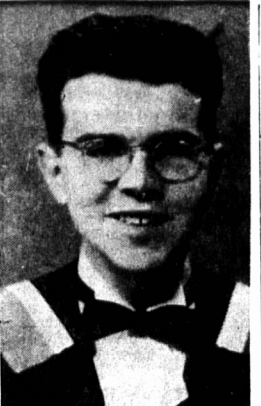

Unemployment Claimants Now Below The 500 Mark

For the first time since last December the number of people drawing unemployment benefits through the National Employment Office, Charlottetown has dropped below the five hundred mark. More than half of those in receipt of benefits, are residents of the rural areas and over one hundred are women.

With the coming of warmer weather the increase in employment has been noticeable, and there will be further reductions in the number of benefit claimants in the next week or two.

The local office reports that some benefit claimants who drew money during the winter and still continued to work more or less steadily, will now be forced to make repayment for money drawn illegally. Some of the claimants concerned will probably face court action, and will pay a fine in addition to making restitution for the money paid them.

Each year a number of these fraudulent attempts are uncovered, and are handed over to the Regional Enforcement Branch in Moncton, New Brunswick. An investigator is assigned to these cases, and thereafter the matter is taken out of the hands of the local office altogether. When it has been established that a claimant has been guilty of drawing benefits illegally he cannot draw further benefits, until he has repaid his debt.

NEW BOOKS
The issuing of new books for the year 1956-1957 will soon commence and with it a re-registration of every insurance book holder in Canada. Every insured person will complete a form giving his insurance number, full name, his date of birth and other information. When the returns are all complete the Head Office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission in Ottawa will have a new master index of every insured person in Canada. This will bring up to date a previous index which has been built up since the first Unemployment Act went into force in 1941. No new insurance books will be issued until the form is completed and they must be completed with emphasis on accuracy. When the renewal of insurance books is under way, teams of workers from the Charlottetown office will be sent out to the larger employers, and the work will be carried out on the employers' premises. This will speed up book renewal

Girl Guides Have Major Goodwill Role

LONDON, Ont. (CP)—Girl guides are playing leading roles in Canada's international goodwill program, the provincial commissioners' annual conference said Wednesday.

International commissioner Henrietta Osler of Toronto said an increasing number of Girl Guide exchange visits is promoting friendship and understanding between Canada and many countries.

Last year Canadian guides, either as individuals or in groups, visited the United States, Great Britain, Switzerland, Italy and Mexico. They in turn entertained United States girl scouts and Mexican guides.

For the first time Canadian guide companies and Brownie packs were organized last year on foreign soil. Daughters of Canadian Army and Air Force personnel in France and Germany, they were promoting goodwill through good deeds they did in those countries.
