Break Reported At S'side Store

A break occurred at the Brace, MacKay Co., Ltd. store during the early hours of Sunday morning, was discovered by Cst's Keith Champion and Ralph Hardy during a routine patrol of Summerside business houses about 2.40 a.m. Sunday, but it will not be known just what was stolen until a stock check is made this morning. Entry was made by breaking the large glass window in the door at the rear of the building. The unsanitary thief took time out to heed the call of nature on the floor of the hardware department before making his getaway. Cst's Champion and Hardy had made a check of the store at 1.00 a.m. so the break occurred between that time and 2.40 a.m. when they again made their rounds and discovered the broken window in the door.

Slight Injury To Baby In Accident

A car-truck collision Saturday evening about 7.45 p.m. just east of the Blue Goose Restaurant near De Sable resulted in considerable damage to both vehicles, but the only injury was a slight cut above the right eye of a 10-month-old baby, whose father, Mr. Lorne Milligan, East Royalty was driving the car involved in the accident. Mrs. Milligan and another child were also occupants of the car. The accident occurred when the truck, driven by Anthony Buell of De Sable started to make a left turn into a side road, just as the Milligan car was attempting to pass it. Both vehicles were proceeding towards Charlottetown. Damage to the car is estimated at approximately \$400 with about \$150 to the truck which ended up in the ditch on the side road. The baby was taken to hospital for medical attention. The Borden Detachment R.C.M.P. investigated.

The annual meeting of Alberton Public Library was held Wednesday evening with Wynson Currie presiding. By becoming incorporated in 1952, this library set a precedent for the Province in this respect. In 1953 the following ten persons were appointed to hold the library in trust for the public and to assume certain other responsibilities: Howard Clarke, J.W. Don Campbell, Mrs. A.C. Green, Miss Maud Dyer, Mrs. Walter Wells, Miss Eva Dyer, W.W. Currie, Mrs. J.H. Myrick, J.W. Waugh, and Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie. Following the death of J.W. Waugh, M.E. Callaghan was appointed in his place. Several other citizens have since retired. These people were nominated at an organizational meeting held at the home of Miss Eva Dyer, who was then librarian. At this time there was a debt of approximately \$1,700.00 on the new building. It has since been reduced to approximately \$700.00. At the annual meeting in 1954 the Library Council was supplemented by Mrs. Myrl Matthews, Mrs. Frank Dunn, Mrs. Gordon Warren, Mrs. Ralph Fraser and D.B. Nicholson. The secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie, reported that money has been raised by dances, shows at the Princess Pat Theatre by courtesy of Mr. White, sales of candy, food sales, rentals, partial proceeds from the W.I. Convention entertainments, cash donations, etc. At the present time the balance on hand is something over fifty dollars. Within the past two years \$305.58 has been raised. (continued) from page 1 to form what was later to become APEC was made in Charlottetown in 1952 by Dr. C.F. Blakeney of Moncton. In 1953 the four Premiers of the Atlantic Provinces met at Moncton and as a result an organizational meeting was held in Halifax in September of 1954. Some six months later the charter was granted and APEC commenced to function. After tracing its history, Mr. Curtis dealt with the research and promotional activities of the organization. In the field of research he said, the work has been limited owing to lack of funds, but he emphasized the need for research to amass much needed information. Mr. Curtis outlined four ways in which research and analysis could be carried out, and said that unless one or the other of these plans was set up the economic development work would not be done. PROMOTED FIELD In the promotional field, he said, APEC was analysing the potential output of the four provinces and was grouping industries into areas. This was a preliminary, he said, to an appeal to the dwellers of the Atlantic Provinces to consume more of their own products and to produce more of the things they consume. At a recent meeting Mr. Curtis stated, it was decided that a new arrangement of organization would be more effective and a plan was proposed to provide means to reach into all parts of the region more effectively. In conclusion, Mr. Curtis stated that APEC has created a new spirit of awareness of possibilities of greater industrial and agricultural growth in the Maritimes; welded the four provinces together and stimulated new and better ideas among the business and political leaders that cannot help but make this a better place in which to live. Mr. Curtis was thanked by President Taylor for his timely and informative address.

A capacity congregation of well over 1,200 attended the final meeting of the "Calling Canada to Christ" mission held in the Civic Auditorium, Summerside last evening. The male choir of over fifty voices directed by Dr. Peter MacDonald led the singing, while the Trinity male quartette sang "There's a New Name in Glory" and "On the Levitic Road". Rev. L.M. Murray in conducting the service thanked the members of the various committees whose work and planning had made the mission such a notable success, and expressed special appreciation to the guest missionary, Dr. R.W. Armstrong, Britannia United Church, Ottawa, for his inspirational messages during the week. Rev. Lloyd Archer, Tryon read the Scripture lesson in John 3: 1-6 and Mrs. Allison Profit, Freetown led in prayer. Dr. Armstrong, in his powerful closing message, spoke from the text, "Except a man be born of water and of the spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of Heaven." In dealing with the subject of Baptism, he asked the question "What does the water in Baptism signify and what should it mean for Christians?" He stated that Baptism, in any form, infant or adult, means that people have become members in the company of the redeemed, thus giving them an opportunity to serve with fellow Christians who are thinking and doing as they are.
