TORONTO (CP) — Police today said they are searching for a 60-year-old Maritimer who disappeared Sunday night while waiting for a train to Detroit.

Frank J. Galpin of Souris, P. E. I., may have suffered a heart attack after he left his wife at the station to check train schedules, police said. Mr. Galpin was confined to bed six weeks after suffering a recent attack.

Mr. Galpin, on her way to Detroit with her husband to visit a son, Robert Millington, for Christmas, said she searched the station for her husband and also had the train searched.

Mr. Galpin is five feet, nine inches tall; slightly built and clean shaven.

(Mr. Galpin took a heart attack a few weeks ago and has since suffered from lapse of memory. Mrs. Galpin was married before.)

Monthly Meeting Town Council At Montague

The regular meeting of the Montague Town Council was held in the council room last night with Mayor Bruce H. Yeo, presiding. Present were Councilors Eugene McGowan, Reynolds, Understone and Clements.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and discussed during which it was stated that the town offer of \$500.00 for the Post Office had been accepted by Crown Assets and that the necessary papers were being drawn up.

At a previous special meeting for opening street sanding tenders, it was announced that the tender of \$250.00 from John Shaw and Kenneth Clements had been accepted.

In a general discussion regarding tax arrears, the clerk informed the Council that judgments had been taken out against five delinquent tax payers, and following the receipt of execution papers, their properties would be subject to public auction for recovery of taxes due to the town.

In the reading of the correspondence, it was learned that the tax grant for Federal properties in the town of Montague would amount to about \$1,300.00 for 1954, and would be slightly higher for 1955. Of the \$1,300.00 apportioned, \$900.00 would go to the school and \$400.00 to the town.

Discussion followed on snow removal from the streets of the town, and this question will receive special consideration at a later meeting. It was also decided that overnight parking on main streets would be prohibited during the winter months so that the snow plow might be able to clear the streets unhampered by vehicles. It was also decided to bring into effect the by-law to have property owners clear the sidewalks of snow in front of their residences or places of business.

Councillor Clements stated that new lights had been placed on the bridge, and Mayor Yeo announced the completion of the dam at the Burnt Bridge to provide water for that area in case of fire.

Mayor Yeo also thanked the organizations which used the council room for meetings for cleaning the room following their meetings.

The meeting concluded with a declaration from the Mayor and Council that Monday, December 26, Boxing Day, would be a civil holiday in the town of Montague.
