Miss Hayworth. Haymes contends it was not an illegal entry since Hawaii is a part of the United States.

Former Famous Race Horse Dies

PARIS, Ky. (AP) — The death of Gallant Fox, winner of racing's triple crown in 1930, was reported Monday.

The first of three Kentucky derby champions sired by the imported stallion, Sir Gallahad III, died at the A. B. Hancock farm Saturday shortly before a race named for him was seen in its latest renewal at Jamaica track in New York.

The Gallant Fox handicap, captured by Alfred Vanderbilt's Social Outcast, had a value of \$75,000 and awarded the winner a net of \$65,550, compared with the \$50,725 purse taken by Gallant Fox when he carried jockey Earl Sande to victory in the 56th Kentucky Derby on May 17, 1930.

The big bay campaigner, retired from stud service last year, died after a week's illness.
