Work on Souris breakwater is still going on. The slope is not far from being completed. It is only a matter of a few weeks more when the contractors will finish what was, without question, one of the riskiest jobs to face ever undertaken in these parts. Much credit is due Contractor Mellich and foreman Lantieri for the way the work has been pushed forward. Mr. Mellich has won the good will and confidence of all who had dealings with him in connection with this big undertaking.

The wrecked schooner at Colville Bay has been sold by Mr. McLeod to Mr. Thos. Kichham, of Souris West. The latter has men now at work hauling her up for repairs. She is a new and hand-some little craft, and it is hoped her present owner, who is said to be one of the lucky ones with vessels, may have better luck with her than had the unfortunate La Have who first commanded her.

Sal news of the death at Portland, Maine, of the only daughter, Elith, reached Mr. and Mrs. William Brown, of South Lake on the 16th inst. Miss Brown left home last fall and was in the best of health till within a few days ago. She was a general favorite and her unexpected death has cast a gloom over the whole neighborhood. Her remains are being brought home and probably will arrive about the 21st.

Commercial travellers are numerous just now in Souris. A good half dozen of them attended Mr. T. C. James' preaching in the Methodist Church on Sunday evening last. Mr. James also preached for Rev. J. G. Cameron in the morning at Souris and in the afternoon at Bay Fortune.

The parishioners of St. Margarets have in contemplation the removal of their church and parochial residence from where they now stand to a site recently purchased about a mile away near the cross roads of Bear River Road and the new Main Road. Preparations for the proposed removal are now going on and it is thought that it will be accomplished early next summer.
