—WORK NEARS COMPLETION—The Dredge 115 has completed the work of dredging the channel of the Montague River from the bridge to Shaw's Point, and there remains only the dredging of the points at the beginning of the second and third courses, and at the basin. This job will take approximately another two or three weeks, which will bring to a completion a very large task undertaken in the summer of 1950, and which will provide Montague with a waterway sufficiently deep to permit large vessels to enter, and which should do much to promote trade with other provinces to the benefit of farmers and dealers of the area.

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Work Progressing At New Bridge

Last week workmen employed at the new bridge at Sutherland's Mill, near Montague, completed the pavement across the bridge, 24 feet wide and approximately 66 feet long. On each side there is a cement curb over which the protecting rails will be placed. The concrete has been re-inforced with five-eighth and three-quarter inch steel rods to give it resilience. It is understood that with the completion of this part of the work, the remainder will be left over until next year, when new approaches at either end will be added.

On the program also at a later date is a new road to be cut about a half mile above the bridge, through land now owned by Mr. Lester Gay, in a straight line, and then a sweeping curve to enter the bridge. This will eliminate two almost blind curves in the present road. It has been rumored that a wider road will be cut through near the land owned by Mr. Jack Keith, to connect with the new road leading to Montague. This would make the shortest detour in the event of the construction of the Montague Bridge, which, it is understood, is in the planning stage.

The new Sutherland bridge is of modern construction, with a central span of 30 feet, and two 18-foot spans. At either side hand-laid stones rise in a slant from the bottom of the 30-foot span to the top of the 18-foot spans, thus protecting the approaches from ice and water erosion. The large 30-foot opening provides a much wider runway than previous, and sportsmen are looking forward to the revival of this stream as one of the best fishing spots on the island.

Missionary Gives Talk On India At Montague

Miss Edna Hunt, missionary on furlough from the Church of Christ mission, Kulpahar, U.P. district India, thrilled her hearers when she spoke in the Montague Church of Christ, Thursday night. Mr. Marvel D. Dunbar of the Charlottetown church, who was a classmate of Miss Hunt's, presided at the meeting, and introduced the speaker. Mrs. Dunbar's twin sister, Marie, Mrs. Frank Remple, is one of the missionaries in Kulpahar.

Miss Hunt gave a brief but most graphic picture of "things pollitic" in India, the caste system, the poverty of the lower caste, the illiteracy of the masses, the deep unrest. She pictured a people, who without knowledge, demanded the abolition of British rule. Later the same people, terrified by the violent clashes between Mohammedans and Hindus, begged the white missionaries for the restoration of British rule.

The workers in Kulpahar have met countless people who are constantly searching for an inner peace, which their gods cannot give. Of this number those who learn of Christ, and accept Him, find in Him perfect fulfillment.

Miss Hunt is a Canadian missionary. With her in this work in India are Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Raah and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Remple. All five are graduates of the Albert Bible College, Calgary.
