Cuisenaire Arithmetic Plan Outlined To Teachers Local

MONTAGUE — A workshop for teachers from the Montague local of the P.E.I. Teachers' Federation was held recently at Cardigan School where the program featured three speakers.

(Continued from page one) estimate the amount of additional payments to the provinces from higher equalization grants, though the figure of \$180,000,000 suggested by one reporter was described as "on the high side".

GUARDED COMMENT Initial comment from the premier was guarded. He welcomed the proposal as a step in the right direction toward recognition of equalization. He said the formula is so vague at this stage that its value cannot be estimated.

Typical was the comment of Manitoba Premier Duff Roblin: "Equalize on what? I asked point-blank for an answer and didn't get one. We must wait further details before we can put a dollar tag on it."

One province — Ontario — Already had indicated opposition to a change in the present system, on grounds that most of the added money would come from Ontario taxpayers.

A member of the Ontario delegation estimated that the added payments could be as much as \$80,000,000 a year.

(Continued from page one) understand, that I reiterate this government to the unwavering support of the United Nations to the honorable and determined execution of our commitments to our allies — to the maintenance of military strength, to the maintenance of the defence of the strength and the stability of the dollar — to the expansion of our foreign trade to the reinforcement of our program of mutual assistance and cooperation in Asia and Africa — and to our Alliance for Progress in this hemisphere."

At another point he pledged that the U.S. will keep its commitments from South Viet Nam to West Berlin.

"We will be increasing in the search for peace, resources and our pursuit of areas of agreement even with those with whom we differ, and generous and loyal to those who join with us in common cause," the president, who followed all his comments without changing a line a manuscript already liberally sprinkled with scribbled revisions.

EMOTIONAL IMPACT

At the start, there was a moment of emotional impact when he gave recognition to the reason for his presence, and he said, "I would have given gladly not to be standing here today," Johnson said. The greatest leader of our time has been struck down by the foulest deed of our time. Today John Fitzgerald Kennedy lives on in the mind and memories of mankind. He lives on in the hearts of his countrymen. Now, Johnson said, in this moment and in this time, it is time to say to his fellow Americans "let us continue the program which John F. Kennedy had to leave unfinished."

He appealed for united action by the American people in the hope that "the tragedy and torment of these terrible days will bind us together in new fellowship."

Impressive, Pearson Says

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister Pearson described President Johnson's address to the United States Congress Wednesday as moving, impressive and encouraging.

Mr. Pearson said he saw about two-thirds of the presidential address on television during the luncheon recess of the federal — provincial conference.

"It was a very moving and impressive performance," he told reporters.

Sponsored by the Canada Council, Dr. W. E. "Ted" Mann, a sociologist at the University of Western Ontario and an Anglican priest, has made a study of former inmates' after-release problems. By conducting tape-recorded interviews with former inmates of the Ontario Reformatory at Guelph, Dr. Mann learned that prisoners increase their criminal skills and acquire "self-images of themselves as crooks," in an institution of this kind. He discovered that the inmates hate the institution and follow the Inmate's Code of their fellow prisoners to find acceptance.
