Miscellaneous News.

The Minister of the Italian War Office recently resigned because the King refused to have a soldier shot after conviction of criminal insubordination.

English Bishops wore heavy powdered wigs until their opposition, in 1831, to the Reform bill made them so unpopular that they were glad to drop so conspicuous an ensign of prelatey for fear of being mobbed.

A special from Paris says James Gordon Bennett left Paris on Friday night for St. Petersburg en route for Afghanistan, taking with him Van Woistyn, who is to become correspondent for the Herald in the event of war.

The Legion of Honour includes 47 grand cross, 178 grand officers, 8150 commanders, 4,721 officers, and 29,510 knights. Each of the grand cross receive \$600 a year; each of the grand officers, \$400; and the commanders \$200. Of the officers, four have \$200, and the rest \$100; 108 knights receive \$70, and the rest \$50. The whole cost of the order is about \$2,500,000 a year.

Leo XII. has made, among other small changes in his household affairs, one in regard to lighting his room. Pius IX. used always to light four wax candles, in silver candlesticks. Pope Leo substitutes stearine candles, and generally uses a large globe lamp. The servants complain of this small economy, on the ground that the wax candles, whether consumed or not, were changed every day and given to them, whereas the stearines are burnt down to mere ends.

Dean Stanley preached at Grace church, New York, on Sunday night. Bishop Potter presiding. The sermon dealt with the question as to the origin and destiny of man. The speaker showed that it was not a history of descent, but of the ascent of man they had to deal with. He spoke of New York city as the Babylon of the West, a new creation almost within a generation, and said the question was whether there was a corresponding development of moral nature.

Sir Richard Sutton, an eminent sporting baronet, son of one yet more famous, died lately. He owned Cambridge House, Piccadilly, long the residence of Lord Palmerston, and a great deal of London property. He succeeded a brother who became a Roman Catholic, but died childless, of whom his father had said that he would "give any one £10,000 who'd make John a sportsman," but John preferred to play the organ in a church at Bruges, and loathed dogs, guns and stables to the last.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS.—The subject of impression at first sight was being talked over at the tea table, when the lady whose duty it was to preside said "said she always formed an idea of a person at first sight and found it to be generally correct." "Mamma," said her youngest son, in a shrill voice that attracted the attention of all present. "Well, my dear, what is it?" replied the mother. "I want to know what was your opinion of me when you first saw me?" This question gave a sudden turn to the conversation.

General Ducrot has issued the four volume of his work on the "Defence of Paris;" and his contemptuous remarks, says the Pall Mall Gazette, on the part played by the National Guard during the siege will not lessen the execration in which he is held by Republicans. So far from rendering justice to the 350,000 citizen-soldiers who left their counters and workshops to go and fight beside the regulars, the General declares that these men were an absolute hindrance to the defence; and that, in fact, he considers "their presence to have been as detrimental as if 20,000 men had been withdrawn from the regular army." His opinions are an emphatic condemnation of volunteer armies.
