THE RACES YESTERDAY.

There was a very large attendance yesterday. The members of the course were the same as Wednesday.
 The seventh heat of the 2.24 class, unfinished Wednesday, was trotted at 1.30 p.m., Rock Farm Grace winning in 2.22, Brazilian second, Blimont third. The race was therefore won by Grace, Brazilian second place; and Blimont third.
 2.28 CLASS.

The starters were Tansy, Parkwood, Jack, Ben Hal, Bessie Rampart.
 Ben Hal took the lead in the first heat, and held it. Dash was second till under the wire in first half when Parkwood by good racing took his place. Jack broke in last half, coming in third, Tansy fourth, Bessie Rampart fifth. Time 2.23.
 The second heat was a procession. After rounding the first turn Ben Hal took the lead, Dash second, Parkwood third, Tansy fourth, Bessie Rampart fifth. They finished in this order. Time, 2.22.
 Ben Hal captured the third heat, never being headed. Dash and Parkwood had a hard fight for second which was taken by Dash. Tansy was fourth, Bessie Rampart fifth. The race was given to Ben Hal. Dash got second money, Parkwood third, Tansy fourth.
 FREE FOR ALL

Arclight had the pole in this race, Lina Belle next and Warren Guy outside. Minnie and Parkland were drawn.
 In the first heat Arclight led until the end of the first half, when Lina Belle went ahead, winning about five lengths ahead of Arclight. Warren Guy behaved badly and came in third, about a length behind Arclight. Time 2.20.
 The second heat was hotly contested, all the horses fighting hard for first place. Warren Guy finished first, Lina Belle and Arclight coming in neck and neck a few feet behind. Arclight was given second place. Time 2.22.
 Warren Guy won third heat after a hard struggle, there being very little difference between the horses at the finish. Arclight came in second, Lina Belle third. Time 2.22.
 The fourth heat was won by Arclight. Warren Guy made two losing breaks and had to take third place. Lina Belle was a good second. Time 2.23.
 Lina Belle captured the fifth heat, Warren Guy second, Arclight third. Arclight led at the first turn. Lina Belle second. Warren Guy broke here and lost considerable.

At the quarter there was no change. Coming up to the Lina Belle and Guy passed Arclight, the former retaining to the finish. At the Lina Belle had a lead of about three lengths over Guy which was reduced by the time the mile was reached. Time, 2.24.
 Lina Belle captured the sixth heat and the race. Guy led to the three-quarters, then broke and fell to third place. Arclight finished second. Time—2.27. Lina Belle got first money, Warren Guy, second and Arclight, third.
 Between the heats of the races, Mr. Dewell, one of the cleverest trapeze performers seen here for a long time, demonstrated his skill, and was heartily applauded by the large audience. Kelly and Ashby, comic actors and acrobats, also gave an exhibition of the best description, their clever work being greeted with round after round of applause. Their billiard table act was new here, and was thoroughly enjoyed. After the performance Mr. Kelly asked the reporters to test the springing properties of the table but one and all respectfully declined, the Guardian representative explaining that he was not that kind of an acrobat.

ATTITUDE OF FRANCE.

The State Department at Washington was notified last week of the fact that the French Government had adopted an attitude similar to that of the United States in replying to the German note, and that fact was duly reported by the Associated Press. In addition it was stated that the government of Russia was in line with that of France in this matter. There is a disposition to minimize the difference between the United States and Germany on the point of delivery on the Chinese ringleaders before negotiations, and it is pointed out that the only reason for differing was a profound conviction that a deterrent effect could be produced upon the Chinese people as a whole, only by allowing their own government to degrade and punish the guilty parties. The same punishment, if applied by a foreign power, it is said at the State Department would utterly fail of a reformatory affect, as Chinese people would venerate the memory of the martyrs, while the Chinese Government, which arrogates to itself the peculiar right to reward and punish after death, might elevate the victims of the allies and thus offer incentive for a repetition of the outrages.

THE PARTIES IN BRITAIN.

A London cable letter says: "All thoughtful students of British institutions have deplored the lack of balance between the two great parties. In the last parliament one party was so strong that it was rendered immobile by big battalions, and the other was so weak and distracted with fractional divisions that it failed to exercise the functions of a vigilant and critical opposition. Leader writers and magazine essayists have demonstrated many times that a ministry which was released from the surveillance of effective opposition criticism was exposed to enervating influences and internal paralysis. These warnings have not stood in the way of a Unionist appeal to the country on the narrowest possible issue, when probably at least a fifth of the electors will be disfranchised by the operation of the registration system and when there is the best chance for maintaining and possibly enlarging the overwhelming majority which has thrown the parties entirely out of balance. This majority will be an inevitable response to the appeal to English patriotism at the close of a war in which loyal colonies have marched bravely to the music of the new Imperialism; but it will be unsettling for both Unionist and Opposition and will impair the resources of invigorating criticism when the work of parliament may be a complete reorganization of the military system of the kingdom and the Empire."

The Treason Bill which the Cape Colony Parliament has practically adopted disfranchises the rebels for five years. The punishment is an easy one and its principal effect will be to ensure a good pro-British Parliament for the Cape next election, and after when its term is out there is likely to be a soberer lot of Afrianders registered about Colesberg than was the case when the present legislators were chosen. The British colonists are coming into their day.

The international troops attacking the Peitang forts thought they had the positions surrounded, but 3,000 of the Chinese garrison marched away from them, and escaped in broad daylight. There are more than the Boers who know how to get away in time from an ugly position.
