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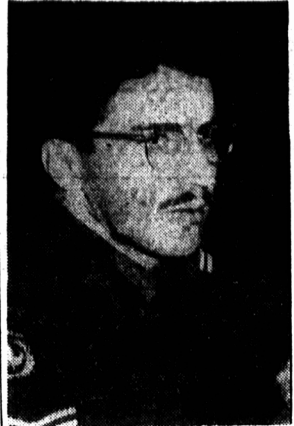

Mr. Gerald Foster, of Charlottetown represented the Plaintiff while the Defendant was represented by Mr. S. S. Hessian, Q. C., of Montague. Both the plaintiff and the defendant gave evidence and one witness was put on the stand by each party in the case. The case was adjourned to a date to be fixed, when judgment will be handed down. —AC
