THE HON. WILLIAM ELDER, L. L. D., Provincial Secretary of New Brunswick, and editor and proprietor of the *Daily Telegraph*, of St. John, died very suddenly this morning.

Provincial Exhibition.

The prize list is out—none too soon. The Exhibition is to be held in the Drill Shed and adjacent grounds at Charlottetown on Wednesday and Thursday the 10th and 11th of October. Though the Government grant is \$1,000, the prizes to be distributed will amount to about \$1,500. The Commissioners look with confidence to the public for the balance, which they expect to make up by means of the entrance fees, gate money, &c. In addition to the usual prizes for horses, J. D. McLeod, Esq., will give three prizes of \$8, \$7, and \$5, for the best foals sired by "Barrister"; and Hon. Neil McLeod will give three prizes of like amount for the best foals sired by "Hernando." Mr. R. K. Brace offers a special money prize for the best tub or crock of butter, not less than 28 lbs., made with cream from the Champion Creamer, (of which he is the proprietor), and a Champion Creamer in addition to the money prize. We learn that several new features will be added which will make the Exhibition more attractive to the public.

A Town Hall.

The very great necessity for a Town Hall in Charlottetown is admitted by everyone. The places now used on public occasions are not fit for the accommodation of the large number of decent people, who seek admission. Is it not therefore high time that an effort were made to form in a Joint Stock Company for the erection of a Town Hall? At present an opportunity offers for securing grounds suitable for this purpose, which may not happen again for years to come. The site on which stood J. D. McLeod's Store, the Police Station, and Dr. Jenkins's residence, consumed by the fire of Sunday night, is, without any exception, the most central and best adapted for the purpose of a Town Hall that can be had in this city. We trust that men of means and enterprise will, without any delay, meet together for the purpose of considering this question. A hall that would seat from 2,500 to 3,000 persons in this city would be a want supplied; and the men who will move in the matter will deserve, as doubtless they will receive, the best thanks of the community. We have the money. Have we the public spirit, too?

Cricket.

THOUGH a heavy rain fell early yesterday morning, towards ten o'clock it cleared up, and there seemed every prospect of a good interesting game. The ground, which had previously been well rolled and pounded, was in excellent condition for cricket—in fact everything was favorable to a good day's sport. At eleven o'clock wickets were pitched, and Captain Kenny of the Wanderers having won the toss, sent the home men to the bat. The game commenced by J. A. Longworth and W. A. Weeks taking the first stand at the wickets against the bowling of Kaiser and Fuller. Before long, however, Longworth was obliged to retire, being caught out at point by Salter. He was followed by V. Longworth, but soon afterwards Weeks, who was playing a steady bat, was given out by T. A. LePage. T. A. LePage took his place, and Longworth and he, did some careful playing. But now the clouds began again to gather, and the rain to pour in torrents. Happily, however, it lasted but a short time, and play, which had been stopped, was resumed, only to stop again as a fresh shower followed. From this out the weather remained most unsatisfactory and disagreeable, the sun showing out bright one moment, while a miniature deluge was repeated in the next. As a consequence, good playing was out of the question, the bad light and the dark line of trees behind the border, making it almost impossible to see the ball. First Longworth, then LePage and R. T. Weeks were consigned to the ranks of onlookers with a score of 5 out for 14 runs. L. Yeo and T. Haythorne now held the wickets for the remainder of the day. Both played well for they had splendid bowling to contend with. Fuller though not fearfully swift was more fearfully straight, while Kaiser bowled very fast with a big break. At five o'clock the stumps had to be withdrawn, overhead and underneath being so moist as to render further play impossible. Yeo and Haythorne had run the score up to 27 runs, and the first day's play ended with five wickets down and 27 runs scored. The Halifax team went to the bat this forenoon, and we learn, have already run up a score equal to that of the Charlottetown team.

A contemporary puts in a plea for the farm. It justly points out that many young men who could grow wealthy as agriculturists turn their minds and bend their steps to the city, where their chances for success in the struggle of life are fewer than on the farm. All men are not constituted alike. Many young men whose birth-place was a farm-house will do well on the paternal acres; others, also brought up to agriculture, have an inclination towards mechanics. One of the advantages of Canada is that, while the former are encouraged by good prices for their produce to adhere to the best and most independent calling in the world, the latter class are not prevented by silly trade theorists from engaging in the mechanical pursuits for which they have a taste. All the same, the young man who has a good farm, and knows how to run it, should stay just there.—*Mon.*

The Prospect in Canada.

(Toronto Globe.)

The salvation of the farmer this season is in the hay crop. As we have pointed out on a previous occasion this season, and as the figures of the Government returns conclusively show, the hay crop is the most important one to Canada. Instead of about ten per cent. below the average as last season, we are promised this season almost twenty-five per cent. over the average. In some places the farmers expect more than a crop and a half as compared with an average year. This is a magnificent showing, and one upon which the country may well be congratulated. The only difficulty will be in the gathering and housing of this enormous yield. That is a matter that depends upon the weather for the next few days. The following is in table form the crop prospect of the year, as shown by the reports given:—

He Saved the Child.

A RAILROAD FIREMAN WHO RISKED HIS LIFE TO RESCUE AN INFANT.
A fireman on the Milwaukee and St. Paul road named Thos. King can be credited with an act of rare heroism. He was firing on a wild freight train a short distance this side of Frankville while the train was moving over a down grade at the rate of thirty miles an hour. The engineer, named Warner, suddenly discovered a very little child standing close to the rails and apparently so paralyzed with fear that it could not move. The heavy train had run so near the little one when the discovery was made that the train could not possibly be stopped.
The engineer, as he whistled for the brakes, called the attention of King to the child. The brave fireman lost no time in reaching the front of the engine, where he grasped the rail firmly for support, and, stepping down upon the cowcatcher, threw one foot out as far as possible. Thus as the train rushed down upon the child, he was able, by a dexterous sweep of his foot, and out of the way of the cowcatcher and wheels. The noble deed was accomplished in much less time than it takes to relate the incident.
As King clambered back to his post in the cab, the mother was discovered standing upon the threshold of her home, near by, with her hands uplifted, as if imploring the Deity to spare her little one. She, too, had made the discovery of its danger when too late to even attempt a rescue.
