He says as Liverpool is the best market for produce and live stock shippers prefer to send there rather than to Manchester. It costs nearly as much to take freight from Manchester to Liverpool as it does from Charlottetown to Liverpool. "If I were to give you an orange," said the judge, "I would simply say, 'I give you the orange,' but should the transaction be entrusted to a lawyer to put in writing he would adopt this form: 'I hereby give, grant, and convey to you all my interest, right, title and advantage of and in said orange, together with its rind, skin, juice, pulp and pits; and all rights and advantages therein, with full power to bite, suck, or otherwise eat the same or give away with or without rind, skin, juice, pulp or pits; anything hereinbefore or in any other deed or deeds, instruments of any nature or kind whatever to the contrary in any wise notwithstanding.'"
