SALMON FEEDING IN FRESH WATER.
A Portland, Oregon, correspondent in
Forest and Stream, recently says:
Apropos of the subject of salmon feed-
ing in fresh water, and the oft-repeated
declaration of the United States Fish Com-
mission, Livingston Stone, Dr. David Starr
Jordan and other eminent authorities, that
the salmon do never feed in fresh waters,
I desire to say that, in my opinion, my
friend Judge Green's views are about the
correct diagnosis of the mooted question.
It will be remembered that he has fre-
quently suggested in the columns of the
Forest and Stream, and the salmon may
feel while in fresh waters upon food quite
as nutritious and strengthening, although
not so substantial an appearance as that
of their fattening yards in the ocean; and
that the first run of salmon undertake their
pilgrimage at a season of the year when
they are likely to find a good supply of
larvae and other soft or gelatinous sub-
stances that would be very nutritious
without leaving much substance in the
salmon's stomach, and that those
following would have the advantage
of the spawn of their predecessors,
which they would not be slow in ap-
propriating. Dr. Jordan admitted that
this view might be true, and Charles
Hallock declared that such had always
been his opinion. That the salmon are
very fond of their own spawn, one who
is well informed about their habits will for
a moment question. I have fished for sal-
mon a great deal in the Fall at the York
Hamlet, and aside from my own expe-
rience have closely observed the experi-
ences of others. One day recently I
looked ten Chinooks at the fall with sal-
mon for miles for miles. A gentleman
with me looked five. Another, more lucky,
took twenty-one. Another, sixteen; and
numerous fishermen at the same place and
at other falls took from a dozen to
thirty the spawn greedily, not only on this
particular day, but on many other days.
In fact I presume that several thousand
salmon have been taken at the falls this
month and last with salmon for bait.
It seems to me that these facts indicate a
disposition on the part of the salmon to
feed in fresh water. At least I desire to
add my proof to the great mass of evi-
dence in support of Judge Green's
theory.

U. S. CRUISE CHICAGO
Visited by the Prince of Wales and Duke
of Devonshire in London, some time
ago, in honor of the officers of the American
cruiser Chicago, which was then lying
at Gravesend, the Prince of Wales ex-
pressed to Admiral Erlen and Capt.
Mahan a desire to visit the vessel the
time she was at Cowes. The Prince's ex-
pression to visit the Chicago was fixed
at a recent dinner given on board the royal
yacht Osborne. Accordingly the Prince's
pinnace arrived alongside the Chicago at
exactly seven bells. As he stepped aboard
the cruiser a salute of 21 guns was fired,
the British ensign was hoisted at the
stick, and the yards were manned by the
crew. Admiral Erlen, Capt. Mahan, Lt.
Commander Potter and Lt. Clover greeted
the royal party as they came aboard.
The Prince wore the uniform of a
British admiral and the Duke of York
that of a post captain, while the men of
the Prince's suite were attired in uni-
forms of their respective ranks. A group
of marines was up on the port side of the
quarter deck and they were carefully in-
spected by the Prince. The sun was shin-
ing brightly and the brilliant uniforms
made a most picturesque scene.
At the request of the Prince, all the of-
ficers of the Chicago were presented to
him in turn. The royal guest was then
conducted to all the different parts of the
ship, except the sky box. This latter part
of the ship the Prince especially desired
to see, but was unable to do so as an acci-
dent had happened to a seaman. The
Prince remarked he had understood the
American medical department was the
best equipped of any in the world. The
members of the royal party repeatedly ex-
pressed their admiration of the ship, and
the appearance and cleanliness of the ship.
On quitting the Chicago, the Prince of
Wales expressed the pleasure that his
visit had afforded him.

JUDGING FRUIT BY POINTS.
The Massachusetts State Board of Agri-
culture has established a scale of points
for judging vegetables. Pamphlet forms,
containing cuts and scale of points for
two or three of the finest varieties of all
the different vegetables, are being issued
for the use of the Incorporated Agricul-
tural Societies. This is one advance needed
by all agricultural societies, as very often
men are appointed to judge at shows who
differ very widely in their ideal of a perfect
specimen, and by having an authorized
scale of points to guide them, much less
unjust decisions will be given. As
an example of their plan, we give a scale of
points given for "Beano of Helron" pota-
toes and tomatoes:
Size—Should be 4 1/2 inches long and 2 1/2
inches wide for perfection—30 points.
Form—Should be according to engrav-
ing, as given in pamphlet—30 points.
Smoothness—Free from deep pits, warts
or excrescences—20 points.
Quality—Fresh appearance, freedom
from coarseness and bright color—10
points.
Total—100 points.
The following is the scale of points for
tomatoes:
Form—Should be according to engrav-
ing—40 points.
Color—Should be bright red or purplish
pink, according to variety—30 points.
Size—Should be not less than 2 inches
and not more than 3 1/2 inches in diameter
—15 points.
Quality—Firmness, ripeness and free-
dom from green spots or cracks—15
points.
Total—100 points.

AN UNFORTUNATE WEDDING.
Despatches from St. Petersburg tell the
story of an accident which befell the Grand
Duchess Xenia and the Grand Duke
Michaelovitch shortly after their marriage
on August 6th. The Grand Duchess and
her husband were driving from the im-
perial palace to Chateau Kopskoy, near
Krasnoe-Selo, where they were to pass the
next three days. They had just left the
wedding dinner party, and drove along the
highway with a small escort and a few
members of the imperial Rus-
sian family. The whole district
along the route was ablaze with
fireworks, which rendered the horses
restless and blinded the coachman. A
nearly fatal accident occurred when the
wedding party, on which Greek fire was
burning, the horses bolted. The coachman
could not see to guide them and the
cavalry was scattered over the embankment
and the bridge and upset in the ditch.
The bridal couple were thrown to the
ground with great force. Both of the
Grand Duchess's wrists were sprained, her
face was scratched, her body was lacerated
and her clothing torn. The Grand Duke
suffered severely. The coachman
was injured internally. The bridal couple
were carried in another carriage and taken
to the Chateau Kopskoy. The Earl and
Czarina were summoned in haste, but when
they arrived at the chateau were informed
by the doctors that their daughter was not
dangerously hurt.
