Woolens Are Washable

WOOLENS for fall — naturally! But this season there's a difference! They're washable!

Another departure is that woolens are high fashion. There are still the little tailored numbers suitable for classroom and office, but there are many dressy items, too, expensive cocktail and dinner dresses made of wool.

Good for Slim Janes

This will be a treat for the chilly slim girls who used to shiver at dances because their silk or rayon gown just didn't generate enough heat.

If you're wise with a needle, you can copy many of these costly creations. One designer features red plaid for a street length formal dress, with a coat in matching red. Another trims feather-light tweed with satin and sequins.

Easy to Wash

Woolens labeled washable, and therefore non-shrinkable, are available by the yard as well as in made-up garments. These specially processed fabrics are simple to wash and care for.

First of all, remove any trim or detailing that is not washable. Use warm water and plenty of mild suds, rinse thoroughly.

When machine-washing, keep water level high and load light. Two or three minutes agitation should be sufficient. Follow with the usual rinses, and press while damp.

If you follow directions conscientiously, these woolens should come through repeated washings with flying colors and superlative fabric quality.

Pressing is best done with a steam iron, preferably on the wrong side.

Wools with a label showing they can be washed are wonderful for the jumper. Every shop is showing these handy items nowadays; they're grand for school and office girls alike.

The jumper is easy to sew, without the sleeve trouble which usually bothers the novice at needlework. Washable woolens, made up into colorful jumpers which are simple to look after, should be a budget

help. Mothers and daughters both can enjoy these comfortable, simple to make and washable garments.

A shrink-proof wool sweater may be a good complement to such a jumper. These come in bright colors, and have turtle necks to offset the deep scoop or low square of the jumper neckline.

Washable woolens, and the revival of the jumper, may both mean much to the lady of the house in terms of style, cleanliness and economy.

KEEP IN TRIM

Hip Variation and Fashions

Symmetry is the measure of a shapely figure. So whip 'out the tape and see how your hips measure up in proportion to the bust circumference. While this season's suit skirts would seem to make slim hips de rigueur... fashion has to allow for hip variations. Some hips are just naturally fuller.

By the way, there is never any question about where to measure the hips. Circle the tape around the fullest area so as to include the gluteus maximus muscle which pads and shapes the hips. If your

Hold and stretch. Repeat slowly three times, then raise opposite leg and arm. Later stretch on the bias, raising one leg and opposite arm and pull it.

Whip into the side scissors. Position: Lying on side, head propped on folded arm, palm of other hand braced on floor for support.

Movement: Shuttle into action, crossing and recrossing the legs in as wide an action as possible. Repeat 12 times, relax and change sides and swing again.

Finish with this easy version of the bicycle exercise.

hips measure not more than 2 inches longer than the bust circumference, that is average, and this measurement is in good proportion.

In fashion parlance, slender hips are never more than an inch larger than the bust — a standard difference for models and movie stars. Full hips measure 3 to 4 inches larger than the bust circumference.

If you are overweight generally, then, of course, diet is in order. But when weight is within normal range, exercise can put a stop to spreading hips, and what is more, can slim bulky inches off this measurement by restoring tone to flabby muscles. Toned muscles are always more shapely.

The following exercise tones hip and girdle muscles, and so is an exercise well worth doing!

Position: Lying face down on floor, head propped on folded left arm.

Movement: Raise right leg and right arm a few inches off floor.

Position: Lying on side, head propped on folded arm, palm of other hand braced on floor.

Movement: Flex alternate knees, bring them briskly toward the chest, working the knees in a piston action, shooting legs straight down, and bending alternate knees toward chest. This affords the same exercise as the well-known high bicycle exercise taken with feet propped in air.

With weight at or near normal and tone in these figure controlling muscles, your hip measurement will be right for you.

Do you keep a miniature auto trouble light in the car? It's a handy thing to have for changing tires at night, for reading maps, for finding what you're looking for in the trunk and for many other purposes. One such light comes equipped with a 12-foot cord and plugs right into the car's cigarette lighter.
